SENATE DECISIONS

At its regular meeting held Tuesday, March 12, 1985 the University's Senate made the following decisions:

1. Endorsed the Executive Committee's recommendation that no quorum for Senate committees be established, except for the Executive Committee itself at such times as it is acting on behalf of Senate, when a quorum of seven shall apply.
2. Named as its two representatives to the fund raising campaign planning advisory group Professors P. Brask and J.J. Cote.
3. Approved the establishment of the R.O.A. Hunter Collegiate Alumni Award and new titles for two Collegiate prizes.
4. Amended the English proficiency requirements for international applicants and, in a related move, suspended the ESL course which was to have been offered for the benefit of such applicants.

THE LAST WORD

"Smaller is better" could best summarize the lecture Lloyd Axworthy delivered at the University of Winnipeg, Thursday, February 28. Axworthy was speaking on the federal government's role in urban redevelopment.

The most effective way to create regional economic health, Axworthy said, was to promote organization at the community-city level.

He said this could be achieved through the promotion and support of Community Development Corporations--such as Riverborne, which promotes activity in the River-Osborne area.

Axworthy also emphasized the need for federal programs to be presented in a more orderly manner for potential users. He suggested Immigration and Employment Offices (there are 400 of them across the country) be set up as 'one-stop shoppers' for employment grants, capital expenditures and other grants programs.

Axworthy praised Winnipeg's Core Area Initiative (CAI) as an example of the kind of community-city model he feels could be successful in developing regional economic health.

He said questions of whether the CAI should be renewed are really "questions of whether Winnipeg wants to develop itself economically or not. Of course there should be a Core II," he said.

A crowd of around 25 attended the lecture. Most questioners fixed on the CAI and its potential for the future.
