Mindscape, the first literary magazine published by the Collegiate Division of The University of Winnipeg, is an anthology of the writing of Grade

11 and 12 students.

A committee of six students (May Chan, Carol Hutchison, Brian James Morgan, Andrea Ritter, Leigh Sutherland, Sam Wiseman) with teacher advisors Francis Bird and Phyllis Webster have compiled 80 pages of poetry (in French and English), prose, and science essays which they hope

will fully represent the ideas, interests, obsessions and talents of the Collegiate community.

A long search resulted in the title Mindscape, a word intended to suggest both a physical landscape and an interior "scape" of the mind. The covers, designed by Leigh Sutherland-See Collegiate Magazine asia:

UNIVERSITY OF WIN-NIPEG ON THE SHOP-PING LIST OF HIGH SCHOOL STUDENTS

The University of Winnipeg was on display last week to over 22,000 high school students shopping for career-planning information at the eighth annual Career Symposium.

The symposium, sponsored by the Manitoba School Counsellors Association, was held at the Winnipeg Convention Centre Mar. 1 to 3.


According to John Friesen, Director of Admissions, The University of Winnipeg's presence at the symposium is important because it reaches a large number of prospective students.

"It's a form of advertising for us and a way to reach the community at large," he explained. "We have the opportunity to get general information into the hands of a lot of people."

But the magnitude of the symposium has its drawbacks too. The University's booth was just one out of 125 exhibitions set up by universities, colleges, government departments and industrial, commercial and professional organizations.

Friesen said that while the event is good for distributing general information, it is not a good setting for a student to actually plan his/her program.

"We can only hope the display will peak a student's interest enough to come to the University to get more specific information and guidance," he said.

In addition, Friesen believes the symposium doesn't have the right atmosphere to promote The University of Winnipeg's strongest selling points - its small size, personal attention and quality programs. He thinks that classroom presentations in high schools, personal counselling and tours are better ways for highlighting

these qualities.

Friesen is already thinking about next year's display. He hopes to offer the many students who browse in the symposium a more "hands-on" type of display. For example, he would like to have a user-friendly computer program that offers information on University of Winnipeg programs. Other ideas include shows or demonstrations performed by various departments such as the Theatre Department or Science Department.


She has produced a Dutch version of The Stone Angel and A Jest of God and hopes to eventually translate the entire Manawaka Series.

UNIVERSITY HOSTS BACH FESTIVAL LEC-TURES

The 10th annual Winnipeg Bach Festival will begin its program with two free public lectures at The University of Winnipeg: "The Sounds of Early Music" on Mar. 21 and "The Music of the Sons of J.S. Bach" on Mar. 22. Both lectures begin at 8 p.m. in Room 3C00. The University is proud to be one of the hosts for this unique Canadian festival. While there have been larger, "one-shot" Bach Festivals for the Bach Tricentenary, only in Winnipeg does the Festival continue year after year, steadily building its base and bringing an understanding of Bach's genius to an ever widening public.

Three concerts have been scheduled during the festival. The first one on Mar. 25 at 8 p.m. in Holy Trinity Anglican Church features the Tafelmusik Baroque Orchestra performing the works of Corelli, Telemann, Vivaldi, Handel and Bach.

Tafelmusik means table or banqueting music. The orchestra's name was inspired by three volumes of Tafelmusik written by Georg Philipp Telemann, one of the most prolific composers of the baroque period.

Performing on original instruments, the Tafelmusik Orchestra has delighted audiences and earned praise from critics across the Americas and in Europe for its ability to recapture the spirit and vitality of baroque music.


The second concert on Mar. 26 at 8 p.m. in the Mennonite Brethren Collegiate Institute Concert Hall is entitled "Chamber Music of the Sons of Bach" and will be performed by the Manitoba Trio and the University of Manitoba School of Music.

The famous Bach musical lineage neither began nor ended with Johann Sebastian. Several of his predecessors were musically inclined as were many who followed him including his sons and nephews. The Bach Festival's Saturday evening concert will consist of chamber music written by three of J.S. Bach's sons as well as one of his grandsons.

The festival will close on Mar. 27 at 8 p.m. in the Holy Trinity Anglican Church with Artistic Director William

Baerg conducting the Winnipeg Singers and members of the Manitoba Chamber Orchestra in J.S. Bach's monumental "Mass in B minor." The Winnipeg Singers is an ensemble of 24 individually accomplished choral musicians. They are recipients of the Canada Council's 1986 Healey Willan Award for a long-standing tradition of choral excellence and are rapidly becoming "the premiere chamber choir of the Prairies."

by inches, and then triumphed in the extra end as James Bedford's draw, under similar circumstances, rolled four inches too far after rubbing Steski's shot stone. The Steski rink thus captured the trophy which their father, Gerry Steski, had won four times in the past.

Norman Loat defeated Ray Mikulik to win the third-place playoff game, and Carol Mikulik won the second event over the Brent Todd rink. Third event honours went to Dave Anderson's entry which triumphed over Anita Kroeger's Continuing Education rink in the final game.

The improved quality of play was much in evidence in all games and many close matches were played throughout the day. It is obvious that many of the University community's curlers are becoming increasingly skilled at the game.


