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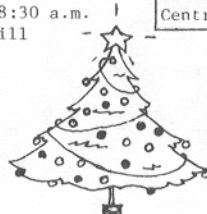

At its regular meeting held Monday, December 10, 1984, the University's Senate made the following decisions:

1. Amended the conditions of eligibility for undergraduate awards to restrict them in general to students seeking their first undergraduate degree, the B.Ed. excepted.
2. Approved a change in the policy governing course load reduction to bring it into conformity with whatever policy may exist with respect to the disbursement of award monies.
3. Approved a recommendation from the Committee on Admissions and Registration that responsibility be delegated to the Collegiate Division for operating preparatory programmes for contract students which are designed to lead to Manitoba high school graduation; also that the terms of such contracts include certain specified conditions.
4. Approved October 1 as the starting date each year for the term of office of the Committee on Admissions and Registration.
5. Gave approval in principle to the Collegiate Division to offer three new courses.
6. Ratified the nominations of the student members for the Joint Senate Committee and the Joint Senate Appeals Committee.
7. Requested the Committee on Academic Development and Curriculum to explore the issues raised by the Winnipeg Bible College and Theological Seminary in a letter received by the President.
8. Named Dr. V.M. Batzel as its representative on the Board of the Mennonite Studies Centre and Dr. H. Loewen as his alternate.
9. Approved a recommendation that the Board of Regents endeavor to negotiate a change in the composition of the Board of the Mennonite Studies Centre so that it would include two Senate representatives.
10. Approved curriculum changes for the Faculty of Arts and Science: new courses, changes in existing courses, and general calendar and/or programme revisions.
11. Accepted the recommendations of the Honorary Degrees Committee of those persons to be invited to receive degrees at the Spring, 1985 Convocation.
