UNIVERSITY AND SMALL BUSINESS: A PARTNER-SHIP FOR SUCCESS


Is your small business big enough for a computer? Is a handshake enough to establish a partnership? What opportunities are there for small business overseas?

These are just some of the questions that will be answered during The University of Winnipeg's "Creating Opportunities for Success," a program for small business which will be held from Oct. 27 to 30 at the new Continuing Education facilities, 491 Portage Ave.

The event recognizes national Small Business Week and has been designed to strengthen the "partnership" between the downtown University and the many small businesses in Manitoba.

"We want to show small business that we are interested in them and consider them a vital part of the community," says Sohrab Abizadeh, Chairman of the University's Planning Committee for Small Business Week. "During the week, we would like to familiarize them with the facilities and courses the University has to offer."

But like any good "partnership," there has to be an exchange of ideas and the University is ready to listen. "We want to ensure a two-way com-



munication between the community and the University. We have to keep in touch with what's happening in the business world," emphasizes Abizadeh.

This aim for two-way communication is reflected in the format of the program. "I think the panel discussions will be particularly attractive to businesspeople. And, after each session, we hope the audience will participate with their own questions and comments," Abizadeh says.

The participants themselves represent both the academic and the business community. Abizadeh explains that speakers, chairman, moderators and panelists were invited from both sectors because he didn't want to see this event turn into "just an academic exercise that didn't reflect what is really happening in the outside world."

They will cover four key topics: Mar-

keting, Computer Technology, Communications and Overseas Opportunities. Some of the featured speakers/panelists include Henry Armstrong of Henry Armstrong's Instant Printing, Doug Jennings of IBM Canada, Bruce Johnson of the Rorie Street Marble Club as well as John Law, Vice-President (Administration) and Wendy Josephson, Psychology both of The University of Winnipeg.

Abizadeh said the Planning Committee members themselves represent a wide-range of fields and believes the success of this event has been due largely to their enthusiasm, abilities and commitment to the program.

FIRST VOLUME OF FUR TO FARMS COMPLETE

The Western Canada Pictorial Index has completed the first volume of *Fur To Farms*, a collection of 3,400 photos illustrating the history of agriculture in Western Canada from the riverlot plots of the Selkirk settlers to present modern-day farms.

Copies of images from a wide assortment of places including research stations, grain companies, libraries, newspaper files and private individuals are included.

A second volume is now underway. The Index aims to complete the agricultural history by duplicating approximately 10,000 images.


