FOOD SERVICES COMMITTEE REPORT

The Food Services Committee, which includes representatives from the Board of Regents, the food service caterers, the faculty, the support staff and the students, has decided that effective Monday, February 6, 1984 there will be a charge of 5¢ for a styrofoam cup and 5¢ for cream and/or sugar if these items are taken without the purchase of a beverage. This decision was made following a review of surveys of usage in the University's cafeteria and buffeterias which indicate that an average of 800 styrofoam cups are used daily to dispense water, with many of the users also making use of the cream and/or sugar which is readily available.

NOMINATIONS FOR CHANCELLOR

Dr. R.O.A. Hunter, our distinguished Chancellor, has indicated his intention of relinquishing his office at the conclusion of his present term, June 30, 1984. The Joint Committee invites, from the university community and the public, suggestions of candidates to be considered for nominations as Chancellor. Such suggestions should include the name and a biographical summary of the potential nominee, along with a statement of the proposer's reasons for making the suggestion and the name of the proposer. All such suggestions are to be treated as confidential. These suggestions should be sent to President Robin Farquhar by March 30, 1984.

NATIONAL STRATEGY FOR HIGHER EDUCATION  
CALLED FOR

The establishment of a national strategy for higher education is the central recommendation of the third and final volume of the report of the Commission on Canadian Studies. Entitled Some Questions of Balance, the report was released by the AUCC, January 12. The focus of the final volume is human resources, its main theme, the need for balance, realism and equity in the development and deployment of highly qualified graduates. The report, authored by Thomas H.B. Symons, chairman of the Commission and Vanier Professor at Trent University, and James Page, consultant with

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the commission for 10 years and now director of Canadian studies in the federal Department of the Secretary of State is available from AUCC Publications, \$10.00 prepaid.

The commission was established by the AUCC in 1972 to study, report and make recommendations on the state of teaching and research in areas of study relating to Canada and Canadian universities. The final report makes 85 recommendations.
