

## Campaign Progresses

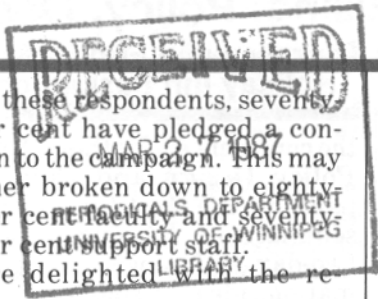
More than \$170,000. has been pledged to date in The University of Winnipeg's internal component of the Silver Jubilee Capital Campaign.

Sixty-three per cent of all employees have turned in pledge cards to

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## Continuing Education to Offer Program for Native Students

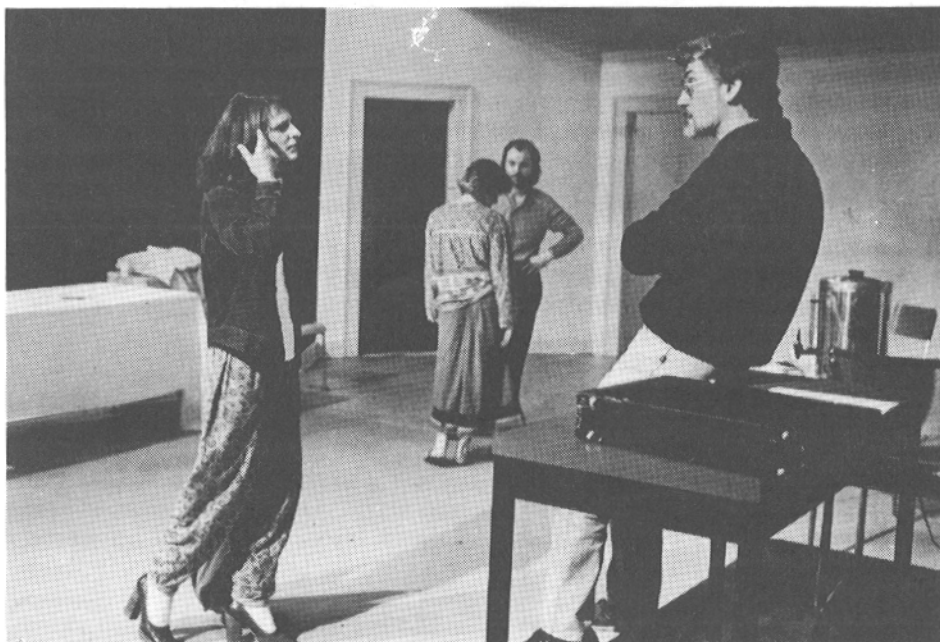
Now in its fifteenth year of operation, the University of Winnipeg Continuing Education Division is embarking on new and exciting programming ventures. Several of its programs are offered to provide a service to the University - for example, Continuing Education now administers the Socialist Education Program; while other programs are developed in response to need expressed by the community.

One such program is Basic Writing Skills for Native Students, which Continuing Education is developing in consultation with the Manitoba Association for Native Languages. "Many native students come to the city, where they must face overwhelming cultural adjustments" said programming officer Maria Turner. "This, when it is combined with academic unpreparedness and a curriculum which virtually ignores the richness of the native student's heritage presents unreasonable odds against the student succeeding in the University." Students entering the first class in September, 1987 have been recruited by MANL and sponsored by their bands.

The course content, which encompasses readings both by and about natives, has been prepared by Dr. Deborah Schnitzer, who has taught in reserve schools as well as at The University of Winnipeg and The University of Manitoba. "We asked her to develop a course that

would be wide-ranging" said Turner. "She has developed a course which will accommodate, on an individual basis, students who enter with a grade 8 skills level or a grade 12 skills level." Dr. Schnitzer has selected readings from poetry, prose, and government documents

which emphasize the importance and beauty of native culture, as well as their historical struggles and political concerns. "The quality of this course is first-rate" said Turner, who has taught University level English. "We're really excited about it."

## May The Force Be With You

The above photo depicts a Winnipeg police officer (sporting a buffalo coat) directing young Winnipeg citizens. This picture, one of approximately 1000 images, is part of the Winnipeg Police Department's photo collection which has been made available to the Western Canada Pictorial Index. With the capable assistance of Sergeant Jack Templeman and a few of his fellow officers, and \$10,000 from the Manitoba Heritage Federation, this pictorial history is now available at the WCPI to those interested in this aspect of Winnipeg's history.

The first time Winnipeg police were seen wearing buffalo coats was in 1875, one year after the establishment of the force. In his book, **Century of Service**, author Robert Hutchison reported that, in 1975, Winnipeg City Council approved the

purchase of five buffalo coats for the force. They were to be tailor made and to cost no more than \$17.00 each.

Alderman John Villiers decided that the city could get a better deal if the coats were purchased ready made from a local firm. Unfortunately, the coats were a sorry looking sight. One year (and several dollars later) the police appeared looking efficient and smart in their new buffalo coats.

During the 1890's, buffalo skins were scarce and the coats were replaced by ankle-length coon coats which, though lighter, were warm and comfortable. Due to the expense of coon skins, the buffalo coat was re-introduced and worn until the appearance of the nylon garb worn by the force today.

## Canada Has National Science Policy

Canada's first national science and technology policy was signed March 12 in Vancouver by federal, provincial and territorial science ministers. The ministers say they are making a "collective commitment" to promote entrepreneurial activity, to recognize the importance of research and development, and to address impediments to R and D in Canada. Among the objectives outlined in the policy are: encouraging the commercialization of technology, ensuring the availability of highly-qualified manpower, promoting basic and applied research, and increasing public awareness of science and technology. Monitoring the implementation of the policy will be the Council of Science and Technology Ministers, which was set up by the science ministers at their last meeting in Montreal Dec. 12. The ministers have set up six working groups to study "areas of action" on issues such as basic research, increasing Canada's R and D effort, and technology transfer. # Board Highlights - March 23, 1987

## Presentation to Board

Dr. Alan Artibise, Director of the Institute of Urban Studies, outlined the Institute's mandate of: encouraging and undertaking independent, multi-disciplinary research on urban and urban-related topics; promoting and engaging in formal and informal education and community outreach programmes; and undertaking mission-oriented and applied research for a variety of clients, including both private and non-profit organizations. Dr. Artibise reported that last year I.U.S. undertook \$350,000 of contract research. In addition, Dr. Artibise described I.U.S. publications and conference programs.

## Communications

Included in the communications was a letter to Dr. Farquhar from the Universities Grants Commission, dated February 26, 1987, informing him of the University's operating grant for 1987-88. Dr. Farquhar explained to the Board that while the provincial government increase was 3.9% over the University's current level of programs and services, since that time the provincial government has brought forth its budget in which the payroll tax increased to 2.25% and sales tax rose to 7%. As a result, the effective increase over our current level of programs and services is just under 2.9%.

## President's Report

### Annual Spring Meeting of AUCC

— Dr. Farquhar reported that the Association of Universities and Colleges of Canada met on March 4-5 in Hamilton. The conference portion of the meeting was devoted to the subject of "Quality in Canadian Public Education: A Critical Assessment", and it included the presentation of several papers. Matters considered at the meeting included: AUCC participation in planning for next fall's National Forum on Post-Secondary Education, federal fiscal reform, matching grants to research councils, growing evidence of movement toward a federal-provincial consensus on a national science policy; establishment of a search committee

to recommend the appointment of a new Executive Director on Allan Gillmore's retirement in October, 1988; employment equity requirements for universities receiving federal contracts in excess of \$200,000 — with the exclusion of most CIDA grants to universities; and the next two AUCC meetings.

**Classics Prize** — Dr. Farquhar reported that one of our Classics students, Pat Simonson, was awarded first prize in the National Junior Greek Sight Translation Competition. This is a national competition for students who have not studied Greek for more than two years and attracts some forty candidates from across the country each year.

### Inter-University Athletics - Final Results

— Dr. Farquhar reported that our inter-university athletic teams completed a remarkable season, with all four of them progressing to the final four in their respective national championships, and two of them placing first. Both the men's and women's basketball teams survived to the semi-finals; and both the men's and women's volleyball teams won their respective national championships — the women for the fifth consecutive year and the men for the second time in a row.

### Meeting with Jake Epp

— On March 14, Dr. Farquhar, Vice-President McCormack, Associate Vice-President Stein, and Dr. George Epp met with Jake Epp and his Assistant to discuss several matters of mutual interest. In particular, they explored the potential for federal government participation in two of the components highlighted in our planning document — the Chair in German-Canadian Studies, and our current exploration with the CBC about cooperation in developing our planned new cultural centre.

## Decisions from March Senate Meeting

At its regular meeting held on March 11, 1987, the University's Senate made the following decisions:

a) approved changes to the pub-

lished procedures to be followed in cases involving academic misconduct in order to make them clearer for the guidance of students;

- b) amended one of the regulations governing the disposition of course instructor evaluations;
- c) approved the establishment of new certificate programs in Marriage and Family Theory, Marriage and Family Therapy, and Records and Information Management; and
- d) approved the awarding of a Certificate in Administrative Management to one student.

## Student/Parent Forums

The Admissions Office arranged three Forums for prospective students and their parents on Feb. 23, 24, and 25. Many faculty and staff members participated actively in making these evenings a success.

A special luncheon and information session was held on December 18 for International Baccalaureate students. Approximately 90 Grade 12 IB students from Kelvin, Miles Macdonell, and Silver Heights high schools were accompanied by 15-20 teachers, counsellors, and administrators.

## Reports of Boards and Committees

### Finance Committee

**Self Insurance Reserve** — The Board approved a recommendation that the \$14,620 one-time refund from the property insurance company be credited to the Self Insurance Reserve in the 1986-87 fiscal year.

**Endowment Investment Policy** — The Board approved the Endowment Investment Policy of 11 March 1987.

**Contract Administration Policy** — The Board approved the Contract Administration Policy of November 1986 and its addendum of 26 February 1987.

**1987 Spring and Summer Fees** — The Board approved a recommendation that the Spring and Summer Session tuition fee for 1987 be set at \$198 and that course fees for Arts and Education and for Science be set at \$23 and \$53 respectively.

**U.W.S.A. Fees** — The Board approved a recommendation that the University be authorized to collect on behalf of the University of Winnipeg Students' Association a fee of \$5.00 per course (\$2.50 per half course) from Spring and Summer Session students effective immediately.

**Continuing Education** — The Board authorized the borrowing of the necessary funds by the Continuing Education Division to finance an expansion of its operations. The Property and Physical Planning Committee had already approved in principle the leasing of space at 491 Portage Avenue to accommodate the projected expansion.

### Property and Physical Planning Committee

The Board approved a recommendation that miscellaneous capital funds be allocated for architectural and engineering designs for stage one of the Campus Development Plan.

### Research and Travel Committee

The Board approved the Research and Travel Committee's recommendation to the Finance Committee that it make a specific allocation to the University's research budget, targeted to international travel awards, in addition to monies currently available for research grants. The recommendation was made as a response to increasing pressures on internal research resources as well as in recognition of the high value placed on international representation by University of Winnipeg faculty.

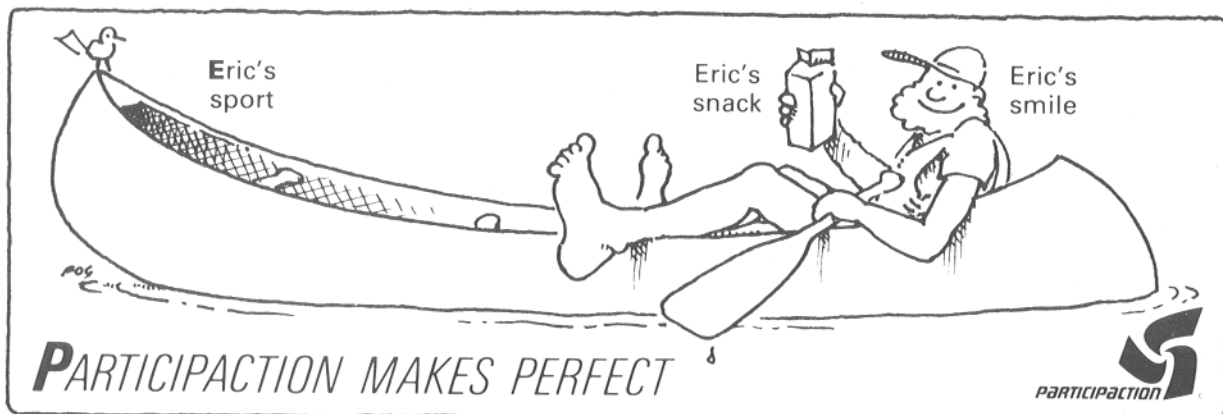
### Additional University Funding for Research

The Board approved a recommendation by Dr. Farquhar to ask the Finance Committee to consider "covering" the decline in general grants this year by an increase in internal research funds, on the condition that this supplementary amount be allocated specifically for the purpose of appointing an academic research officer whose responsibilities would be to promote and facilitate growth in the variety, number, and value of externally-funded research grants and contracts to the University.

### Appointment of Fund-Raising Leader

Dr. Farquhar informed the Board that Jim Carr (currently Director of Community Relations at The University of Winnipeg) has been appointed Executive Director of External Relations, with direct responsibility for the leadership of the University's fund-raising function.

Joan Anderson (currently Coordinator of Events and Conferences) has been reclassified as Director of Public Relations. Eileen Burrows (currently Coordinator of Alumni Affairs) has been reclassified as Director of Alumni Affairs. These changes become effective on April 1, 1987.

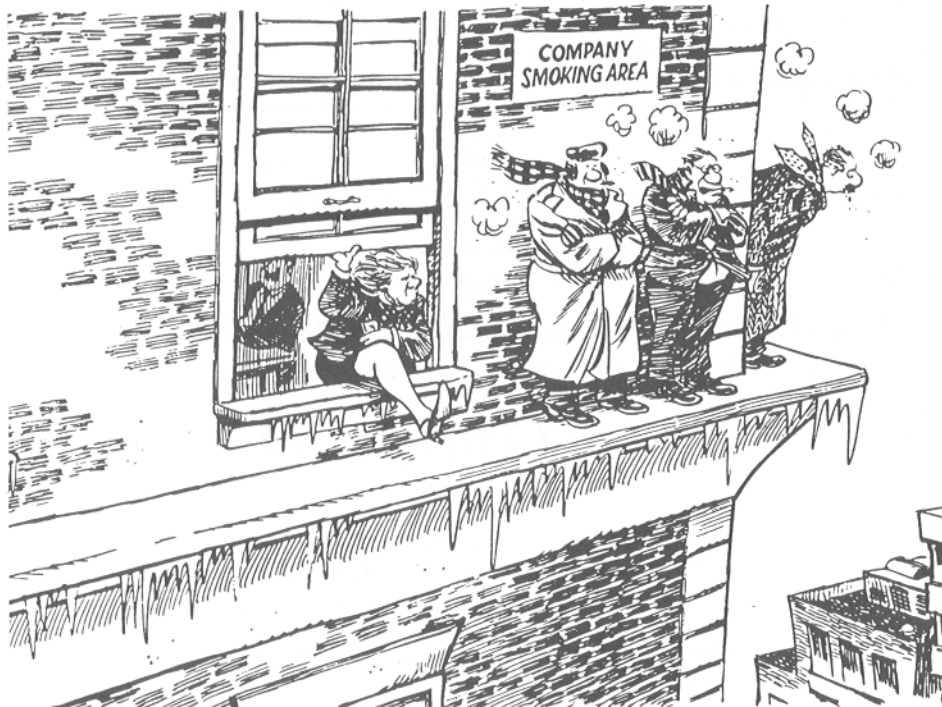

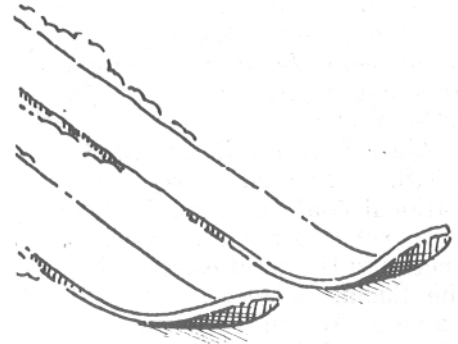
