University Participates in New Research Centre

The University of Winnipeg will be one of several institutions involved in the new Centre for Family Violence.

Launched last week by the federal government, the centre is a "research partnership" which includes all of Manitoba's universities and many community agencies.

The centre will be a focal

point for research in the province on family violence and related issues. It will promote research, provide opportunities for networking, and coordinate conferences and other activities. Health and Welfare Canada and the Social Sciences and Humanities Research Council (SSHRC) have committed \$100,000 per year for five

years to the centre, which will be physically located at the University of Manitoba.

As members of the centre, researchers from Brandon University, the University of Manitoba, The University of Winnipeg and the Northern Nursing Program at Keewatin Community College will participate in various research projects. They will collaborate with each other as well as with a host of urban and rural community agencies. These include the Independent Living Resource Centre, the Ma Mawi Wi Chi Itata Centre, Sagkeeng Child and Family Services, and Ikwe-Widdjiitwin.

According to Herb Mays, associate vice-president (academic), The University of

University Prepares for Review

The University of Winnipeg is continuing to prepare for its presentation to the University Education Review Commission on Dec. 10.

The commission, chaired by the Right Honourable Duff Roblin, was created by the provincial government last July. Its mandate is to review a broad range of topics related to university education in Manitoba. The commission has already started public hearings and will soon be meeting formally with the education community.

The President's Advisory Committee on the Review has been meeting to provide input on the structure and content of our submission. A draft will be circulated prior to the Nov. 23 meetings of the Senate and Board of Regents to facilitate discussion at both meetings. Comments from the Board and Senate members will be incorporated

Canada Scholars

The Canada Scholarship, awarded by the Ministry of Science and Technology, encourages first-year university students to participate in scientific and engineering fields. It also helps to promote the elimination of the gender gap in professions which were traditionally dominated by men. At least half of all the scholarships are awarded to academically outstanding women.

One of the 17 recipients from The University of Winnipeg is Jackie Trudeau, a graduate of Murdoch MacKay Collegiate Institute. She was also awarded the Alumni Entrance Scholarship which is given to high-school students with a high academic standing, leadership qualities and who participate in extracurricular activities in school and the community.

Trudeau is planning a career in sports medicine. This seems a natural choice, as she is a tri-athlete. As well as organizing tri-athlons for the province, she has worked in the tri-athlons in school. "There is more than one path I can follow," she says, "I may go for medicine, or perhaps a certificate in athletic therapy."

Corissa Sweetland was also awarded the Canada Scholarship and the Alumni Entrance Scholarship and is a graduate of Stonewall Collegiate Institute. Her plans for the future are uncertain, but she says, "I would like a job in the scientific community, possibly in research." In addition to being an excellent student, she has found time to participate in Ukrainian dancing, curling and singing in high school.

Another first-year student

who won both the Canada Scholarship and the Alumni Entrance Scholarship is Grant Hunter, who attended Yirden Collegiate Institute.

He is interested in either medicine or dentistry. Hunter says, "I'm still getting used to attending university." He finds it quite a change from high school, but agrees it is great to be a student at a university with such a friendly atmosphere.

Canada Scholars are nominated by post-secondary institutions from their list of eligible applicants. Approximately 2,500 students from across the country are selected.

At least 10 scholarships are given to the top students from each province or territory. The scholarship is worth \$2,000

per year and can be renewed for up to three years.

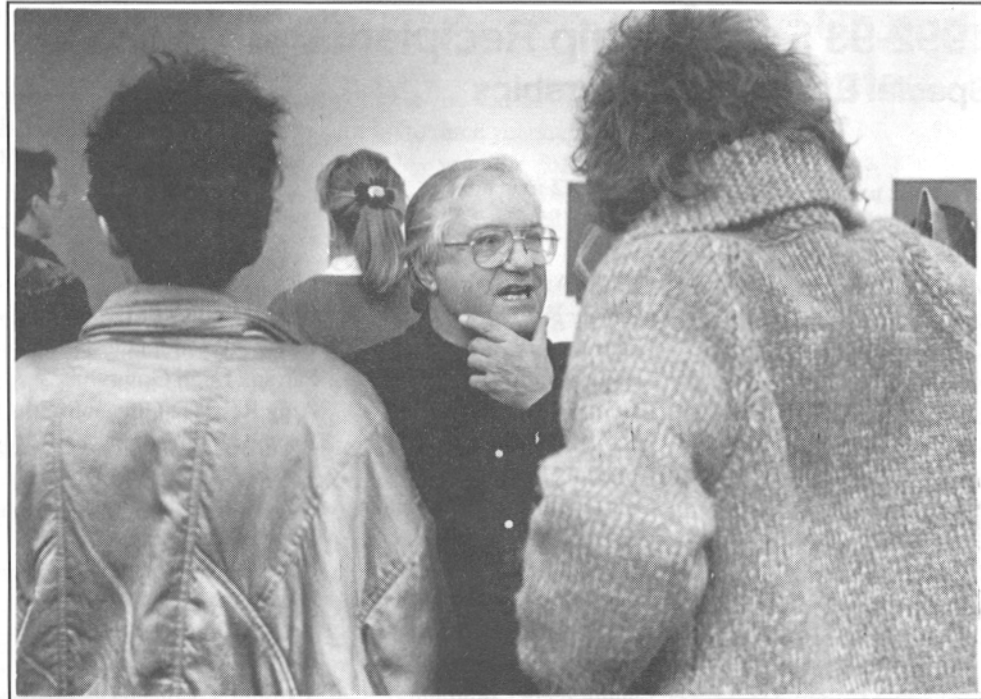

Theatre Visits Fens of East Anglia

Insight into the harsh lives of women agricultural workers in the Fenlands of East Anglia, on Britain's North Sea coast, will be offered at the Gas Station Theatre Nov. 25 - 28, when The University of Winnipeg brings to the stage Caryl Churchill's documentary drama, *Fen*.

Churchill, author of such savagely satirical plays as *Cloud Nine* and *Top Girls*, created the script of *Fen* after researching the actual lives of the fen workers and developing the material gathered through a series of workshops

with her London-based Joint Stock Theatre Group.

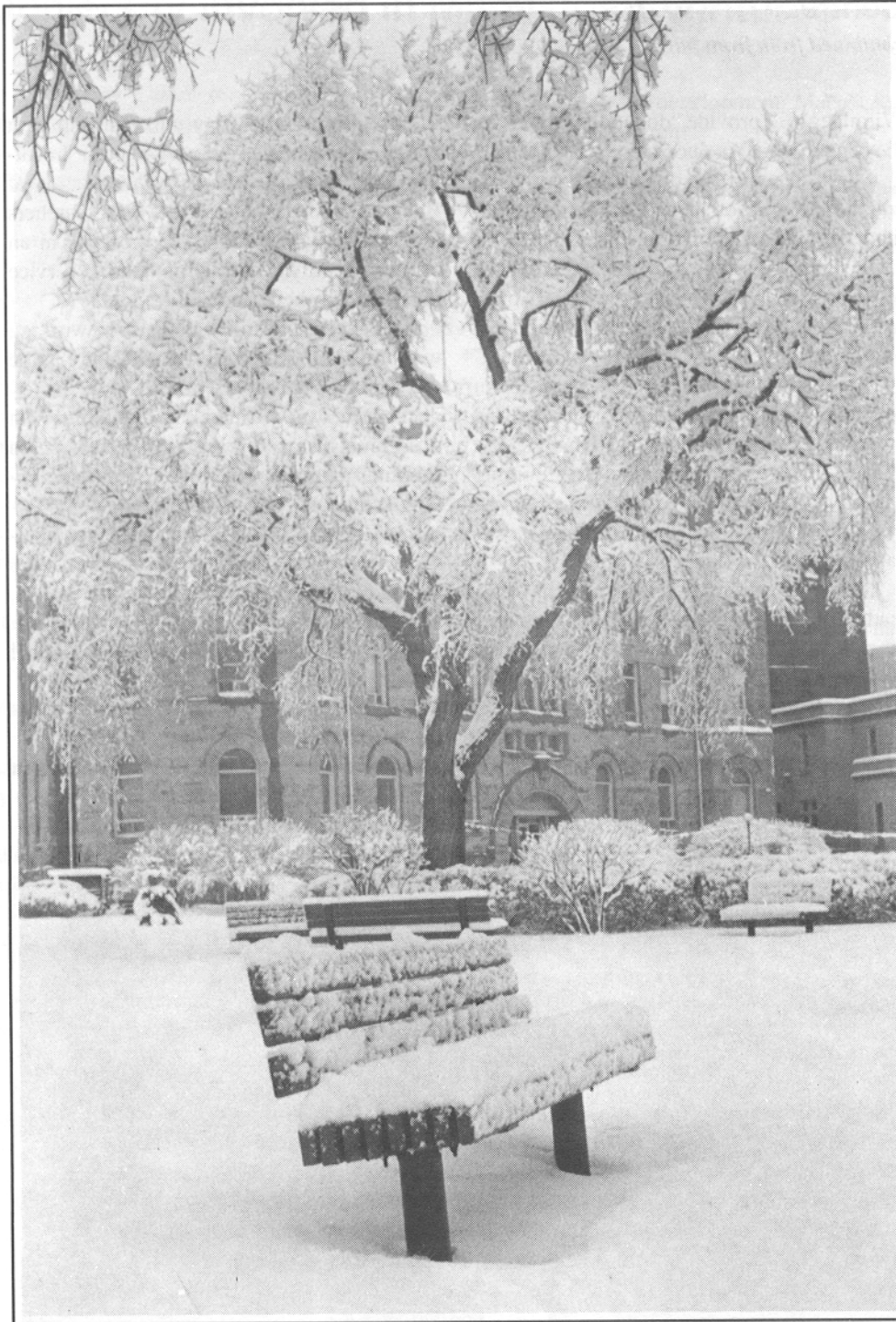
Churchill found, beneath the idealized picture of country life in the imagination of the average urban dweller, a human reality as bleak as the East Anglian terrain itself. She and her company fashioned from the conversations and experiences of actual fenwomen a drama which is taut and tragic, compassionate, angry, deeply moving and ultimately political.

Fen is directed by Ann Hodges, a graduate of The University of Winnipeg the-

atre program and the National Theatre School, Montreal. The play features members of The University of Winnipeg's fourth-year acting class.

Winnipeg will provide "donations in kind" to the centre, which includes research expertise.

"It's an excellent opportunity for us to collaborate with other researchers and, particularly, with community agencies," said John Hofley, dean of arts and science and professor of sociology. "It is very beneficial to do research with the people who will ultimately use the results."

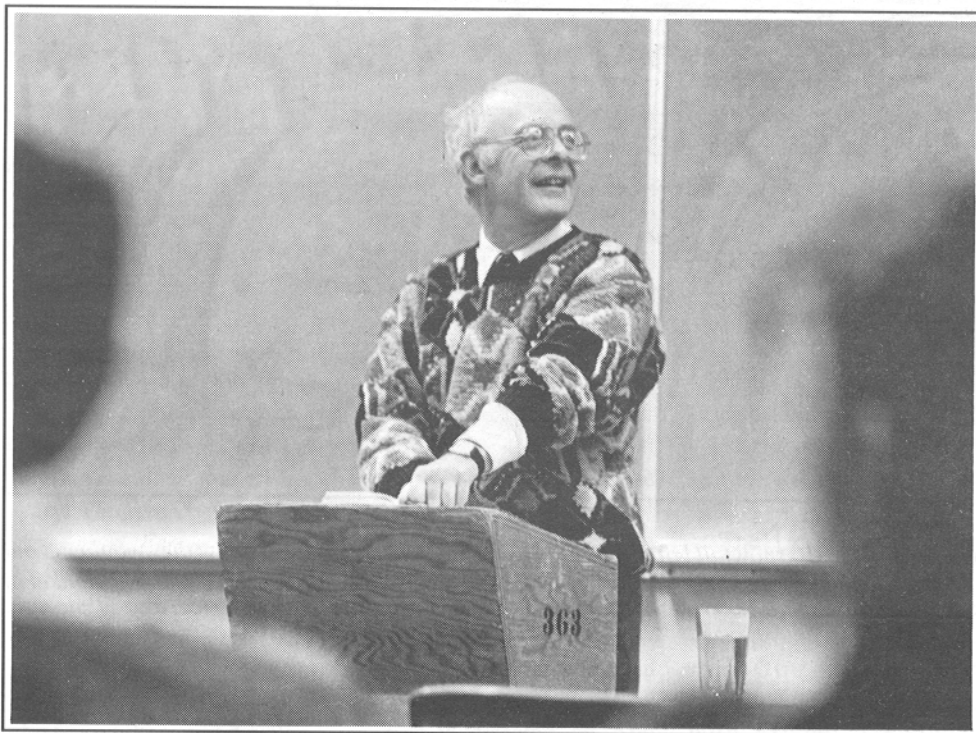
Wendy Josephson, associate professor of psychology and a member of the steering committee, also noted that "The University of Winnipeg shares the concerns the community has with family violence and has, in some cases, already established links with agencies, particularly in the downtown area."

Josephson said that 14 projects have already been proposed for the centre on topics ranging from creative community prevention efforts to multicultural and aboriginal initiatives in response to family violence.

Josephson and Hofley will team up with community agencies on two projects. In collaboration with the Manitoba Association of Battered Women Shelters, the two researchers will analyze the association's records in an effort to identify patterns in demand for service at provincial shelters.

Josephson and Hofley will also be working with the Elder Abuse Resource Centre at the Age and Opportunity Centre. They will conduct interviews with members of families with a lifetime history of abuse. They hope to eventually develop prevention and intervention techniques for families at risk.

Other University of Winnipeg faculty members who will lend their expertise to the Centre for Family Violence include Pauline Greenhill, Women's Studies, Sandra Kirby, Sociology Department, and Debra Stienstra, Political Science Department.

University Involved in Many Joint Ventures

The new Centre for Family Violence is not the only cooperative arrangement The University of Winnipeg has with its sister universities and colleges. The following are some examples of other joint ventures.

a) Other Manitoba Universities

The University of Winnipeg is a partner with the University of Manitoba and Brandon University in the Inter-Universities North program (IUN), including the highly rated First Year By Distance Education (FYDE) Program. FYDE provides access to full first-year programs at several northern and rural sites. Other formal links between the three institutions are the Committee of Presidents of Universities in Manitoba (COPUM) and the Committee of Vice-Presidents (Academic). Because of the geographic proximity of the two institutions, most of our connections are with the University of Manitoba and include the following:

- Joint Masters Programs in public administration, history, English (inactive), religious studies (inactive).
- Cooperative BEd Program.
- Library cooperation - including the BRIDGE system whereby library catalogues may be searched on-line.
- Computing - Manitoba Post-Secondary Network permits access to the mainframe at the University of Manitoba. (Funded by the Universities Grants Commission.)
- Many of our faculty (particularly in the sciences) serve as adjunct professors at the University of Manitoba for the purpose of supervising graduate students.
- Margaret Laurence Chair in Women's Studies (shared by the two institutions).
- Research Collaboration:
 - Prairie Regional Nuclear Magnetic Resonance Centre (co-founder with other prairie universities; based at the NRC's institute for Biodiagnostics).
 - Winnipeg Institute for Theoretical Physics (co-founder; also includes members from Brandon University and AECL, Pinawa).

b) Out-of-Province Universities

- Brock University, Ontario - part of an exchange program with Perpignan University, France.
- Mannheim University, Germany - Exchange Program.
- Charles University, Prague, Czechoslovakia - Exchange Program.
- University of Alexandria, Egypt - CIDA - ICDS - Educational Institutions Program - The development of a hardy, woody shrub for the Western Desert.
- Catholic University of Peru, Lima, Peru - CIDA - ICDS - Educational Institutions Program - the training of Child Care Workers.
- Sedaya College, Malaysia - twinning program in Business Computing.

In development: Macalaster College, Minnesota, Exchange Program

c) Community Colleges and other post-secondary institutions.

Red River Community College:

- a co-operative agreement exists between the University and the College through which students may transfer from diploma programs in business administration, child care services, or technology, (biology, biotechnology, chemistry) with credit towards a university degree.

- Child Care - funding request has been before the UGC for several years.

- Nursing program - funding request has been before the UGC for several years.

In Development with RRCC:

- Applied Science Program - chemistry
- Applied Science Program - geographic information systems
- Creative Communications Program

Keewatin Community College:

- Students who hold the Natural Resources Management Diploma from KCC may meet the requirements for the BA or BSc with a major in environmental studies by completing 10 further courses at The University of Winnipeg.

Special mention must also be made of Menno Simons College, an inter-Mennonite institution affiliated with The University of Winnipeg. Students take courses at the College and receive a University of Winnipeg BA degree with a major in social and economic development studies or conflict resolution studies. Menno Simons College also maintains a close relationship with the chair in Mennonite studies.

The University of Winnipeg also has enjoyed a long-standing relationship with Concord College (formerly Mennonite Brethren Bible College), which allows Concord to provide an integrated theological and arts program, and enables the University to offer (through Concord) a major in music.
