UNIVERSITY OF WINNIPEG HOLDS PACESETTER CAMPAIGN

The University of Winnipeg Collections Committee has announced plans to hold a *Pacesetter Campaign* in 1985. Pacesetter campaigns are held early and are the source of funds announced at the kick-off of the city-wide drive for funds. Participating in this type of campaign means our campus drive must be complete by September 20.

The University's association with the United Way is a long-standing tradition. It is the only campaign for local charity which takes place on campus. The U of W's leadership for this year starts at the top with President Farquhar's role as Chairman of the 1985 United Way Campaign.

The Staff and Faculty Forum Collections Committee is the organizing group. This year the goal is to increase participation from the 35.7% of 1984. Pledge cards will be



picked up by canvassers and will be treated with the usual confidentiality. Payroll deduction will once again be a convenient option.

HOMECOMING APPROACHES

The University of Winnipeg is preparing for its first Homecoming Weekend October 18-20, 1985.

Over 100 years of tradition will be celebrated through the reunion of faculty, staff and students whose lives were touched by The University of Winnipeg and its founding colleges.

A full weekend of activities has been planned around the theme "Come Home to the Heart of the Continent, Centre of the City". Such international figures as Canadian Ambassador to the United States Allan Gotlieb; internationally known poet Timothy Findley; former CBC Vice-President and current Toronto Life publisher Peter Herrndorf will form a part of the crowd this event will attract.

The first concert of a new University of Winnipeg series, *Classics Riddell*, will present pianist Angela Hewitt on Tuesday, October 1st at 8:00 p.m.

Her Winnipeg recital will be held at Young United Church (Young and Broadway) where Miss Hewitt will perform on a nine foot Steinway concert piano provided by J.J.H.

McLean & Co. Ltd. The programme will include the works of Bach, Beethoven, Brahms and Chopin.

Miss Hewitt, described as one of Canada's most gifted young pianists, was the winner of the 1985 International Bach Piano Competition. She has also won many other prestigious international awards. Her Winnipeg appearance is her only Western Canadian engagement this season.

Profile

BONNIE ARCHIBALD



The name Bonnie Archibald is familiar at The University of Winnipeg. As secretary to President Robin Farquhar, she is responsible for ensuring the smooth operation of the President's Office.

Bonnie graduated from Sisler High in 1970, then commenced employment with The Public Press Ltd. In 1975, she began her career at The University of Winnipeg as a secretary at the front desk in the Dean's Office. Shortly thereafter she was promoted to the position of secretary to the Dean of Arts and Science. Recognizing her skills, Dr.

Farquhar was pleased to have Bonnie become his secretary in 1984.

Bonnie's eyes light up when she talks about her job, especially its social aspect. "I have the opportunity to meet some very interesting people who I might not have the opportunity to meet elsewhere." She also notes the difference between working in a business office and in an academic environment. "It's much more relaxed and friendly at the University," she said.

Like many Winnipeggers, Bonnie enjoys running, watching the evening soaps, and escaping Winnipeg's merciless winters. Bonnie can often be spotted running down Kildonan Drive with her two Salukis, Harlowe and Janon. The occasional soap and music video program help to restore her sanity after a hard day's work. "I'm what you might call a vidiot," she joked.

From her post in the President's Office, Bonnie has perceived changes within the University in the last few years. "The collective agreement resulted in some significant changes", she pointed out, "and Dr. Farquhar

has been responsible for changes in the University both from a community and from an international perspective".

When asked how she feels about recent advances in office technology, Bonnie's enthusiasm is evident. "I don't know how we ever survived without it. I'll never go back to a typewriter — unless of course someday I have my own secretary."

In addition to superb office skills, Bonnie's job requires that she participate in events such as Convocation. She recalls one experience where she didn't think her sense of humor would come to her rescue. "At my first Convocation, Dr. Farquhar asked me to hand him the cheque which was to be presented to the Robson Award recipient. I didn't have it. So I said, "Let's just give him an empty envelope and tell him we'll give him the money later". As things turned out, the cheque was on the podium where it was supposed to be in the first place.

Whatever challenges come Bonnie's way in the President's Office, she is certain to meet them with her usual flair.

REGISTRATION RUNS SMOOTHLY



This year it's "hats off" to the Registrar's Office! Students who registered at the University of Winnipeg this week were pleasantly surprised by the absence of the traditional registration line-ups. Walt Stein, Dean of Curriculum, described the registration process as "the smoothest in-person registration in my memory". The ease with which students were able to register was due, in part, to the appointment-return system whereby each student registered at a time designated by the

Registrar's Office. According to Stein, pre-registered course enrollments increased significantly this year. "As a result of the priority system, more than 86% of our enrollments pre-registered."

Most intro science courses were filled completely during advance registration. Other courses in high demand were those relating to Administrative Studies, Introductory English and Introductory French. Several hundred students who were not able to get into "high

demand" courses did not exercise the option of registering in alternate courses. Registration assistant Peter Hobbs said, "The appointment system worked well, but it is difficult to sympathize with disappointed people who waited for in-person registration."

U.W.S.A. President Sean MacDonald was very happy with the registration situation. "The reaction I've been getting from students has been positive. Students are relieved that it wasn't as bad as they thought it would be." The U.W.S.A. facilitated the registration process by providing an information table, survival guide, and free coffee.

With only one or two minor problems yet to be resolved, Walt Stein expects the recently devised registration process to be in full gear next fall.

1985 TERRY FOX RUN AT THE UNIVERSITY OF WINNIPEG

You can walk it, jog it, or run it. Just be sure to make it to the University of Winnipeg Athletic Centre track on September 15 at noon for the 5th annual Terry Fox Run. The theme of the 1985 run is "Make this year's run twice the success — bring a friend!" Faculty, staff and students are urged to support the fight against cancer by participating in this important (and fun) event.

On April 12, 1980, Terry Fox dipped his leg into the Atlantic ocean, embarking on an odyssey that would take him 2/3 of the way across Canada. He ran through six provinces, averaging 26 miles a day on his "Marathon of Hope". After 144 days and 3,339 miles, Terry was forced to end his journey as the cancer had spread to his lungs. He died June 28, 1981 at the Royal

Columbian Hospital in New Westminster, B.C.

The Canadian Cancer Society, the Four Seasons, the Canadian Track and Field Association and Fitness and Amateur Sport Canada organized an event to be called the *Terry Fox Run* for the Marathon of Hope. The run was a great success in 1981 and has continued to be a successful annual event.

In Manitoba last year, \$166,000.00 was raised for the Cancer Society's three main programs: research, service to patients, and public education. This amount represented 5.3% of the national total of 3.1 million dollars for the 1984 Terry Fox Run. Your support is essential again this year.

The run at the University of Winnipeg promises to be bigger and better than ever.

CANADIAN URBAN STUDIES CONFERENCE

The Institute of Urban Studies hosted a major national conference on campus and at the Hotel Fort Garry, August 14-17, 1985.

The conference addressed the theme "The Canadian Urban Experience — Past and Present", and was attended by 350 registrants. More than 90 speakers, including Senator Michael Pitfield, John Sewell, and the Hon. W. McKnight spoke during forty separate sessions on housing, economic and community development, planning and urban form, and urban government and politics.

The conference provided an opportunity to examine from a fresh perspective numerous issues including Urban Native Housing, Federal Urban Housing Policies in the 80's, and Public Transit and Urban Development. It was an opportunity for Canadian urban specialists, consultants, housing specialists, politicians and community leaders to communicate their research results and to receive critical analysis of their work.

The conference represented a major effort on the part of the Institute of Urban Studies, fulfilling its role as a national centre of excellence in the urban studies and housing fields. The Institute of Urban Studies is planning to publish a selection of papers to ensure wide dissemination of the information.

HONOURARY DEGREE NOMINEES SOUGHT

The Senate of The University of Winnipeg invites, from the University community and the public, nominations of candidates for consideration as possible recipients of honorary degrees. Such nominations should include the name and biographical summary of the nominee, along with a statement of the nominator's reasons for making the nomination and the name of the nominator. These submissions should be sent to the Honorary Degrees Committee's Secretary, Mr. R.M. Bellhouse, Registrar of the University, as soon as possible.

PHILOSOPHY LECTURE

John J. McDermott, Distinguished Professor of Philosophy and Humanities, and Professor and Head of Humanities in Medicine at Texas A & M University, will give a public lecture entitled "The Cultural Immortality of Philosophy as Human Drama", Wednesday, October 2 at 12:40 P.M. in Room 1L11.

Dr. McDermott served as Head of the Texas A & M University Department of Philosophy and Humanities from 1977 to 1981. He teaches primarily in the fields of Classical American Philosophy, the Philosophy of Culture, the Philosophy of Education and the Philosophy of Medicine. He is the author of *The Culture of Experience: Philosophical Essays in the American Grain*, published by New York University Press, and more than fifty essays in scholarly journals and university press collections of essays. A second volume of essays, *Cultural Reflections*, is forthcoming from the University of Massachusetts Press in the Fall of 1985. The first volume of his two-volume *Cultural Introduction to Philosophy* was published by Alfred Knopf in 1984. Professor McDermott is editor of scholarly editions of the writings of Josiah Royce (2 volumes), John Dewey (2 volumes), and William James, all published by the University of Chicago Press. He is also co-founder and advisory editor of the sixteen volume critical edition of *The Works of William James*, published by Harvard University Press. Professor McDermott has taught and been visiting lecturer at more than one hundred universities, symposia and conferences, both in the U.S.A. and abroad.

Professor McDermott is the recipient of awards for distinguished teaching at Queens College, C.U.N.Y., the State University of New York at Stony Brook, Texas A & M University, and, most notably, the national E. Harris Harbison Award for Gifted Teaching, given by the Danforth Foundation in 1970.
