

## AUTOMATED BANKING COMES TO CAMPUS



The convenience of automated banking has come to campus with a new Canadian Imperial Bank of Commerce Instant Teller located at the main entrance of Centennial Hall. Everyday banking services will be available from 7 a.m. to 11 p.m. daily except on statutory holidays.

Canadian Imperial Bank of Commerce customers may make deposits

and withdrawals, transfer funds between accounts, pay bills (at no charge) and obtain balances of personal and Visa accounts.

As this machine is part of INTERAC, a network of thousands of automated teller machines across Canada, cardholders from other financial institutions may make withdrawals from their personal accounts for a nominal fee.

## CAPITAL CAMPAIGN GATHERS MOMENTUM

Sydney Spivak has been appointed as the Chairman of The University of Winnipeg's Silver Jubilee Fund-Raising Campaign. Spivak is currently recruiting key volunteers who will provide leadership to the campaign.

The University has also retained Ketchum Canada to assist with the implementation of the campaign. Two of their most experienced and successful consultants, Hugh Allison and Norman Guilfoyle, have already arrived on campus.

The success of this campaign is especially important in light of Education Minister Jerry Storie's announcement of a \$20 million Universities Development Fund which links provincial support for capital projects to the fund-raising efforts of the four universities.

In his July announcement, Storie said, "The Manitoba government strongly supports the universities' initiative in securing funds from the private sector, alumni and the general public. The establishment of the Manitoba Universities Development Fund will substantially improve their ability to raise funds from groups who

otherwise may not have contributed."

The first \$1 million of this funding has already been allocated to the universities' miscellaneous capital grants for 1987-88. The remaining \$19 million will be made available over five years, beginning in 1988-89, to match funds raised privately by the universities.

"The government anticipates that, with the exception of previously announced capital projects and support for the ongoing maintenance of the universities, this \$20 million is expected to be the province's contribution to the capital funding of the universities during this five-year period," said Storie.

Projects eligible for funding include major capital replacement projects that do not involve additional operating costs, renovations, especially to teaching areas, endowment of institutes, chairs, fellowships or scholarships and allocations for scientific equipment, library books or other teaching materials.

The initial allocations for the four Manitoba universities are as follows:

- \$11 million to the University of Manitoba, to be disbursed on a one-to-

one ratio, with provincial funds matching every dollar donated.

- \$3.5 million to The University of Winnipeg. In recognition of the centennial anniversary of Wesley College, the first million will be disbursed by matching funds raised from private sources on a two-to-one ratio. The remaining \$2.5 million will be matched on a one-to-one ratio.

- \$2 million to Brandon University on a 1.5-to-one ratio.

- \$750,000 to the College Universitaire de St. Boniface on a two-to-one ratio.

The remaining \$1.75 million will be held in reserve to allow flexibility in meeting unanticipated needs as they arise. The Universities Grants Commission and the universities will negotiate specific projects to which this grant support will be applied.

University of Winnipeg President Robin Farquhar welcomed the announcement. "I believe the recognition of our claim for a \$1 million 'significant anniversary grant,' which is incorporated within our provision from the Universities Development Fund, indicates the value of active lobbying on our part," he said.

## POLICIES ON RACISM & SEXUAL HARASSMENT APPROVED

The University of Winnipeg's policies on Racism and Sexual Harassment have been approved by the Board of Regents and the Senate and are now in effect.

The University's policy on racism states that the dignity of each individual, regardless of ethnic or national origin, must be recognized and respected. The University abhors racism or any manifestation of racial intolerance or discrimination.

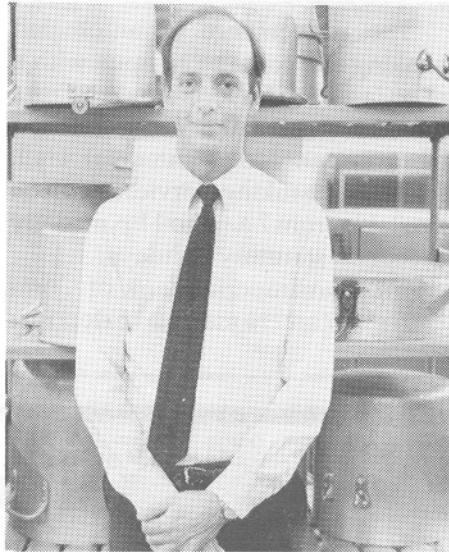
While every effort should be undertaken to resolve allegedly racist incidents in an amicable manner, an Investigations Committee may be convened to investigate complaints of racism and, if necessary, recommend disciplinary actions. The committee will consist of the Vice-President (Administration), the Vice-President (Academic) and the Dean of Arts and Science and will meet as required.

It is also the policy of The University of Winnipeg that every employee and student has the right to be free from sexual harassment.

Leading literature in this area indicates prevention is the best tool for dealing with sexual harassment. The literature recommends that employers inform staff of their right to raise the issue and the procedures to use in making a complaint.

Again, The University encourages every reasonable effort to resolve complaints of sexual harassment in an informal, amicable and prompt way. However, a President's Advisory Committee will be formed to deal with not only complaints, but also prevention of sexual harassment. The committee will be composed of two members of The University of Winnipeg Faculty Association, two support staff members from The University of Winnipeg Association of Employees Supporting Education Services (AESES), two students from The University of Winnipeg Students Assoc. and two administrators/managers chosen by the President.

## VERSA FOOD PLANS CHANGES



This year the taste buds of students and staff will be treated to pizza-by-the-slice, submarine sandwiches and speciality coffees. And to add a bit of excitement to mealtime, there will be scratch-and-win contests, prize giveaways and a "coffee club" offering a special price-break on pastries.

These are just some of the plans of Versa Food Services, recently awarded the contract to operate Riddell Hall Cafeteria, Lockhart Buffeteria and Centennial Buffeteria. According to Director of Food Services Gary Perry, Versa is the largest food contracting service in Canada

and has contracts with the University of Manitoba, Misericordia General Hospital, Winnipeg Transit and the Winnipeg Free Press, just to name a few.

Along with several menu changes, Perry says Versa plans some re-decorating. Both Centennial and Riddell cafeterias will receive "giant face-lifts," Centennial over the Christmas break and Riddell next spring. He hopes the renovations will create more space in the service areas relieving the congestion that arises at peak periods.

Perry says he is "really looking forward to the challenges of serving The University of Winnipeg." Believing that the customer comes first, he welcomes suggestions and hopes that students and staff will be receptive to his proposed changes.

For now, Perry says, hours of operation will remain the same for the three cafeterias: Riddell Hall Cafeteria, 8 a.m. - 4 p.m., Lockhart Buffeteria, 8 a.m. - 3:30 p.m. and Centennial Buffeteria, 9:30 a.m. - 10 p.m.

## U OF W TO RECEIVE SHARE OF OPERATING GRANT

Manitoba universities will share a supplementary operating grant of \$1.2 million in 1987-88. The move brings the province's operating grant increase for 1987-88 to \$8.7 million or 5.3 per cent over the previous year.

The University of Winnipeg's portion of the grant will be \$275,000. About \$150,000 will be directed to support the Child Care Training Program with the remainder being unrestricted in its use.

According to President Robin Farquhar, The University will use the rest of the funds to meet some of its most desperate needs.

For example, part of the grant could be used to cover the increased salaries of Library and Admissions Office casual employees who recently joined the Support Staff union.

Farquhar notes that the supplement should not be allocated to recurring expenditures, since this year's grant may not be included in ongoing funding.

Recommendations for the allocation of this supplementary funding will be made this fall.

## FULTON APPOINTED CHAIR OF WOMEN'S STUDIES



The Universities of Manitoba and Winnipeg have named Keith Louise Fulton as the first Chair of Women's Studies for the Prairie Region and the Northwest Territories.

The Chair of Women's Studies, one of five regional chairs partially funded through the Secretary of State Endowment Assistance Program, has been jointly awarded to the two universities on the basis of their unique proposal to combine academic excellence with community outreach. The Chair is an endowed position which will provide a focal point for teaching and research in the universities.

"I was deeply pleased and excited (about the three-year appointment) because the work is so real to me and has been such a part of my life. To be given the opportunity to do this work in an official capacity was really gratifying to me," says Fulton.

Fulton graduated from The University of Western Ontario with a M.A. (1969) and Ph.D. (1980) in English. She completed her undergraduate work at Stanford University. During her academic career, Fulton has been awarded a Social Sciences and Humanities Research Council (SSHRC) Independent Scholar grant (1986-87), a Canada Council Fellowship (1969-73) and a Province of Ontario Graduate Fellowship (1968-70).

Her numerous publications include "Leaving the Earth," an introduction to the art of Wanda Koop, "Nellie

McClung Theatre: A Political Act," and "Women's Voices: Being Heard and Listening to Ourselves."

Fulton has taught English courses at both the Universities of Manitoba and Winnipeg. As an Assistant Professor at the University of Manitoba, she taught two courses in Women's Studies in 1986.

Fulton is a member of the Canadian Women's Studies Association and Canadian Research Institute for the Advancement of Women as well as several other associations.

## SYMPOSIUM ON NATURE AND CONCEPT OF GOD

A half-day symposium on the nature and concept of God will be held September 27 at 1:30 in Centennial Hall (Room 3C00). This symposium is being co-sponsored by the Faculty of Theology, University of Winnipeg and the Ahmadiyya Muslim Community.

Dr. Harold King, Dean of Theology at The University of Winnipeg, will be the moderator. The theme speaker will be Dr. James Pankratz of the Mennonite Brethren Bible College who will present an overview of the subject.
