

Universities Given 67 Per Cent Rebate on the GST

Universities will qualify for a 67 per cent rebate on the Goods and Services Tax (GST) following an agreement reached between the Government of Canada and the Association of Universities and Colleges of Canada (AUCC) and the Canadian Association of University Business Officers (CAUBO). The rebate rate also applies to community colleges.

The rebate will be paid on university

purchases for exempt activities and is equivalent to an effective tax rate of 2.3 per cent rather than the seven per cent.

Universities also obtained federal government agreement on a number of other points:

- meal plans that provide a minimum of 10 meals a week for a period of four weeks will be exempt;
- instruction at universities and colleges, including most non-credit courses, will

be exempt. Excluded will be recreational and hobby courses;

- the requirement that universities be publicly funded in order to be eligible for rebate will be removed;
- the definition of exempt fees for courses of instruction will include all compulsory fees that the student must pay in order to take the course.

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University Logo Worth A Thousand Words

A picture is worth a thousand words and so is a distinctive logo. The University of Winnipeg is about to embark on a visual identity program to make our logo more recognized in the community through constant and consistent use.

According to Joan Anderson, head of University Relations, "Successful logos deliver a positive message about an institution and ours does just that — it communicates 'open, friendly and interesting.' We have been remiss in not using it properly." She noted that Doug Geddie, a leading image consultant to Canadian universities, recommended our logo be the key element of an identity program.

The University logo, designed by local artist Bruce Head in 1972, is based on a stylized UW accompanied by a specific typeface which reinforces the design. "Unfortunately, over the years various other typestyles crept into common usage, and the impact of the logo was diminished," explained Anderson.

A guide to use of the logo will be prepared and circulated throughout the campus later this fall. It will include the specifics of placement, colour and typeface for uses ranging from covers to business cards.

Continued use of department logos with the University logo will be permitted, but the guidelines include recom-

mendations on relative size. Use of the University crest will be reserved for formal and ceremonial purposes and for commemorative items.

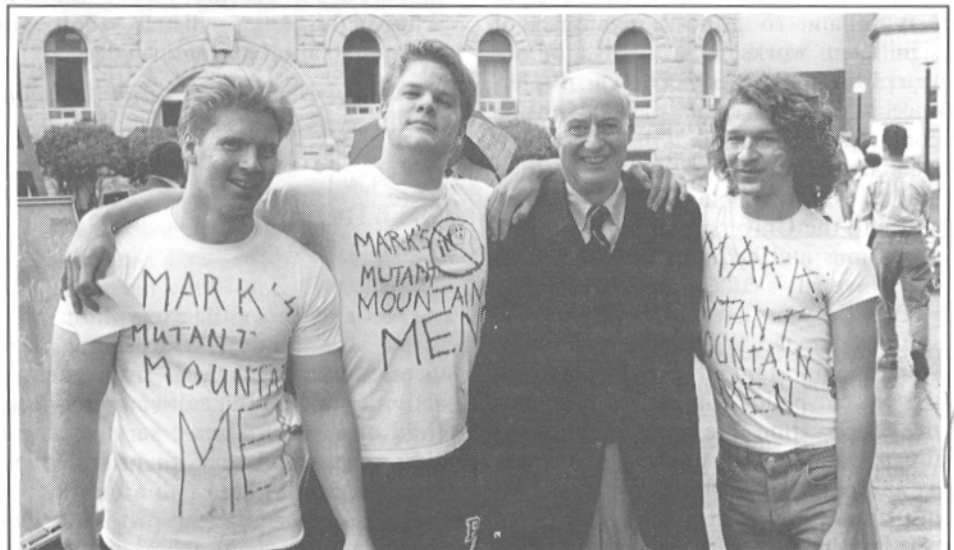
Ian Lark, graphic designer in the Media Department, worked closely with Anderson to develop the guide. Printing Services staff were consulted to ensure that the recommendations were practical.

The program will be implemented

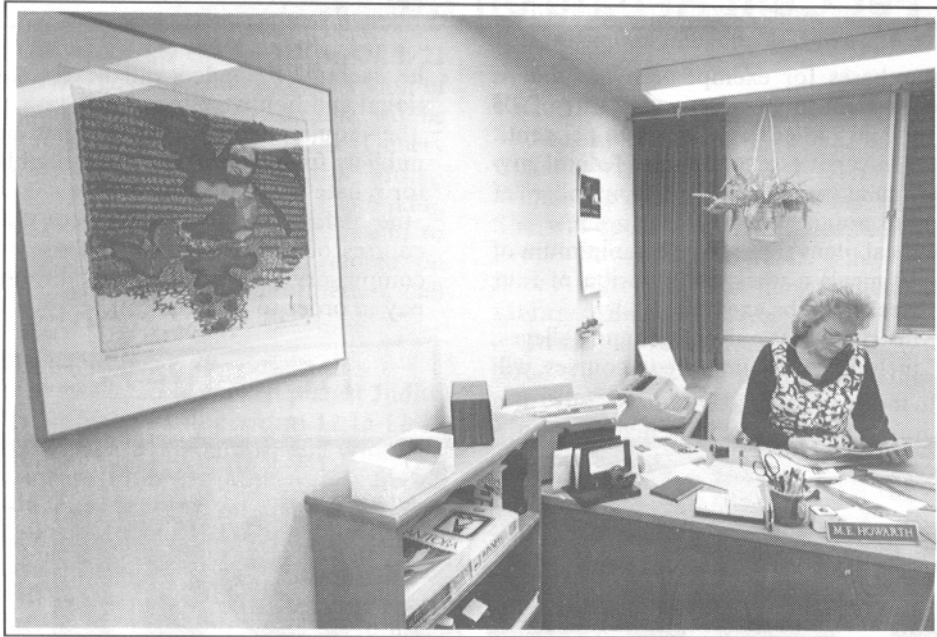
gradually, as current supplies of publications and stationery are depleted. In the meantime, meetings will be held with departments to explain the details of the program.

Anderson acknowledges that successful implementation of the program will depend on the cooperation of the University community. However, she expects

Permanent Art Collection Features Prominent Artists

Jackson Beardy, Clarence Tillenius, Toni Onley, Sheila Butler, Ivan Eyre — one or more of these names will surely be familiar even to individuals with little knowledge of Manitoba or Canadian art. But perhaps what is less well known is works by all of these artists are part of The University of Winnipeg's permanent art collection. The collection contains over 150 pieces, from a 13th century illuminated manuscript page to contemporary photography.

One of the objectives of the University's Fine Art Collection Policy is to acquire and to preserve examples of significant works of art. Five or six works are purchased each year. Preference is given to established Manitoba contemporary artists, 20th century artists, artists associated with Manitoba and to works with a historical significance to the University or to Winnipeg. Donations and bequests further add to the University's collection.

Over the years a few of the works have suffered damage. While some restoration work on important pieces has been done, the present policy emphasizes preventative conservation. Preventative conservation is maintained through such practices as appropriate light levels for works on display, the use of ultraviolet filter plexiglass where necessary, secure and windowless storage facilities, and, in general, an adherence to the standards set by the Canadian Conservation Institute and the National Gallery of Canada.

In addition to protecting the art from environmental damage, the question of security arises. How do you make the works accessible to the public while at the same time ensuring their safety from theft?

The downtown location and easy access to the University pose special problems. Some works from the permanent collection are displayed in temporary exhibitions where appropriate security measures are in place, but other pieces are displayed on campus in areas that are deemed secure, yet accessible. It is hoped this policy will help to cultivate art appreciation and knowledge.

Over and above the exemptions provided for under educational services, universities benefit from exempt activities related to health care services, child and personal care services, legal aid services and services provided by public sector bodies.

Further consultations with the Department of Revenue are taking place to ensure that the agreement reached with the Department of Finance is respected in Revenue Canada's interpretation of some grey areas for universities.

New Faculty Team Continues Winning Tradition

The 1990 autumn baseball game, in which a student team annually challenges the teaching faculty's best, was played on Thurs., Sept. 20 at Omand's Creek field. It appeared at mid-day that rain would force postponement for the first time in a decade. But at 4 p.m. the grass was still dry despite a misty rain and a full nine innings were played before the 6:30 curfew.

Half of the faculty team were newcomers in a rebuilding year, but they proved to be "typically faculty" and powered the seniors to a 24-9 victory in the first game of the '90s.

An enthusiastic and spirited student team, led by Kevin Smith and sparked by Computer Department recruits Mark Lauze and Brent Todd (who both hit home runs) produced a capable performance and might have been victorious if it had not been for a disastrous second inning. The faculty scored 11 times in the second, sparked by Mike Wahn (Sociology), who was sent in to replace Gary Granzberg (Anthropology), and who promptly delivered a three-run homer. After the game, everyone enjoyed a barbeque at President Marsha Hanen's home.

The ball tradition originated in 1950 and a game has been played in most years ever since. Occasionally rain prevented play, and in some years the students failed to challenge, but, in 41 years 28 games have occurred. On the faculty team, Jim Richtik (Geography) has participated since the '60s, and playing-manager Gerry Bedford has appeared in every game since 1950, having missed only the opening contest of the series. To date the standing is faculty, 19 wins, students, 8 wins (one tie game, 1950).

Board Reviews Budget Submission to the UGC

A major focus of this year's first Board of Regents meeting was the approval of the 1991-92 budget estimates and a review of the submission made to the Universities Grants Commission (UGC) earlier in the day.

Our delegation to the UGC stressed the need for rectifying the base funding problem that has existed for several years at The University of Winnipeg. In particular, we reviewed the study prepared by Dean McIntyre in cooperation with the UGC. The study compared The University of Winnipeg with four other institutions of similar size and mandate. It clearly showed that our funding shortfall was between \$4.8 and \$6.1 million in 1988 and that this gap is even larger today.

We also reviewed our capital needs with the UGC in three areas: repairs and maintenance of the existing plant; new equipment; and new facilities, including proper student activity space. As well, we discussed the success we have had in several new academic areas and our traditional strengths as a liberal arts urban university.

The Commission seemed to recognize that additional resources would be required if The University of Winnipeg traditions of quality and innovation are to continue into the future. I believe that the financial predicament facing us was clearly placed before the Universities Grants Commission and we must now wait for their decision.

A report from the Executive Committee to the Board of Regents referred to the progress that is being made in the sexual harassment policy review. A new policy is in draft form and after discussions by the appropriate committees this month, it will be brought before the Board for final approval in either October or November.

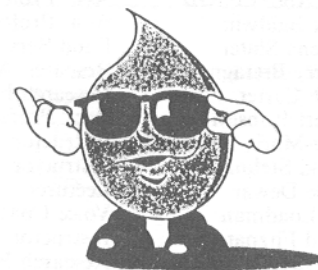
A motion to extend the Library hours during the evenings was referred to the Finance Committee for review. All aspects of the issue, including study needs, costs and alternatives, are to be reviewed with a report coming to the Board at its next meeting. In the meantime, the administration has found a way to provide extended hours on an interim basis.

The Board also received a petition from students requesting a review of the designated smoking areas. The administration will meet with a delegation from the student body to review the current arrangements and look at finding a position that is satisfactory to all.

University Offers Students One-Stop Advice and Registration

This year students could get advice on courses as well as step-by-step guidance through the registration process all in one area. For the first time, two centres — one for registration and the other for student information and advising — were located opposite each other in Centennial Hall.

"Having two centres in close proximity allowed us to focus more effectively on each function — providing information and entering courses into the computer — but students didn't have to run all over campus to get what they needed," explained Wendy Phaneuf, Assistant Director, Systems and Registration. "We were able to provide more thorough and effective service to our students and help increase enrolment."

The Student Information and Advising Centre was staffed by students and faculty, who assisted with registrations and gave general advice. This centre gave first-year and returning students a central location to work out their registration. Extended hours were provided on Tuesday evenings to accommodate those students who couldn't come in during the day.

According to Phaneuf, many positive comments were received about the new area, and it will be continued next year.

University Events Just a Phone Call Away

A listing of coming events at The University of Winnipeg is now just a phone call away with the new "Talking Yellow Pages" system.

Introduced by the Manitoba Telephone System in June, the "Talking Yellow Pages" allows people to use their touchtone phones to find out what's happening in Winnipeg. There are separate programs (4-digit numbers) for such areas as theatre, concerts, sports and historic sites.

You now have four options: athletics, admissions, registration or coming events. Each program will give you the latest information on what's happening at The University of Winnipeg.

AFTER MEECH LAKE

Eugene Forsey, retired Senator and constitutional expert, will discuss "After Meech Lake" on Thurs., Oct. 18 at The University of Winnipeg.

Forsey is considered to be one of Canada's leading parliamentary authorities. He was summoned to the Senate in 1970 and served until 1979. Before this appointment, he was Director of Research at the Canadian Labour of Congress from 1942 to 1966 and was a Member of Parliament from 1948 to 1949.

Forsey obtained a PhD in Political Science in 1941 and has since received honorary degrees from several Canadian universities. He was on the Board of Governors of Trent University for seven years before being named their chancellor in 1973.

The former Senator has written many publications. His most recent book is *A Life on the Fringe: The Memoirs of Eugene Forsey*.

In addition to these awards, three other applications were judged of sufficient merit to be recommended for funding but were placed on a reversion list due to insufficient funds.

In total, 9 applications were submitted to the SSHRC. The success rate at The University of Winnipeg was approximately the national average.
