FUND-RAISING CAMPAIGN PLANNING ADVISORY GROUP - The academic development of The University of Winnipeg as a high-quality, urban-based liberal education institution depends on the ability to prioritize and meet major program, service, and space needs.

But programs and services that the University would like to introduce or improve require new sources of funding, renovation of facilities, or new capital construction. It was decided that The University of Winnipeg should plan for a major fund-raising campaign to be conducted over the next few years. It was for this purpose that the Fund-Raising Campaign Planning Advisory Group (FRACPAG) was established. The FRACPAG will attempt to define these objectives:

- for which programs and services (new or improved) should funding be sought?
- how much money would each require and what, then, should be the total financial objective of the campaign?
- are there specific sources of such funding that might be particularly appropriate for certain projects included in the campaign?

The Advisory Group will consult broadly throughout the University community during April, May and June and then report its recommendations to the President.

BOARD HIGHLIGHTS

The following are highlights from the meeting of the Board of Regents held Monday, March 25, 1985:

The Report of the President included the following items: The March COPUM meeting; the Seminar on International Collaboration; Student/Parent Forums; the AUCC Annual Spring Meeting; decisions from the March Senate meeting; the Urban Universities Conference co-sponsored by The University of Winnipeg and The University of South Florida; Dr. Al Johnson's Report on Financing Post-Secondary Education and Research; University of Winnipeg holiday closing dates; and coming events.

Report of the Finance Committee - The Board approved the following recommendations of the Finance Committee: that the Board approve the 1985-86 operating budget for the Faculty of Theology at \$214,950 ; that the Board set course fees for the 1985 Spring and Summer Session at: Tuition fee - \$168.00, Course Service Fee (Arts and Education) \$19.00 and Course Service Fee (Science) \$44.00 ; that the Board approve the Collegiate Division refund schedule contained in Dean VanderStoel's memorandum of March 12, 1985.

Report of the Pension Trustees - The Board adopted the proposed University By-law # 3 for the Pension Committee. The significant amendments are (i) the expansion in membership from the present 5 (2 Board, 2 Faculty, 1 Support Staff) and (ii) clarification of the respective responsibilities of the Pension Committee and the new Investment Sub-Committee.

Report of the Property and Physical Planning Committee - The Board approved the following recommendations:

1. That the park area adjacent to the Athletic Centre be named "The Alumni Green" and that a suitable plaque be placed in the area to signify that the park project is spearheaded by the Alumni of this institution. The Committee also recommends that the Alumni Association be permitted to install a memorial plaque in the park dedicated to the Class of '35.
2. That a portion of the west wall of the lounge area on the second floor of the Athletic Centre be established as "Wesmen Wall" and that the wall be dedicated in memory of John Kemp Anderson Brown.

INTERNATIONAL DEVELOPMENT SEMINAR

A seminar on international development, held on March 4, brought more than fifty faculty members and university administrators together for a full day to exchange information and ideas in this common area of interest.

The seminar was organized by the Office of the Vice-President (Academic) in cooperation with the University of Manitoba. Officers from IDRC (International Development Research Centre), CBIE (Canadian Bureau for International Education) and IDO (International Development Office, Association of Universities and Colleges of Canada) presented overviews of their organizations and then fielded questions from both University of Winnipeg and University of Manitoba faculty members. The formal presentations were followed by lively discussions on such issues as: funding levels and priorities for international research; the presence of international students in Canada; the long-term objectives of training and research in least developed countries; and the problems and benefits for faculty members carrying out such projects.

A highlight of the seminar was the luncheon address by the Egyptian Ambassador to Canada, Mr. T.M. Basheer. Mr. Basheer spoke on the need for aid to developing countries, and the need for "give and take" between developing and developed countries.
