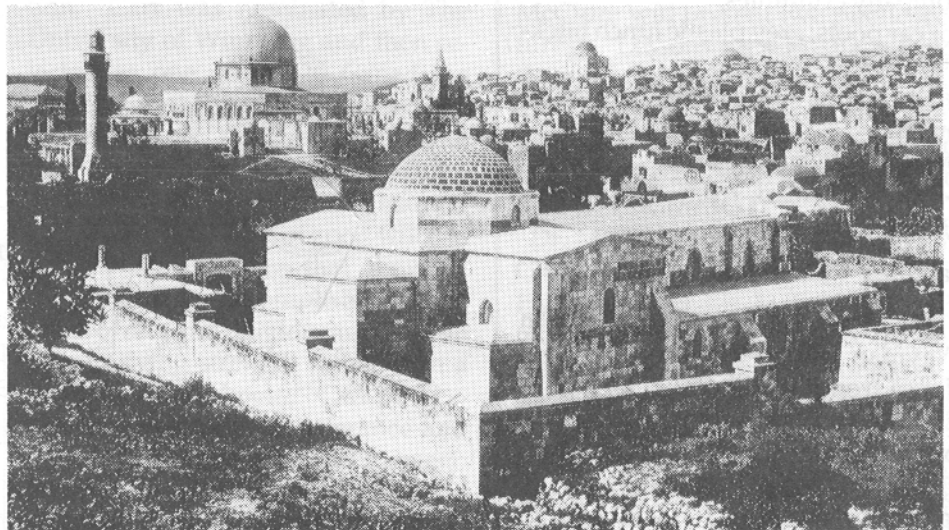
## A PHOTOGRAPHIC JOURNEY OF THE HOLY LAND

See over 100 years of change captured in photographs at "The Holy Land Then and Now" on exhibit Oct. 4 - 30 in Gallery 1C03.

This display parallels a series of nineteenth century photographs of 45 sites in the Holy Land with photographs of the same sites taken a century later.

With the invention of the photographic process in 1839, photographers eagerly followed the traditional route of the Christian pilgrims to take pictures of monuments, shrines, markets, streets and biblical landscapes. Despite the cumbersome equipment, hostile climate and suspicious natives, they left a rich legacy of strikingly beautiful visual documents.

Some of these early photographers represented in the exhibit include Zangaki Freres, James McDonald,



Francis Frith and Maison Bonfils.

Nearly 150 years later, Daniel Tassel of Lexington, Massachusetts, went to Israel to photograph some of these same places. Out of hundreds of pictures, about fifty were selected for the exhibition. Presented in pairs, the old and the new images appear side by side, and while some of the sites are hardly recognizable, others seem to have changed little with the passage of time.

Mount Carmel, Rachel's Tomb, Bethlehem including the Church of the Nativity, Damascus Gate, Church of

the Holy Sepulchre, Via Dolorosa, Dome of the Rock and Hurva Synagogue are just some of the sites photographed then and now.

The exhibition was organized by the Semitic Museum, Harvard University, curated by Nitza Rosovsky and is being circulated in Canada by the International Programme of the National Museums of Canada.

Well-known Canadian poet Tom  
Wayman will be the Writer in Resi-  
dence from Oct. 18 - 31, 1987. The  
English Department has planned two  
public readings during his stay in-  
cluding one at The University of  
Winnipeg on Oct. 21 at 2:30 p.m. in  
Room 2C14.

Born in Hawkesbury, Ontario in  
1945 and educated at the University of  
British Columbia and the University  
of California, Wayman is Canada's  
most celebrated "work poet." Among  
his books are *Waiting for Wayman*  
(1973), *Money and Rain: Tom Wayman  
Live!* (1975), *Free Time* (1977), *Living on  
the Ground: Tom Wayman Country*  
(1980), *The Nobel Prize Acceptance  
Speech* (1981) and *Counting the Hours:  
City Poems* (1983). Wayman has also  
edited several collections of poetry  
and written a book of criticism, *Inside  
Job: Essays on the New Work Writing*  
(1983).

## GOVERNMENT BOOSTS UNIVERSITY RESEARCH

The Honourable Frank Oberle, Min-  
ister of State (Science and Technol-  
ogy) announced that the federal gov-  
ernment is strengthening its support  
for university research with an \$11  
million increase in matching funding  
for the granting councils for 1987-88  
and \$7 million for microelectronics re-  
search in Canadian universities.

The \$18 million is part of the \$100  
million in new funds the federal gov-  
ernment recently announced it would  
be providing for initiatives under  
InnovAction, the Canadian Strategy  
for Science and Technology.

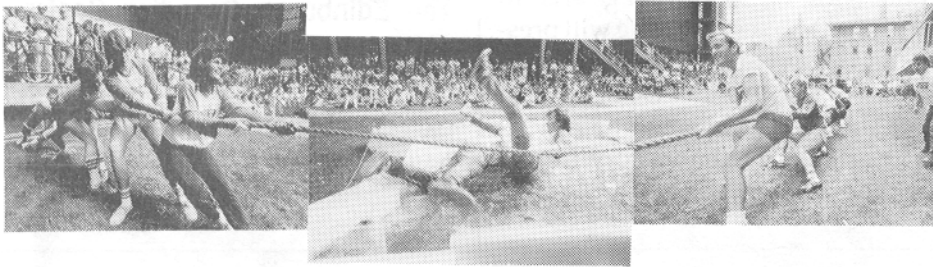
Minister Oberle praised industry  
and universities for their success in  
making the matching funding policy  
work: "We know that private sector  
contributions will far exceed levels  
initially established by the govern-

ment for this year. The action we are  
taking today is designed to further  
encourage the growing research part-  
nership between the private sector  
and universities," Oberle added.

The matching funding policy was  
first announced by the government in  
the February, 1986 federal budget as  
part of a five-year financial plan for  
the support of university research.  
Under the policy, the federal govern-  
ment matches private sector contribu-  
tions to university research with  
equal funding to the councils.

The Natural Sciences and Engineer-  
ing Research Council (NSERC) will  
receive \$6 million for 1987-88, to in-  
crease its matching funding to \$25.4  
million. Federal funds for NSERC this  
year total \$338 million, compared to  
some \$324 million in 1986-87.

## CARR ATTENDS COMMONWEALTH CONFERENCE

Executive Director of External Relations Jim Carr was one of 73 delegates who participated in The Commonwealth Conference for Young Leaders. The Conference was held in Ottawa from Sept. 6 - 12.

During the week, delegates from 37 Commonwealth countries examined the challenge of leadership in the modern Commonwealth. The program focussed on leadership development, cross-cultural communication, the resolution of conflict, and the potential for private and public sector cooperation towards economic and social development.

The Conference brought together dynamic young men and women who have demonstrated a capacity for leadership and innovation in the early stages of their careers. These individuals represented an impressive combination of organizations and sectors in society including government, business, labour, media, voluntary agencies, religious bodies, and academia.

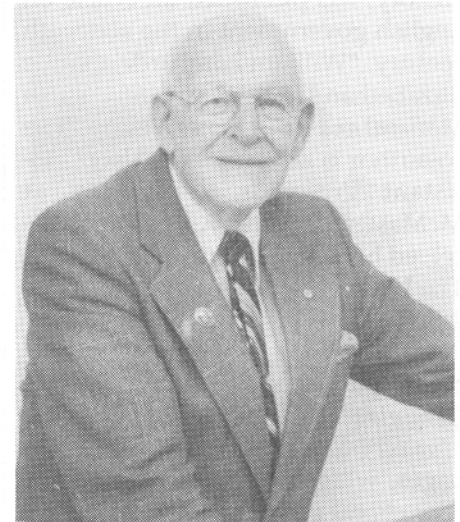
Conference delegates were nominated and sponsored by an organization. Carr was nominated by The University of Winnipeg and then selected as one of the 20 Canadians chosen to attend. He described the experience as "one of life's most memorable."

"During the conference, I learned that women and men of good will can accomplish anything that they set their minds to accomplish. Differences of race and religion must be seen as a unifying strength rather than a debilitating weakness," Carr said.

"I also learned that tolerance and patience are more powerful than ego and pretense. And I learned that in spite of all of the superficial differences that characterize the human race, we share a common hunger to be free."

The Commonwealth Conference for Young Leaders was the initiative of the Royal Commonwealth Society (Ottawa) with the co-sponsorship of the Canadian Institute for International Peace and Security, the Paterson Centre for International Programs (Carleton University), and the Canadian International Development Agency. Additional support was received from the Secretary of State for External Affairs (Canada) and the Commonwealth Secretariat.

## McCLURE WILL SPEAK AT NEWCOMBE LECTURE



As part of the Newcombe Family Lectureship on Religion and the Human Condition, Dr. Robert B. McClure will present two public lectures: "Lessons for Christians from the Non-Christian Religions" on Oct. 21 at 7 p.m. and "Modern Changes in the Old Non-Christian Religions" on Oct. 22 at 1 p.m. Both lectures will be held in Theatre 3C00.

Dr. McClure spent his childhood in China with his missionary parents. He completed his high school and medical training in Toronto, but returned to China where he worked as a surgeon until 1948. McClure then worked as a surgeon with Arab refugees in Palestine and in India. In 1968, he retired from mission work and was elected Moderator of the United Church of Canada. After volunteering for work in Borneo, Peru, and Africa, McClure retired in Toronto.

The Newcombe Lectureship was established by Rev. Charles R. Newcombe after he retired from The University of Winnipeg in 1981. He sold his remarkable personal library to the University library and then generously donated the money he received to the University in order to create a fund for the annual lectureship.

- **Dr. Wesley M. Stevens**, Professor of History, has published an article on English government in the sixteenth century: "William Lambarde and the Elizabethan Polity," in *Studies in Medieval and Renaissance History*. The co-author is Dr. James D. Alsop, Assistant Professor of History at McMaster University. Dr. Alsop received his B.A. Honours in History at The University of Winnipeg.

- **Kay Stone**, English Department, is the 1987-88 president of the Folklore Studies Association of Canada. She presented a paper on Cree Traditional Tales at the annual meeting of the society in Hamilton last June. She also offered workshops in Sioux Narrows, Ont. in June and August, and made a

series of presentations at a week-long conference on performing arts in Windsor this past July. She will present academic papers at the American Folklore Society in October (Albuquerque, N.M.) and at the American Society for Ethnohistory in November (Berkeley, Calif.).

So far, twelve teams have their coaches, cheerleaders and mascots ready to help them get through the mounds of red tape. Teams such as

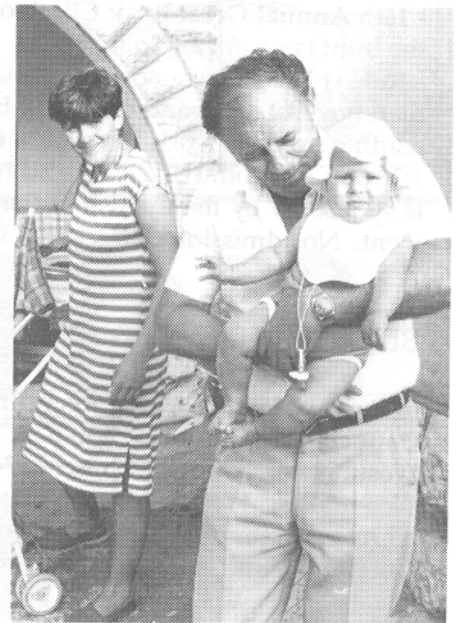
