FRAGILE BATTLEFIELD PAINTINGS REQUIRED RESTORATION AND SPECIAL CARE

The 40 battlefield paintings in No Man's Land, currently on display in the University's Gallery 1C03, have survived a hardship of their own. Thanks to the National Archives of Canada and The War Amputations of Canada, the collection has weath-

ered deterioration due to poor quality of materials and age.

The National Archives restored the fragile paintings by Canadian artist Mary Riter Hamilton, and The War Amputations of Canada helped ensure that the collection is well-preserved in its current home, Gallery 1C03.

The paintings in *No Man's Land* were produced in the battlefields after World War I. Hamilton, who suffered incredible hardship while attempting to record the horror of war for her fellow Canadians.

used whatever materials were available on the battlefields. Often these materials were of poor quality or were used in combinations which degrade quickly, such as oil on paper. Most of her donated works were then placed in storage for more than five decades.

For this show, conservators at the National Archives spent countless hours stabilizing and cleaning the artworks. A total of 23 have been mounted in custom-built

UNIVERSITY GRADUATE WELCOMED BACK FROM EL SALVADOR

"Welcome back, Karen," read the banner hung in the second floor of The University of Winnipeg Athletic Centre.

Karen Ridd, a University of Winnipeg graduate and former Lady Wesmen basketball star, returned to campus for a news conference on Nov. 24 to speak about her arrest in El Salvador and to urge Canadians to press for improved human rights in the war-torn country.

To a large crowd of media and members of the University community, Ridd said she felt "tremendously happy" to be home

and grateful for the support she received from Canadians through her ordeal.

"But I also feel the pain and irony of speaking here when I know what's happening in El Salvador to friends and others," the human rights worker said. According to Ridd, Salvadorans can be held in prison without charge for up to two weeks and are often subject to torture, beatings and threats during their detention.

Ridd recounted her story of how she and several other human rights workers were arrested early the morning of Nov. 20 by Salvadoran authorities. After being assaulted and threatened for almost 12 hours, Ridd was informed of her release just before the 6 p.m. curfew that same day.

But she surprised both her captors and the Canadian diplomats who flew in to assist her by refusing to leave the prison unless her Colombian colleague was also permitted to go. Ridd's demand was met and the two women, both volunteers with Peace Brigades International, were released together.

In an emotional reunion, the two embraced and Ridd believes that the soldiers,

the same men who torture many prisoners, were touched by their camaraderie. "At least for a moment, I think they understood the human connection," she said.

Ridd refused to describe her actions as brave. "I don't feel extraordinary," she said. "I was inspired by the courage of the Salvadoran people who must face this every day."

She called on the Canadian government as well as individuals to protest the human rights violations occurring in El Salvador. "Your actions make a difference," said Ridd. "I know this personally. Your response got me out of there - and my friend too."

In an interview following the news con-

ference, University President Marsha Hanen commented, "We are proud of Karen, not only for her courage, but also for what she's doing. Her concern and her actions for truth, openness, justice and human compassion are admirable."

Dr. Hanen compared Ridd's role as a witness to human rights violations in El Salvador to an important traditional role of universities. "Universities are also seen as a threat and are often the first institutions to be closed when repressive regimes come to power. Canadian universities are very fortunate to have the freedom to inquire and criticize."

PROFESSOR EMERITUS CELEBRATES 10TH ANNIVERSARY OF PAINTING EXHIBITIONS

An exhibition/sale of paintings by Kenneth Hamilton, Professor Emeritus of Theology and Literature at The University of Winnipeg, will be on display Dec. 4 - 8 in the Library Mezzanine. This is the 10th anniversary of these annual shows. Proceeds go to the University Library.

Born in Worthing, England, in 1917, Hamilton was ordained in 1943 to the Congregational ministry and served in two pastorates before coming to Canada in 1951.

Until 1958 he was minister of the Elmsdale United Church in the Maritime Conference of the United Church of Canada. In the same year, he was appointed Assistant Professor of Theology and Church History in the Faculty of Theology at The University of Winnipeg, then United College. He became full professor in 1968, transferring soon after to the Department of Religious Studies in the Faculty of Arts. He retired in 1982.

Hamilton holds degrees from the University of London - B.A., M.A. (English); Dalhousie University - M.A. (Philosophy); Pine Hill Divinity Hall - Th.M.; and University of Toronto (Emmanuel College) - Th.D. In 1975 he received an Honorary D.D. from the University of Toronto.

He is the author of 16 books and over 100 articles as well as two radio scripts for CBC. He has lectured widely in Canada, the United States and Britain.

His wife, Alice Hamilton, is Professor Emeritus of English at The University of Winnipeg. The Hamiltons have written five books in tandem and many other published pieces. They also continue to be involved in research, writing and guest-lecturing. Kenneth Hamilton's new book is expected to be published in 1990.


micro-climates contained in the frames and backings. These ensure that each work travels and is displayed in constant relative humidity.

To borrow the works, The University of Winnipeg had to guarantee that its gallery met the highest environmental standards. Thanks to the generosity of The War Amputations of Canada, the University's Gallery 1C03 purchased and installed two climate control units.

The gallery environment has been carefully monitored and adjusted over the past year to obtain an acceptable level of temperature and relative humidity. The lights are equipped with dimmers to obtain the low levels of light prescribed by the lenders.

The University of Winnipeg would like to thank both The War Amputations of Canada and the National Archives.

1989-90 CANADA SCHOLARS

Twenty-two students in their first year at The University of Winnipeg have recently received Canada Scholarships.

Awarded by the Ministry of Science and Technology, these scholarships recognize outstanding academic achievement in high school and encourage the best and the brightest students to pursue undergraduate degrees in science and engineering. A Canada Scholarship is worth \$2,000 per year and can be renewed for up to three vears.

About 2,500 students from across the country are selected to receive this scholarship. Canada scholars are nominated by post-secondary institutions from their list of eligible applicants. At least half of all the scholarships are awarded to academically outstanding women to encourage greater participation in scientific and engineering fields, where representation by women has traditionally been low. At least 10 scholarships are given to the top students from each province or territory.
