

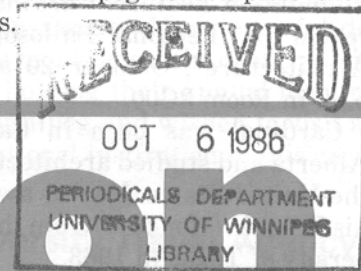
New Program Established

Students and faculty of The University of Winnipeg are invited to participate in the **Universite canadienne en France**, a new programme that Laurentian University is organizing on behalf of the Canadian academic community.

The **Universite canadienne en France** (UCF) will offer a pro-

gramme of language and humanities courses, in both English and French, corresponding to the second year of university study in Canada. The programme aims to bring together anglophone and francophone students in roughly equal proportions with representation from all regions of Canada.

The intention is to set aside at least two places; one anglophone, one francophone, for students from The University of Winnipeg who would spend a year at the UCF on Letters of Permission before returning to The University of Winnipeg to complete their studies.

Faculty Retains "Broken Bat" Trophy on Friday, September 26th

In the finest game of the decade the Faculty team again turned back the challenge of the Student team, this time by a score of 8-3. Nine full innings were played in eighty-eight minutes, the fielding on both sides was sharp and brisk, and errors were few. The Faculty knew at once that this was a different, and better, student team when in the first inning all their long, hard-hit flies were easily caught for outs, and when Arnold D'Sousa, the first batter against them, drove Anderson's first pitch for over the heads of the out fielders for a triple. Even though the potential run was erased by a snappy double play moments later, everyone sensed that this would be a ball game.

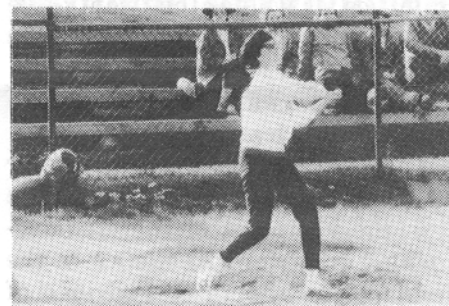
The Faculty finally edged ahead with two runs in the third, and then added two in the fourth and two in the fifth to secure their lead. But the students kept threatening, scored in their half of the third and added two more in the eighth, but came up short in the last analysis.

Undoubted star of the game was Steve Ladochy (Geography), who was everywhere in the field, batted 3 for 5, and scored a run. Ian Lark (Media) and Dave Anderson (Rec-



reation), the winning pitcher, also collected three hits each. For the students, Arnold D'Sousa and Lee Holleron both went 3 for 4 at the plate, and the fielding of Rob Hanks and Sean MacDonald was simply spectacular; no less than four times Hanks robbed the Faculty of extra-base hits, and MacDonald covered the right side in errorless fashion, as well as scoring two runs. Yohannes Sellasie pitched the entire game, Mary Young (Counselling) was behind the plate for the Faculty and Blaine Donais for the Students.

The sixth successive Faculty victory sets a new record. The old one was three straight (1955-6-7).

The students have never won the new "Broken Bat" trophy, donated for annual competition by President and Mrs. Farquhar in 1981.

After the game, all competitors enjoyed the warm hospitality of the Farquhars at dinner in their home, an event which has become, during the 'eighties, part of the "annual classic" tradition.

Bonnycastle Lecture Features Architect

Douglas Cardinal, architect of the National Museum of Civilization, will give the Fall 1986 Bonnycastle Foundation Lecture. Cardinal will reveal his "Personal Philosophy of Architecture", October 20 at 8:00 p.m. in Room 3C00.

Cardinal was born in Calgary, Alberta and studied architecture in the United States. He was awarded his B.Arch. (Honours) from the University of Texas in 1963.

Cardinal's major building projects include: the Stettler General Hospital (Alberta); Grande Prairie Regional College, Edmonton Space Sciences Centre, and the Alberta Government Services Centre. Cardinal played a major role in the planning of housing developments for fourteen Northern Alberta communities, as well as the twenty-five year Master Plan Studies for Saddle Lake, Cold Lake, Thunderchild, Onion Lake, and James Smith Indian Reserves.

Cardinal has won several major architecture awards. In 1974, he was the recipient of the Achievement Award for Excellence in the field of Architecture, Province of Alberta. In that year, he was also admitted as a member of the Royal Canadian Academy of Arts.

Cardinal has held exhibitions in several countries including Poland, the United States, and Belgium. Numerous articles have been written about his work, one of which is entitled "The Work of Douglas Cardinal: An Evolving Indian Architecture?", *Arts Canada* (October/November, 1976) pp. 35-40.

Pathways to Excellence in Indian Education

The MOKAKIT Indian Education Research Association is sponsoring a conference to be held October 17 to 19, 1986, at The University of Winnipeg. The objective of the conference is to bring together researchers involved in Indian education.

The program will include contributed research papers, symposia, poster sessions, and topical discussion. Suggestions for workshops will also be considered. The conference will also be the third general assembly of MOKAKIT, and time will be allotted for organizational business.

MOKAKIT was created by a group of Indian educators from across Canada who convened at the University of British Columbia, Vancouver, on March 24-25, 1983 to address the issue of research in Indian education. The group identified the need for an Indian directed system of research in areas related to education.

MOKAKIT is an independent Indian education research association that recognizes the technical capacity and ability of Indian people to initiate and implement educational research.

MOKAKIT is dedicated to excellence in Indian education. It recognizes that research is fundamental to the development and improvement of Indian educational aims and objectives. MOKAKIT promotes participation of Indians at all levels of educational research.

MOKAKIT provides a system of services related to Indian education which will:

- foster higher education among Indians
- promote and enhance individual/group research initiatives
- review and highlight current research information
- conduct workshops and seminars in research methodology
- provide a resource base for Indian communities

- provide access to research funds established for scholarships and other related scholarly exchange
- publish a Journal of current research in Indian education.

Highlights of the Board of Regents Meeting September 22, 1986

President's Report

NRC Institute Education Committee — Dr. Farquhar accepted an invitation to become Chairman of the Education and Training Advisory Committee for the National Research Council's new Canadian Institute of Industrial Technology. The purpose of the committee is to ensure that the institute meets its objective to facilitate through education, at all levels, an understanding of the importance of industrial technology in industry and to provide training to aid in its implementation.

Summer COPUM Meetings — The Committee of Presidents of Universities in Manitoba held two meetings during the summer, one by conference call and one at the University.

After four years as chairman of COPUM, Dr. Farquhar asked for someone else to take on that role for next year, and President Naimark of the University of Manitoba agreed to do so.

Participation in ACU Meeting — During August Dr. Farquhar participated in the Executive Heads Conference of the Association of Commonwealth Universities in Penang, Malaysia. Four group sessions were scheduled; Dr. Farquhar participated in those on the following subjects: Distance Education; Governmental Influence and Control; New Strategies for International University Collaboration; Links Between Universities and Industries.

The Canadian University Presidents present met with David Vavash, Counsellor for Aid and Development (CIDA) in the Canadian High Commission at Kuala Lumpur. He noted the Canadian government's concern over the recent decline in the number of Malaysian students coming to Canada due in large part to lack of information about opportunities in Canadian post-secondary education. In response, arrangements are being

made for a familiarization tour of Canadian colleges and universities this October by twenty-one senior Malaysian officials, to explore opportunities for study and also for possible inter-institutional linkages.

The General Meeting of ACU was held during the Conference.

During his trip overseas, Dr. Farquhar chaired Board and General Membership meetings of the Commonwealth Council for Educational Administration, in Honolulu and Auckland, thereby completing his four-year term of responsibility as President of CCEA.

International Urban Universities Conference — On September 17-19, The University of Winnipeg cosponsored with the State University of New York at Buffalo the second International Urban Universities Conference. The Conference took place in Winnipeg and attracted 120 senior university administrators from seven Canadian provinces, twenty-three American states, Puerto Rico, the United Kingdom and Israel.

Meeting with UGC — The Board of Regent's Finance Committee and the University's Senior Administrators had their annual meeting with the Universities Grants Commission on September 5, to discuss the submission of budget estimates for the 1987-88 fiscal year. The delegation was led by Bob Purves, as Chairman of the Finance Committee. Beth Candlish, Chair of the Board, participated as well, along with Carolyn Krebs, Iain McDougall and most of the Senior Administrators.

Preliminary Enrollment figures — Dr. Farquhar noted that, while the final results of fall registration are not yet known, it is predicted that the total number of course registrations in our Arts and Science regular session will reflect an increase of approximately 2.4% over last year's figures. Preliminary registration results in the Collegiate indicate an increase of 8.6%, and no significant changes in Theology

registrations are expected this year as compared with last year.

Visit of Deputy Ministers of Education — On September 15, the University welcomed a delegation of four Deputy Ministers of Education from across the country, who were holding their annual meeting in Winnipeg and wished to visit an educational institution in this city.

University Travel Agency

John Walker Travel Ltd. has been selected by a representative University committee to be the University's exclusive travel agency for administrative purposes, study tours and athletic teams.

Planning Grant from International Development Office

Dr. Farquhar informed the Board that the University has received a planning grant from the International Development Office of the Association of Universities and Colleges of Canada, funded by the Canadian International Development Agency, to undertake a planning mission to Peru for the University's proposed program of Child-Care Training in that country.

Proposal for Oral History Project

The Board approved a motion that the minutes of the Board of Regents for the period 1957-59 be available to specific personnel in the Library and Office of the Vice-President (Academic) in order to establish an accurate record of events surrounding the "Crowe Case"

Faculty/Staff Activity

Michael McIntyre, Dean of Arts and Science, has been invited by Northern Telecom to contribute to a Task Force on Private Sector/University Interaction, which aims to identify ways in which universities might contribute to the development of corporate excellence in Canada. Dr. McIntyre will give a description of the University's Writing Program as an example of one way in which to improve communication skills.

Benson Appointed to Grants Commission

Manitoba's Minister of Education, the Honourable Jerry Storie, has announced the appointment of BENNETTA BENSON to the Universities Grants Commission for a term commencing October 1, 1986, and expiring December 31, 1988. Ms. Benson, who obtained her B.A. degree from the University of Winnipeg and her M.P.A. degree from the University of Manitoba, is employed as Admissions Officer in the Office of Admissions & Awards.
