Quintet to Perform

The noon-hour of February 23 promises to be one of note. A quintet consisting of William Bonness, oboe; Vincent Ellin, bassoon; Connie Gitlin, clarinet; Patti Green, French horn; and Barbara Riske, piano; will perform a selection of Mozart and Beethoven at 12:30 p.m. in Room 3C00.

William Bonness was born in Los Angeles and graduated from the University of Southern California. He has played oboe and English horn with the Winnipeg Symphony since 1978. His other musical activities in Winnipeg have included performances with the Manitoba Chamber Orchestra, Aurora Musicale, Music Inter Alia, and a solo recital last spring at the University of Manitoba.

Vincent Ellin has been the principal bassoonist of the Winnipeg Symphony since 1974. He has also performed with the Boston Symphony, the Richmond (Virginia) Symphony, and the Manitoba Chamber Orchestra. In 1980, Vincent received a Canada Council Grant for musical studies in Vienna, Austria. He also appears frequently in chamber music concerts in Winnipeg.

Connie Gitlin is from Saskatchewan and her earliest musical training was on the piano. She has been principal clarinetist with the Winnipeg Symphony and the Manitoba

Chamber Orchestra since 1984. Her university studies, for which she received a Canada Council Grant, were at the Cincinnati Conservatory and Northwestern University. She presently teaches clarinet at the University of Manitoba.

Patti Green was born and raised in Festus, Missouri. She graduated from Southern Illinois University and joined the Winnipeg Symphony in 1967. She also appears with the Manitoba Chamber Orchestra and with the Prairie Winds.

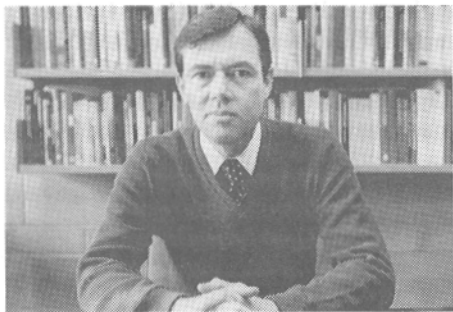
Barbara Riske was born in Winnipeg and graduated from the Uni-

versity of Manitoba. As an accompanist and chamber player, she has performed extensively in Canada and the USA and is heard frequently on CBC. Barbara was formerly principal pianist for the Royal Winnipeg Ballet as well as for the Eliot Feld Ballet and American Ballet Theatre in New York City. In addition to her busy concert schedule, Barbara is in demand as a lecturer and adjudicator. She presently teaches accompaniment at the School of Music, University of Manitoba.

Walton Awarded Killam Fellowship



Professor Doug Walton of the Philosophy Department has been awarded a prestigious Killam Research Fellowship.

The Killam awards of the Canada Council are intended to support scholars of exceptional ability who are engaged in research projects of broad significance and widespread interest.

Killam Research Fellowships are offered on a competitive basis to support research in the humanities, social sciences, natural sciences, health sciences, engineering, or studies linking any of the disciplines within these fields. The Fellowships are aimed at established scholars who have demonstrated outstanding ability through substantial publications in their fields over a period of several years.

"This is a distinction of the highest order, and it constitutes a well-deserved recognition of Dr. Walton's exemplary achievements and capabilities," said The University of Winnipeg's President, Dr. Robin Farquhar. "It also brings great credit to our University".

The Killam awards have been made possible through a bequest of Mrs. Dorothy J. Killam and through a gift made by Mrs. Killam before her death. Killam Research Fellowships provide partial or full salary replacement, to a maximum of \$53,000, based on actual salary for the year before tenure of the award.

"I am particularly grateful to get this award at this time because several partly finished projects on the logical analysis of argumentation are currently underway, and it has been a struggle to get enough time to see them through to completion," said Walton.

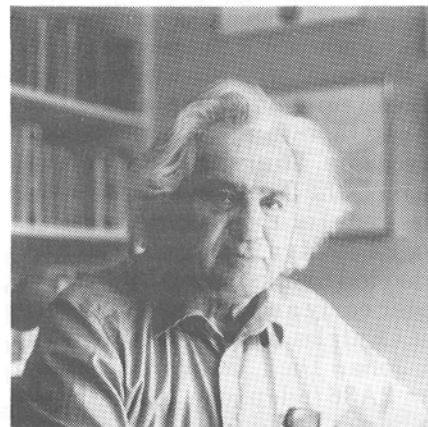
Task Force co-chairpersons are: Dr. June James and Dr. Neil McDonald.

Canadian poet Irving Layton will give a public reading at The University of Winnipeg on Friday, February 27.

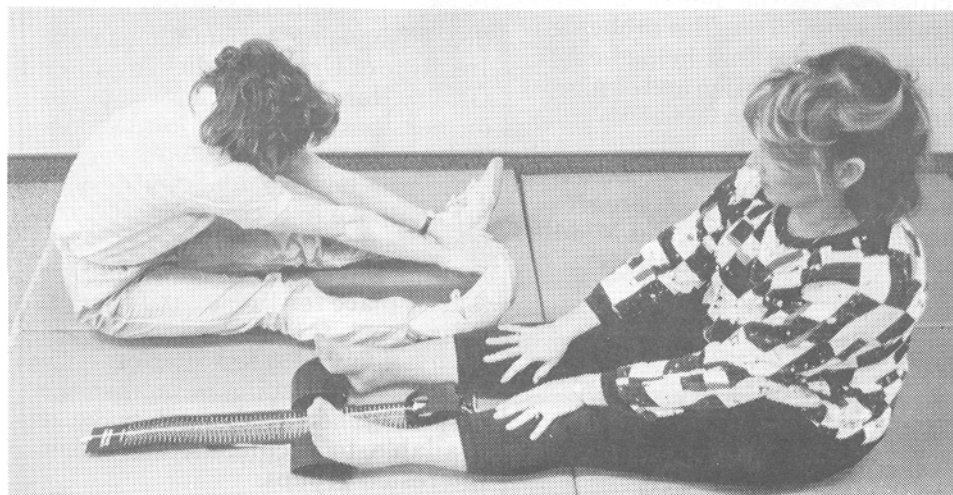
Layton, born in Romania in 1912, came to Montreal a year later. He attended Baron Byng High School, Macdonald College, and McGill University, obtaining a master's degree in economics in 1946. His first book of poetry had appeared the previous year, growing out of his association with the magazine *First Statement*. In 1960 Layton won the Governor General's Award; in 1981 he was nominated for the Nobel Prize for Literature.

Layton is the subject of a film, *A Tall Man Executes a Jig*, to be screened on the 27th at 2:00 p.m. in Theatre 3C00. The public reading will commence at 2:30 p.m.

Sects and Violence illustrates several examples of this fragmentation, including: the Muslim split between Shi'ites and Sunnis; the sectarian violence in Lebanon among Muslims, Maronite Christians, and the Druze; and the increasing friction in Israel between Jews of Ashkenazic and Sephardic origin.

Ancient and Modern: The Fall and Rise of the Middle East — Why did the Middle East begin to decline just as the Renaissance in Europe began? This film probes the economic factors that helped cause the region's stagnation and explores other internal and external developments that retarded Middle Eastern growth and further isolated the area from the age of world progress. Only in the modern era did Middle Easterners reassert themselves.

Faculty/ Staff Activity

Dr. Robin Farquhar, President, will participate in a panel discussion on the "Societal Impact of Technological Change". The discussion is part of a conference entitled *Miconex '87: Productivity through Technology*. The conference will be held April 21-23, 1987.

Alan F.J. Artibise, Director, Institute of Urban Studies, has written two book reviews for the journal *BC Studies*. He has reviewed the following books: *Mayor Gerry: The Remarkable Gerry Gratton McGeer* by D.R. Williams, and *Historical Essays on British Columbia* by Robert MacDonal.

Dr. Artibise will be giving a series of lectures on "Canadian Studies" at Augsburg, Grainau and West Berlin (Federal Republic of Germany) between February 16-26th.

During December 1986, **Catherine Charette**, Senior Research Officer, presented a seminar on residential housing satisfaction to the Institute of Urban Studies Advisory Group. Her presentation was based on her thesis work at Iowa State. The purpose of her study was to determine how residents and designers compare in their perceptions of what factors are associated with making low-income family housing a good place for living, and specifically what factors are associated with achieving safety and privacy. Charette is planning to publish the results of her study and make it available to architects, and other interested groups.
