Capital Campaign Exceeds Goal

The University's capital campaign, "Strengthening the Links," has exceeded its goal, bringing in a total of \$11,134,653.

The five-year fundraising campaign officially ended Dec. 31, 1992, with over \$½ million more than the original target of \$10.5 million. Included in the final total are internal and external pledges, bequests, onetime significant donations, monies donated in memoria and in recognition, gifts-in-kind, annual appeal donations from 1990-92, and bank interest.

"The success of this campaign has enabled us to meet many of our funding challenges," said University President Marsha Hanen. "Thanks to the generosity of governments, the private sector, alumni, friends, and the University community, we will be better equipped to face the demands of the

21st century."

Campaign donations have been used to make many campus improvements that benefit students, faculty and staff. For example, library users will appreciate the endowment set up for purchasing up-to-date books and periodicals.

Money from the campaign has also been used to establish or build up bursaries/scholarships, to enhance academic programs and to complete renovations. Improvements can be seen in both Manitoba and Graham Halls, as well as in the transformation of Theatre 3C00 into the new Eckhardt-Gramatté Hall, now known as one of the finest small-scale, multi-purpose facilities in Western Canada.

Success Leads to Success in Work Study Program

Thanks to last year's overwhelming success, The University of Winnipeg's student Work Study Program is up and running once again.

The program provides supplementary financial assistance through campus employment to students with high levels of financial need. Regular status students (Canadian citizen or permanent resident) who are registered full-time, have completed five full-course equivalents and who have received the maximum Canada student loan are eligible.

"The program is made possible by funds allotted from the University's Board," explains Judy Dyck, director, awards and financial aid office. "The Board is pleased to be able to provide financial assistance in such a tangible way," she adds.

Explore the History of Elections in Canada

"Behind the Ballot Box," an exhibition on the history of elections in Canada, is on display in The University of Winnipeg Library, until Nov. 5, 1993. Close to 10,000 people visited the exhibition during its original three-month showing in Ottawa.

This populist look at the evolution of Canada's electoral system over the centuries is based on the following four themes: voting is a right, is secret, is accessible and is fair.

The exhibition contains reproductions of manuscripts, paintings, posters and cartoons, three dimensional objects and film.

"Behind the Ballot Box," is displayed throughout the library. The introduction is located near the 4th floor circular staircase. The video portion of the exhibition is located on the 4th floor mezzanine, followed by a kiosk at the top of the stairs on the 5th floor. The main part of the exhibition is in the covered courtyard that holds music, art and special collections.

This exhibition is a joint presentation of the National Archives of Canada and Elections Canada. It is sponsored on campus by the office of the vide-president (academic), the dean of arts and science and the library.

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Students Win as Magnificent Seven Fade in Late Innings

This year's annual faculty/staff vs. students baseball game saw a well-organized, well-behaved student team gain a 20—12 decisive win. The game was played on one of the finest afternoons ever weather-wise, but the faculty team initially failed to appear. After a lengthy delay owing to a shortage of players the game began at 5 p.m. and by agreement was shortened to seven innings.

The faculty, with only seven players to the students' full complement of 10, were immediately dubbed "The Magnificent Seven." The faculty batted gamely, and after three innings, actually led by 7-2. Gerry Bedford, pressed into service as "Manager Emeritus," pitched; Peggy Day (Religious Studies) attempted, with considerable success, to cover both third base and left field; Mary Young was a stalwart at first; Bill Gadsby (Education) and Neil Besner (English) played second and short; and Andrew Kingsley and Alden Turner (English) roamed the outfield. A series of faculty miscues in the fourth inning opened the door to six runs and an 8-7 student lead. Student power produced six more in the sixth, and a closing four in the seventh brought the total to 20. The talented student team, noting that bright sunlight was causing great difficulty for the faculty right fielder, packed their line-up with left-hand hitters and the result was late inning homers by Richard Sandhurst, Chuck Molgat and Richard Swandel-all to the same section of the outfield. Laura Lee was the winning pitcher; Elizabeth Bridge and Donna Glover performed admirably; and Michael Koch-Schulte was a standout as player-manager.

The series standing, including all games since 1950, is faculty—21, students—9, with one game tied, five rain outs, and eight "no challenge" years.

Board Welcomes New Members

The first Board of Regents meeting for the 1993-94 term was held at 5:30 p.m. Mon., Sept. 27 in the Faculty & Staff Club dining room. New members were introduced and welcomed. They are government appointees Frank Hechter and Joel Weinstein, alumni representative Sandra McKnight, Senate representatives John Badertscher and Sarah McKinnon, and support staff representatives Judy Dyck and Nancy Ito. Alissa Brandt, Jennifer Greaves, Jim Heber and Gordon Wallace will represent the students.

President Marsha Hanen, in her report, provided an update on changes that had taken place at the University over the summer, and among other items, reported on the successful conclusion of the "Strengthening the Links" Campaign.

Actions of the Board included completing appointments to Board committees, accepting a report on the donation income to The University of Winnipeg, and receiving a report forwarded to the Human Resources Committee on "Training and Development Activities" for 1992-93.

The Board approved the President's proposal for a search committee to seek a replacement for Vice-President (Administration and Finance) John Law, who is retiring. The appropriate groups will be notified about naming their representatives to this committee.

Board member Gordon McKinnon paid tribute to the contribution John Law has made to the Board, the University and the community. John will be missed by the Board and the committees he has served so well.

The government-appointed Regents reported on their meeting with Clayton Manness, the new Minister of Education. A meeting with the former minister had been planned for some time and the Board was pleased the new minister was able to keep the engagement.

It was reported that the phone campaign portion of the 1993 Annual Appeal has begun. During their first week at the job, the phoners indicated that they had received a good response to the appeal, which is an encouraging sign. The Board looks forward to another busy year. The next Board meeting will be held on Mon., Oct. 25 at 5:30 p.m. in the Faculty & Staff Club. In the meantime, we look forward to Convocation on Sun., Oct. 24.

In Memoriam

Dawson Harms

The University community mourns the death of Dawson Harms, Sept. 16, 1993.

Dawson joined The University of Winnipeg's Bachelor of Education Program in 1992 as an assistant professor. He came here from the University of Calgary where he received his PhD in 1991.

Although he received a Bachelor of Arts with Honours from the University of Brandon in 1980, Dawson had also been a student at The University of Winnipeg. He took courses in English and Classics, and in 1979 was awarded student of distinction.

Dawson was a proven educator and administrator. In addition to scholarly pursuits, he was an artist, a songwriter and a well-published poet.

"We are deeply saddened by his loss," says Director Annabelle Mays, Bachelor of Education Program. "Dawson had a warm, delightful personality and eclectic interests. He came here very highly recommended; colleagues in his field saw him as a scholar of exceptional promise."

The Education Students' Association is asking for donations of used books to raise money for an Education scholarship in Dawson's memory. Books may be taken to rooms 3C07 or 3C02.

Work Study

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Dyck says there was a substantial increase in the number of proposed projects this year. "All individuals who submitted project requests had at least one project approved. To stay within the budget, some multiple requests by individuals couldn't be accommodated. As well, hours were cut on almost all projects."

"The program has benefits other than financial," says Dyck. "It provides our students with both practical and, in many cases, career-related work experience." Dyck says another positive aspect of the program is the wide range of Work Study projects. "There is a balance among academic, technical, administrative and UWSA projects," she adds. "Students can apply to a project in an area in which they have an interest."

The conference will address issues of justice, education, heritage, economics and business, employment equity and arts and culture in a multicultural society.


According to conference coordinator Gabriel Dufault, participants can look forward to lively discussions with several outstanding guest speakers.

Campus Notebook

—The Prairie Division of the Canadian Association of Geographers has selected **William Carlyle**, professor of geography, to receive the John Warkentin Award for Scholarly Contributions to the Geography of the Western Interior. The selection and presentation was made at the association's annual meeting in Sept., 1993, held at Wasagaming in Riding Mountain National Park.

—During his sabbatical year, History Professor **Wesley Stevens** was invited to deliver six lectures in universities overseas: Italy, Spain, Japan and three lectures in Germany. Four of the seven articles he wrote have already been published; the *Collected Studies of Charles W. Jones*, which Stevens edited will be published in 1994. In addition, Stevens prepared an edition of the first four books of Euclid's *Elements* in Latin from ninth-century manuscripts; he is now writing a commentary on every axiom, proposition and geometrical diagram in these manuscripts.

—Barry Edginton, associate professor of sociology, is editor-in-chief of the newly created journal *Health and Canadian Society*. Edginton was a presenter at the annual meeting of the Royal College of Physicians and Surgeons, held in Vancouver, Sept. 9 - 13. He was one of four noted authorities from Canada and the United States who represented the Hannah symposium, from the Hannah Institute for the History of Medicine, in Toronto.

—The Manitoba Multicultural Resources Centre (MMRC) extends a very fond farewell to its former executive director, **Bill McDonald**. McDonald spent three successful years with MMRC helping to bring some newer projects to fruition. These include the triannual magazine *Multicultural Connections* and the March 21st International Day for the Elimination of Racial Discrimination event.

—The 1993 edition of the MMRC *EthnoBank* is now available to the public for \$100. The *EthnoBank* is composed of three main sections: ethnic organizations, general organizations and a quick reference contact list. —Men's Basketball Coach **Bill Wedlake** was the guest speaker at the seventh annual coaches conference, held by the Interlake Sports Development Association. The conference, which was held Sept. 30, focused on the relationship between parents and coaches.

—English Professor **Lloyd Siemens** has published the following items in 1993: "Thomas Hardy, William Barnes and the Question of Literary Influence," in *Victorian Review*; "The Haggard - Kipling Friendship: An Annotated Checklist of Readings," in *Kipling Journal*; "Maurice Greiffenhagan: Painter and Illustrator" and "A Man From the North: Bennett's Apprentice Novel" in *The Eighteen-Nineties* (G. Cevasco, ed.). In addition, "Rider Haggard's Neglected Journal: 'Diary of an African Visit'" will appear in *English Literature in Transition* in Jan., 1994. Siemens also contributed a number of invited "Notes" and reviews to literary journals and compiled an annotated index of letters to Thomas Hardy in the Dorset County Museum, Dorchester.


Political Science Professor Participates in Prestigious Program

Claudia Wright, associate professor of political science at The University of Winnipeg, has been chosen to participate in the prestigious National Defence College Course, in Kingston, Ontario.

The 38-week course, which runs from September, 1993 to May, 1994, is conducted by the Department of National Defence on behalf of the Government of Canada. It provides a program of development studies at the senior executive level for colonels or brigadier-generals from the armed forces of Canada, Australia, New Zealand, United Kingdom and the United States, and for civilians from government departments, academic institutions, industry and other areas of the private sector.

The purpose of the course is to provide military and civilian leaders with a comprehensive knowledge of national and international affairs affecting national security. The curriculum emphasises political, economic, sociological and foreign affairs, as well as military matters. Participants spend eight weeks conducting field studies.

"Whither Canada?" is the theme of this year's course and is designed to address the question "What kind of policies for what kind of Canada in what kind of world?" In the final term, participants orally defend their research paper, develop comprehensive policy proposals and attempt to set priorities for Canada.



New Computer System Tools Make a World of Difference

Researchers at The University of Winnipeg have a world of information at their fingertips, thanks to the latest tools added to the Internet computer network.

The Internet is a worldwide network of computer networks comprised of millions of individual users. Its three major uses are electronic mail, online connection (or remote login) and transfer of files.

Electronic mail, or e-mail, provides a quick and inexpensive way for users to communicate with other Internet users around the world. In addition to standard messaging, e-mail facilitates the publication and distribution of electronic journals and provides a means of ongoing discussion among individuals with common areas of interest.

Online connection allows a computer user to establish a connection with another computer elsewhere.

Bill Pond, area head of public services in the Library, explains: "For example, you can use your microcomputer at The University of Winnipeg as a terminal to a larger, distant computer catalogue, such as the Library of Congress in Washington." This means a researcher sitting at his/her microcomputer on campus has quick and easy access to the 15 million titles from the American Library of Congress.

Through file transfer protocol (FTP), a user can scan the holdings of thousands of computers worldwide, and can transfer text files, images and sound files from these resources directly to his/her own microcomputer.

Other, more sophisticated tools have recently been added to Internet, that make information on the network easier to locate and use, explains Pond. "With Hytelnet, on our Vax computer, you can select from lists of libraries, data-bases and network services around the world, then establish an immediate connection to the chosen resource. Archie, another tool, will scan hundreds of computers for software anywhere."

A tool such as Gopher client not only provides a researcher menu-driven access to the Internet's resources, but also permits him/her to save relevant information, or to send it to a colleague, anywhere in the world, who shares the same area of interest. Another tool, Veronica, will scan the menus of all major Gophers by keyword.

Pond says the Library has recently subscribed to the UNCOVER database, which provides coverage of approximately 20,000 different journals. "It gives users quick access to far more journals in their discipline than they might otherwise have," he says. After perusing the contents page of a particular journal, or after conducting a key-word search across the entire database, the user has the option of obtaining relevant articles via electronic document delivery.

According to Pond, "while no one is happy to see our purchasing power shrink year after year, at least this type of resource permits a much wider bibliographic coverage of the periodical literature. In that context, it may be perceived to save on subscription costs as well as storage space."

Student Wins National Essay Award

Ellen Hartle, a major in Administrative Studies at The University of Winnipeg, won the 1993 annual national undergraduate student paper award sponsored by the Canadian Association of Programs in Public Administration.

Her 14-page essay, entitled "Voices of Women on Public Administration," examines the processes and conclusions of female researchers in the area of public administration from a century ago to the present.

"I found that women had a distinct voice in their reports although they reached similar conclusions as their male counterparts," says Hartle.

One area in which she found a difference between male and female researchers was in their collaborative efforts. "The women were more likely to work together and credit each other's contributions in the introductions to their findings."

Hartle, who is in the final year of her program, wrote the paper for Professor Ken Gibbons' Political Science course. He later encouraged her to enter the competition. "His

encouragement and support were invaluable; I would not likely have submitted the essay without his prompting," she said. Hartle also gives credit to teaching assistant Terry Lewycky for providing guidance on creating the outline and drafting the essay.

The CAPPA award marks the second time her essay has been honoured. Hartle had earlier won the Institute of Public Administration Manitoba Regional undergraduate contest and was encouraged to enter the national competition.


The CAPPA award includes a cash prize plus a waiver of registration fees to the Institute of Public Administration of Canada National Conference in Charlottetown in August, 1994. As well, her paper will be submitted to the *Canadian Public Administration* journal for review and possible publication

Hartle began her studies on a part-time basis in 1987 after working several years in

the private sector and expects to complete a BA by December. She plans to apply for the Masters of Public Administration, a joint program between the Universities of Winnipeg and Manitoba.

Currently she is a member of the student Political Science Association and a board member of Project Peacemakers, a non-profit group that examines global peace issues. Outside of the University, Hartle devotes much of her time to her family, church activities and her job hunt.
