Board Approves New Committee Structure

A new committee structure has been approved for the Board of Regents in an effort to maximize the talents of all Board members.

"We have a very strong Board," said Chair Margaret McPherson. "But all the members, who volunteer their time, are very busy people. We need a new structure that makes use of their time as effectively as possible."

McPherson noted that the Board had been experiencing

a "proliferation of committees with varying degrees of responsibility." Some committees, she said, met weekly, while others would seldom get together. Some dealt with very large issues while others had narrow mandates.

"Depending on which committees you were on, you could either be overburdened or not very involved at all," explained McPherson.

In the new structure, all business coming to the Board will be handled by five major committees: Finance, Property and Physical Planning, Human Resources, University Affairs, and External Relations. Each Board member will join at least one of these committees.

"The main reward will be that every Regent will be involved with a major component of University life," said McPherson. "Everyone will become more fa-

The new forms have the University logo on them and specify that preauthorization for dental treatment in excess of \$500 is recommended rather than required, as is indicated on the standard Blue Cross claim forms.

The old claim forms will be accepted by Blue Cross only up to the end of October. Please discard any dental claim forms that you currently have on hand. Seven athletes from The University of Winnipeg have been named Academic All-Canadians by the Canadian Interuniversity Athletic Union (CIAU).

Wesmen included on the list are Sandra Carroll, Andrea Hutchens and Larissa Waschuk from women's basketball, Kelly Livesley, Laura Menheer and Tara Patrick

from women's volleyball, and Derek Hebner from men's volleyball. Carroll was also tournament all-star in the 1992 women's basketball championship.

To qualify as an Academic All-Canadian the student-athlete must be enrolled as a fulltime student in a recognized degree granting program, have maintained a minimum sessional average of 80 per cent and be a member of the institution's varsity team(s). There were 490 recipients of the honour from across Canada.

"The 490 student-athletes are honoured because they were able to combine academic excellence with athletic achievement," says CIAU Executive Vice President Marc Lowry. Lowry adds that the students' academic excellence is all the more remarkable considering their extensive competitive season.

miliar with key University issues and be able to make a more effective contribution." This, she believes, will streamline the Board's operations and enhance the quality of decision-

Two of the five committees in the new structure - Finance, and Property and Physical Planning - will have virtually the same responsibilities as in the past. However, the three other committees have taken over duties previously shared by many smaller commit-

The new Human Resources Committee will deal with all employee-related matters, such as faculty relations, research, employment equity and study leaves. The University Affairs Committee will now look after areas like student services, enrolment, recruitment and the library. The External Relations Committee, formerly the Development Committee, has an expanded mandate which includes not only development, but also public relations, alumni and government relations.

Along with these changes at the committee level, the Board has approved a reduction in responsibilities for the Board executive. Now, only "emergency situations" will be handled by the executive. Developmental activities, such as the creation of new policies, will be referred to the full Board or specific committees.

Students Come Closer — But Lose Again

The 1992 renewal of the traditional faculty-student autumn ball game was played under ideal conditions on Sept. 23 at Omand's Creek field - ideal, apart from several inches of water lying in right field. The students fielded the strongest team in several years, and were leading an apparent out-of-condition faculty squad by 12-8 after three innings. But at that point the professors tightened their defence, allowed only one run the rest of the way, and came up with a sixrun sixth inning on the strength of Peter Tittenberger's bases-clearing triple. The students thus came up short again, after a promising start, and have still won but one game since 1980.

Starring for faculty-staff was Mary Young, who moved to first base from her customary catching position and proceeded to go 5 for 5 at the plate and score three times. Tittenberger belted 4 for 5 and scored three, while Ken Friesen (Chemistry) went 4 for 4 and also scored four runs. On the student side Ben Stevens (1.f.) and Richard Wesley (catcher) led the way as each batted 3 for 4 and scored twice. Rich Dewar (ss) and Scott Cairns (1b) were 2 for 4 and 2 for 3 respectively and both scored twice. Bruce Tulloch (relieved by Kim Hope) pitched, scored two runs, and delivered the only home run of the game, aided by two faculty fielders who slithered about in the right-field swamp in search of a slippery ball. Cindy Lewkiw, relieved by Andrew Kingsley, handled the faculty pitching chores, and Ken Friesen made his debut as catcher, after years in the outfield. Peggy Day (Religious Studies) made her debut as the new playing-manager of the faculty team. Newly arrived Dean Don Hall made his first appearance on the team, taking over at third base for former Dean Michael McIntyre in late innings. Gerry Bedford acted as umpire for the game.



Board of Regents Report

With the starting of the fall term at the University, the Board of Regents also begins a new phase in its life; there are new Regents, a new Board structure and a new chair of the Board.

Harvey Secter, now past chair, had led the Board through a number of exciting challenges, one of which was a proposal to reorganize the Board's operations through a new Board structure. In early 1991, the Board began a thorough examination of the Board structure that included a workshop on the issue, followed by a decision to embark on reorganizing Board responsibilities under new bylaws.

A subcommittee of the Board's executive undertook the task and circulated a proposed revision of Bylaws 1 to 4 to Board members in early September, 1992. This proposal was the major focus of the Board meeting on Sept. 28 and, with minor amendments, the Board approved the new Bylaw 1/92. This bylaw established the formation of five major committees, designated their responsibilities and committee composition, and diminished the role of the Executive Committee of the Board. Bylaw 3/92 that deals with a Pension Committee will be considered at the October Board meeting.

At the meeting the Board received a comprehensive report on the University's activities from President Marsha Hanen as well as a report from the Executive Committee indicating actions taken by the executive over the summer. These included giving approval in principle to the 1993-94 estimates before forwarding them to the Universities Grants Commission, approving a resolution that there be three associate deans in arts and science with no specific designation as to responsibilities, and approving a recommendation from the

Student Affairs Committee.

This latter recommendation was a response to a motion made by the University of Winnipeg Students' Association representatives on the Board concerning tuition fees. The recommendation was that an ad hoc committee comprised of students and administration work together to attempt to produce a joint statement for the University Education Review Commission on matters of funding, tuition and student aid.

Reports for information were received from former standing committees, including a report from the Nominating Committee that presented the names of the Regents assigned to the five new committees. It is expected that the new committees will begin their work as soon as possible. Personnel matters involving appointments and leaves were decided during the closed session of the meeting.

Prior to the regular Board meeting, an orientation session was held for new Board members, particularly external Regents. The president and the two vice-presidents along with the chair of the Board spoke to the gathering on different aspects of the University's life and operation. A tour of the campus will be taken prior to the October Board meeting to complete the orientation process.

It appears that the Board will have a number of important issues to respond to this fall. I look forward to the challenges that are before us and am grateful for the opportunity to report the Board's activities to you through *in edition*.

Brent will especially be remembered for his zest for life. He had a great love of travelling and did so on a regular basis.

Economics Program Called A Model for Education

The economics program at The University of Winnipeg is "a model for undergraduate education in Canada," according to the Western Economics Chairs Committee.

Sohrab Abizadeh, associate dean and economics professor, said the committee was impressed with The University of Winnipeg's program, calling it "up-to-date and progressive."

Acting chair of the Economics Department Phil Cyrenne explained that there have been many revisions to the program's curriculum and research agenda in the past decade.

Since 1985-86, the department has been conducting a formal review of the curriculum, and according to Cyrenne, has been "constantly making changes."

"We've worked for a long time to create a balance in theory and application in our curriculum. We've also strengthened the quantitative aspect, which was almost nonexistent 10 years ago."

Major changes include more rigorous pre-requisites and an honours program that prepares students for entry into either a graduate program or directly into the job market.

Another improvement is that the program is much more accessible to students. More economics courses are now offered, particularly in the spring and summer sessions when demand is very high. According to Abizadeh, this seems to have attracted more students.

Along with a growth in student numbers, there has been an increase in research activity of the eight faculty members. "In 1983-84, our department produced one publication and gave two conference presentations. Last year, we did at least 10 publications and five presentations," said Abizadeh.

Economics Professor Wilson Brown has just published a book, *Markets, Organizations and Information* (Butterworth, 1992). A specialist in health care economics, Diane Dewar recently presented a paper at the Atlantic Canada Conference. Cyrenne and Abizadeh also co-authored a paper on an empirical model on the nature of government revenue collection and expenditure.

Other faculty members are continuing their work in their specialties. Robert Fenton is doing research in environmental economics and lends his expertise to various government bodies. Hugh Grant is studying economic history, with a focus on the Hudson's Bay Company. Michael Benaroch's research is on economic development and international trade. Vic Olshevski continues to specialize in micro-economic theory and money and banking.

Classics Student Wins Two Prizes

"It's all Greek to me" is definitely not a phrase used by Liza Bowman. Earlier this year Bowman was awarded two prizes in the Canadian Association of Classics senior undergraduate competition in Greek and Latin.

The University of Winnipeg student won first prize in the Greek sight competition, which involves translating Greek into English. As well, she claimed second prize in the Latin sight competition.

Two years ago she took first prize in the junior Greek competition for second-year students.

Classics Professor Iain McDougall says, "The University of Winnipeg has been well represented in the competitions. Over the years we have outranked students from larger universities." Since 1984, The University of Winnipeg has won a total of 10 prizes in the competition.
