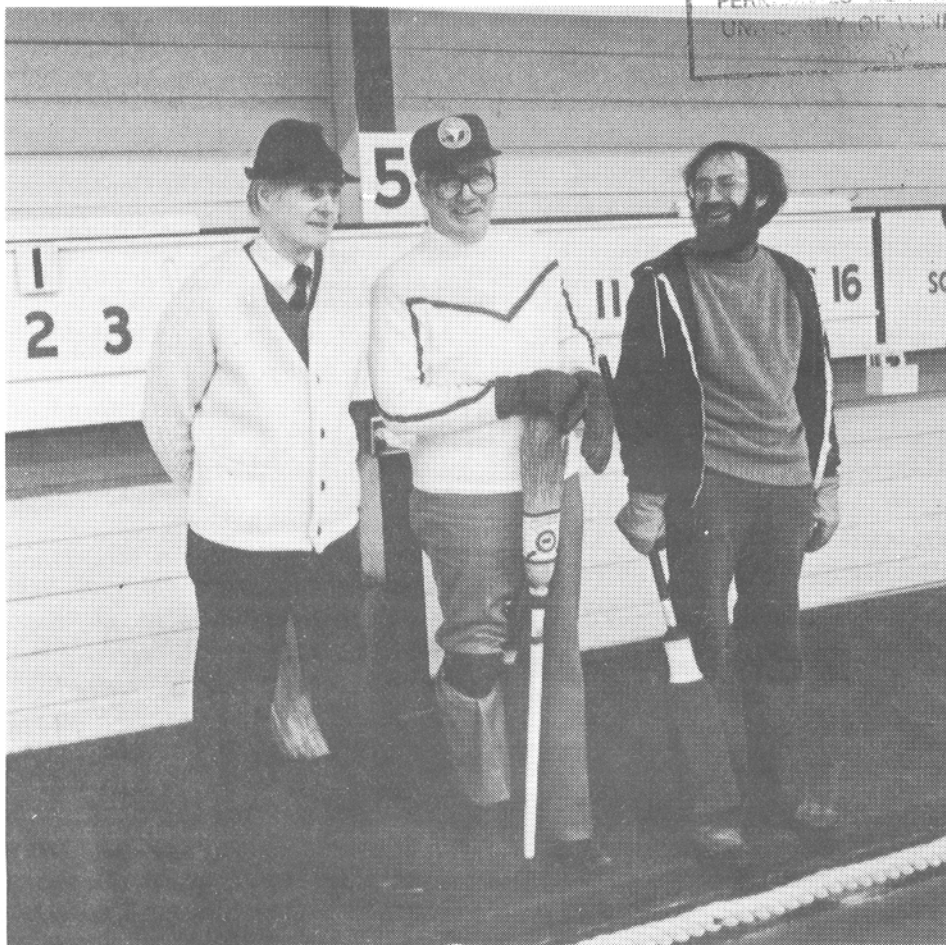

Brian Bater

Brian Bater is the Purchasing Agent for The University of Winnipeg. But he'll soon be as comfortable standing behind the Chapel pulpit as he is sitting behind his office desk. A part-time student at St. John's College, Brian is training to be a priest in the Anglican Church and hopes to complete his M.Div. in three to five years.

Brian says he has wanted to train for the ministry since the age of fourteen. Though this goal is only currently being realized, he knows that his life experiences have prepared him for the challenges of the clerical calling.

Born and raised in Winnipeg, Brian attended Vincent Massey Collegiate but became dissatisfied with high school life, and subsequently dropped out. He worked as a clerk at Loblaws, then spent a year and a half in the military. "It convinced me that I wasn't interested in the macho mentality", he said. "So I quit".

Brian decided to enter management training with Dominion stores, and shortly thereafter registered as a mature student at The University of Winnipeg. "University and high school are like day night", he said. "To succeed in university you must find the motivation within yourself".

A competent student, Brian was hired as a research assistant in the Biology Department. He was soon promoted to Chief Technician. Brian remained in that position for seven years — his next move was to Purchasing. He clearly enjoys the job. "There are so many people to meet", he said. "It's the personal contact that keeps me here".

In his spare time, Brian skis, remodels his house, and sings in his church choir. Spending time with his wife and two sons, and training for chaplaincy work keep him very busy. "There's no time to hang around 7-11" he laughed.



Lecture

Dr. Keely was awarded a Ph.D. in Sociology from Fordham University in 1970. He is currently Senior Associate, Center for Policy Studies; Program Manager, International Research Awards Program on the Determinants of Fertility in Developing Countries, The Population Council; and Program Manager, Demographic and Health Surveys, Prime Subcontract for the Population Council.

December COPUM Meeting

The Committee of Presidents of Universities in Manitoba met on December 17 at The University of Winnipeg. The principal item of business was to review the final draft of the report on distance education prepared for us by Ms. Shirley Lyon. We agreed to receive the report and forward it (as a condition of the grant which funded it) to the Department of Education (Deputy Minister) for reaction and further discussion. Subsequently, we shall decide on possible further distribution and deliberation that may be desirable before considering what we might propose to the appropriate bodies for approval in regard to university cooperation in distance education throughout Manitoba. At the COPUM meeting we also discussed the possibility of a contingency provision in the 1986-87 budget for Inter-Universities North, the possibility of holding a future COPUM meeting in Thompson in conjunction with a conference-type activity that might be organized by IUN, and the "lobbying" meeting convened by Tim Sale earlier that day.

January COPUM Meeting

The Committee of Presidents of Universities in Manitoba met on January 20 at the University of Manitoba. At that meeting, we decided to initiate activities that would help to identify arguments and information which can be most helpful to us in endeavouring to present the "University case" for funding by the provincial government; after pursuing this further at our next meeting, in February, we may establish a small committee of senior administrators to consolidate such information and then, at the appropriate time, we may invite representatives from our respective student, staff, and faculty constituencies to consider the information and suggest ways in which we might use it most persuasively in support of priority treatment for university funding in this province. We also discussed the new pay equity legislation and draft

regulations which, we understand, will apply to all faculty and staff in the universities and will involve considerable consultation and negotiation with our unions. It is a highly complex and rather expensive matter to design the system for the job evaluation that is required, and the universities will cooperate as fully as possible as we endeavour collectively to sort it out. While we still have received no word on grants for 1986-87, the recently announced 3.8% increase in grants to school divisions is informative since the treatment of universities has been similar to that of school divisions in the past few years. And we learned that our report on distance education is still under study in the Department of Education, although there now seems to be some doubt that the funding Departmental personnel once thought might be available for this purpose may not in fact materialize.

FINANCE COMMITTEE

85-86 Redressment Grant Budget

RESEARCH AND TRAVEL

The Research and Travel Committee report to the Board of Regents was accepted for information.

At its meeting on January 25, The University of Winnipeg Board of Regents approved the following resolution:

It is the policy of The University of Winnipeg that any lists of its faculty, staff, students, and alumni, or any other lists developed by the University, shall not be released to any external organizations except for the routine provision of lists for normal administrative purposes. Any other exceptions to this policy must be individually approved by the Board of Regents. This necessitates all information being distributed to these groups being sent by a sponsoring body of the University.

Socialist Studies/Etudes Socialistes: A Canadian Annual, No. 2 is now available. 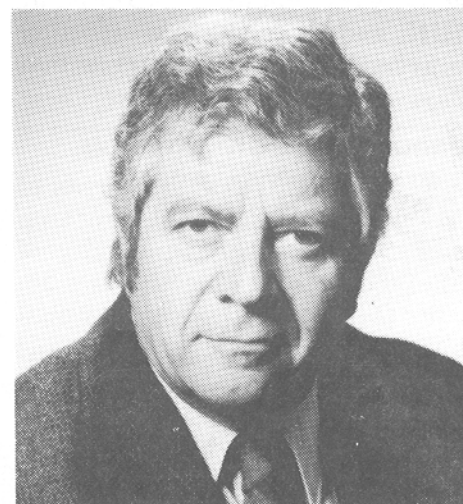
