ASSOCIATION ALUMNI ANNOUNCES ENTRANCE SCHOLARSHIP WINNERS

The Alumni Association will host a reception for the recipients of the Alumni Entrance Scholarship Program (A.E.S.P.) on Nov. 24 at the Faculty and Staff Club.

The program, established by the Alumni Association, recognizes Manitoba high school students who have combined outstanding academic achievement with significant contributions to the school and community. A.E.S.P. encourages these students to pursue their post-secondary education at The University of Winnipeg in the program of their choice. Each scholarship is valued at \$1,500 and is disbursed at the rate of \$300 per full course over one academic year (or five full-course-equivalents, which may be taken over a period of 2 years).

The 1987-88 recipients are Kevin Dearing, Birgrit Dotzlaw, Diane Keddie, Michelle Lajzerowicz, Rosemary Li, Stella Loscerbo and Christine Szymanski all from Winnipeg, Carla Bridge from Hamiota and Jason Dyck from Selkirk.

In 1973, the Alumni Association initiated the A.E.S. Program as a means to provide one \$500 entrance scholarship from each of the graduating classes

from the pre-30s to date. It provided a unique way by which The University of Winnipeg graduates could contribute to the tradition of academic excellence at the University.

The continued support of the alumni classes has enabled approximately 600 students to receive an award applicable to their tuition fees. Very recently, however, it was recognized that the effects of inflation upon the value of the awards had to be considered.

In an effort to revitalize the Alumni Entrance Scholarship Program and maintain the spirit of the Alumni's commitment to outstanding academic standards and achievement, the value of the scholarships was increased. Now, nine students receive scholarships of \$1,500 each, whereas in the past, 49 students were awarded scholarships of \$600 each. This increase in value makes the Alumni Entrance Scholarship Program the most prestigious entrance award program in the province.

The upcoming reception at the Faculty and Staff Club provides an opportunity for dedicated alumni to express their interest and commitment to the University and to visibly show their support for the students who are working toward their university degrees.


TOPPER WINS FELLOW-SHIP FOR EXCELLENCE IN TEACHING

David Topper of the History Department was one of 10 professors in Canada to receive a 1987 3M teaching fellowship, an award sponsored by 3M Canada Inc. and the Society for Teaching and Learning in Higher Education.

Topper was selected from among 85 nominations submitted from 33 universities.

The fellowships, offered for the first time in 1986, are intended to recognize excellence in university-level teaching as judged by students and colleagues. The award also recognizes the fellows' commitment to improving the quality of teaching within their own institutions and beyond.

Topper was pleased that he was selected for the fellowship and thinks it reflects well on The University of Winnipeg. "This award is good for the University," he said. "Because we so often take a back seat to other schools in Canada, winning this fellowship is good national recognition for the University." Along with the other fellows, Topper was rewarded with a citation and presentation from 3M at a special seminar on teaching and learning in Chateau Montebello in Quebec last week.

Topper said he enjoyed the opportunity to talk about teaching with colleagues and was fascinated by the wide-range of personalities, teaching philosophies and techniques of the group.

Topper has been at The University of Winnipeg for 17 years and is currently teaching History of Art and History of Science. He said that through trial and error, he has developed his own philosophy. "I believe the interest and enthusiasm of a teacher can inspire students, but I also think that students ultimately teach themselves. The teacher's role is to guide his/her students," Topper said.

Donor attendance at the University's Red Cross Blood Donor Clinic increased by 26 percent over the last Clinic held on campus, said Glyniss Burkett, Assistant Manager (City) of Blood Donor Recruitment.

A MESSAGE FROM THE PRESIDENT'S ADVISORY COMMITTEE ON SEXUAL HARASSMENT

It is the policy of The University of Winnipeg that every employee and student has the right to be free from sexual harassment.

WHAT IS SEXUAL HARASSMENT?

Sexual Harassment is defined as unwelcome sexual advances, requests for sexual favours, and other verbal or physical conduct of a sexual nature when:

- a) such conduct has the purpose or effect of unreasonably interfering with an individual's academic or work performance or creating an intimidating, hostile or offensive environment for learning or working; or
- b) submission to such conduct is made either explicitly or implicitly a term or condition of an individual's employment, academic status or academic accreditation; or
- c) submission to, or rejection of, such conduct by an individual is used as the basis for evaluations, recommendations, or decisions affecting any term or condition of an individual's employment, academic status or academic accreditation.

WHAT TO DO

If you believe that you have a complaint of sexual harassment you are encouraged to make a direct request of the harasser that the offensive behaviour or actions cease. If the request is unsuccessful, or if such a request seems inappropriate or uncomfortable for you to carry out, you may lodge a complaint with any member of the President's Advisory Committee on Sexual Harassment.

If you have been directly affected by sexual harassment or have reasonable cause to believe that harassment has taken place, you may lodge a complaint or concern with any member of the Committee. Any complaint or concern should be lodged within three (3) calendar months of the alleged incident(s). Every complaint or concern will be handled with strict confidentiality.

DISCIPLINARY ACTION

Recommended disciplinary action for offenders may involve the suspension or dismissal of any employee or student of the University.

CERTIFICATE PROGRAM WINS INTERNATIONAL RECOGNITION

The local chapter of The Association of Records Managers and Administrators (ARMA) has won international recognition for their help in creating the University's new Certificate Program in Records and Information Management offered by the Continuing Education Division.

The establishment of the certificate program was one of the main reasons the Winnipeg chapter of ARMA won the Small Chapter of the Year Award, says Linda Simpson, the University's Director of Records and Member of the Year for the local association.

"It's a real tribute to the University to have one of its certificate programs recognized by ARMA," says Simpson. ARMA, a non-profit professional association, has over 115 chapters in the United States, Canada and Puerto Rico as well as members throughout the world. The association is dedicated to the research, development, and exchange of ideas and knowledge in the area of records management.

The University's certificate program, approved by the Senate in

March and offered for the first time in September, teaches students how to handle and manage business paperwork and other recorded information.

But this means much more than folders and filing cabinets in today's information age, states Simpson. Now, a manager must be knowledgeable in not only traditional methods, but also newer technologies such as automated systems, integrated networks and micrographics.

"Records management was born out of the computer age," Simpson says. "We need to know how to access, manage and manipulate a great deal of information to meet the needs of an organization."

Simpson adds that records management is needed for just about every organization. Large and small businesses, government, educational institutions and charity groups can all benefit from learning more efficient and cost-effective ways to record, update and store records and information.
