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
Pure Gold

The evening of October 31 is one which will linger in the memories of Winnipeg literature lovers. More than 500 admirers of William Golding sidestepped ghosts and goblins to attend a reading of his works at The University of Winnipeg Athletic Centre.

A stimulating speaker, Mr. Golding read for approximately 45 minutes to an enchanted audience. The reading was followed by a lively question and answer session.

Born in Cornwall, England in 1911, Golding wrote his first novel at age 43. The phenomenal success of Lord of the Flies led to his establishment as one of the most applauded and analysed English fiction writers of the post World War II era.





The Missing Link

Construction of a link connecting the 2 buildings which house the University of Winnipeg daycare centres is nearing completion. Prior to their long awaited transformation into daycare centres, the square brick buildings on Spence Street were 33 year old apartment blocks. As such, they were not accessible to the physically disabled. The University of Winnipeg, with the encouragement of organizations representing the physically disabled, is ensuring that the new daycare centres are accessible to all.

Tom Robson, University of Winnipeg Director of Development, is excited about the project. "Within the link, there will be a wheelchair lift, and ramps. These will provide accessi-

bility to disabled children and parents and will enable physically disabled students to participate in the Child Care Worker Training Program."

Steve Coppinger, Assistant to President Farquhar, is pleased with the progress of the construction. "Poor weather conditions have resulted in delays in the project's completion, but we expect it will be finished very soon." A designated area in the link, Coppinger said, will provide additional study space for University of Winnipeg students.

The link, to be completed at an estimated \$225,000.00 will also have a centre courtyard which will serve as a play area for children enrolled in the daycare programs.

Peter Tittenberger

Peter Tittenberger can be spotted in the front row of virtually every University of Winnipeg event. As staff photographer, he is responsible for maintaining visual records of University events, producing audio-visual materials for lectures, and participating in a variety of University of Winnipeg initiated research projects.


The next logical stop for Peter was to enter the work force. Once again, his future became uncertain when he discovered that working for the Provincial government of-

fered little stimulation.

In order to further develop his skills, Peter enrolled in a photography course at Red River Community College. With his newly acquired knowledge of photography. Peter was hired to join the Western Canada Pictorial Index staff at The University of Winnipeg. Shortly thereafter, he became the head photographer in the Media Services Department.

Peter's personal style is not always reflected in his standard photographs of University events. Faculty, staff and students were treated to a display of his creative work two years ago as part of the U.W.S.A.'s "Exposure" week. It seemed that "exposure" was a concern of Winnipeggers who saw these same photos (unclad kiddies running through a sprinkler) when they were displayed in Winnipeg buses.

Peter's latest project, "Advertising Photography", will be featured November 5-23 at the Floating Gallery. 133 Albert Street, Meanwhile, Peter will remain busy recovering from the serious tonsorial operation he underwent this summer (see photo for progress report).



Sir William Stephenson Scholarship

Three University of Winnipeg students have been selected as the 1985 recipients of the Sir William Stephenson Scholarship award.

Sir William Stephenson, the man who by his daring intelligence work during World War II was known by the code name INTREPID, gave a gift of \$100,000.00 to The University of Winnipeg in 1984. This represents the largest single private gift ever made to the University for scholarship purposes.

The prestigious Sir William Stephenson awards, valued at \$2,000.00 each, are intended for Canadian students at The University of Winnipeg who demonstrate outstanding academic achievement, superior leadership qualities and the potential ability to make a valuable contribution to their country. Responsibility for selection of award recipients is shared by The University of Winnipeg and the Sir William Stephenson Scholarship Trustees (Dr. R.O.A. Hunter; The Hon. Sterling Lyon, P.C., Q.C.; His Worship Mayor William Norrie, Q.C.; The University of Winnipeg President, Robin Farguhar, and President Emeritus H.E. Duckworth.

University of Winnipeg students Elizabeth Martin, Warren Breckman, and Shelley Munro were presented with the awards at a dinner held in their honour, Wednesday, October 30, 1985 in The University of Winnipeg Faculty Club.

Board Highlights from the Meeting of October 28, 1985

President's Report

Fall Meeting of AUCC

The Annual Fall Meeting of the Association of Universities and Colleges of Canada was held in Charlottetown on October 2-3. The Conference portion of the program was devoted to "the future of university research", and was planned and keynoted by Dr. Arnold Naimark, University of Manitoba President. It was agreed that we are in a critical period for university-based research right now, and the next two-three years of government policymaking. university-industry relationships, and within-university developments will determine the long-term future viability of university-based research. It was decided to launch an immediate nationwide lobbying strategy to urge federal government support for the five-year plans of the three research-granting councils.

National Universities Week Speakers' Bureau

In connection with the NUW speakers' bureau, I stopped in Guelph on the way home to address a combined meeting of their Rotary and Kiwanis Clubs on the nature of universities.

October COPUM Meeting

The Committee of Presidents of Universities in Manitoba met on October 15 at The University of Winnipeg.

We met with the UGC Chairman, Ron Duhamel, at his request to discuss several matters he wanted to raise with us, including: the Deputy Minister as a member of our respective Senates (we agreed that we should continue as currently provided for in the relevant legislation); the need to develop a policy on conditions under which the UGC would recommend an order-in-council to authorize borrowing by universities in the future (we agreed that this would not be necessary but, rather. that treatment of special needs for borrowing can best be handled on a case-by-case — e.g., for cash-flow,

building, bridge-financing, and similar purposes); he asked if there would be major benefits to amalgamating the three universities' pension plans (we agreed to review a study of this matter conducted a number of years ago, which reportedly indicated a negative answer); he requested our views on differential fees for visa students (our shared position remains opposed to it); he asked about adjustments in admission policies (each of us explained recent changes at our respective universities); he mentioned the general need for inter-university cooperation and communication (which we are committed to collectively), in regard to such matters as the proposed inter-university baccalaureate program in Nursing, French-language instruction, and athletics/recreation studies. We asked Dr. Duhamel if there had been any indication yet from the provincial government of funding levels for next year, and he reported no knowledge of this due in part to current confusion about federal plans for fiscal transfers to the provinces.

Canadian Red Cross Blood Donor Clinic

The Clinic held on campus on September 24 and 25 resulted in a total participation of 231 donors, 102 donating for the first time. This represents a decrease in the number of donors from the same time last year.

Finance Committee

The Finance Committee recommended:

i) the 1985-86 Operating Income budget be increased to \$21,825,000, as shown in the revised 15 October 1985 budget, and that,

ii) the 1985-86 Operating Expenditure budget be set at the same amount, with the departmental budgets to be tabled when they have been prepared.

Carried.

Pension Committee

The Pension Committee recommends to the Board that:—

Jarislowsky, Fraser and Company Ltd. be appointed investment manager of the Pension and the Endowment Funds, effective immediately.

Carried.

The Committee recommends to the Board of Regents that:—

The University of Winnipeg Pension Plan be amended by lowering the level of net investment return, over which pensions can be indexed from 6.75% to 6.25%.

Request for Representative on Collegiate Native Education Council.

The Dean of Collegiate, in consultation with his Faculty Council, has developed a proposal for the establishment of a Collegiate Native Education Centre at The University of Winnipeg. This is further to an earlier proposal which was considered by the Board a few years ago.

In order to begin working toward some of the developments included in the proposal, the Collegiate Faculty Council has approved the establishment of a Collegiate Native Education Council. It is their intention that the membership of this Council include a representative of our Board of Regents.

Accordingly, I recommend that the Board name a representative to the Collegiate Native Education Council.

Carried.

(Mr. Doug Weaver volunteered to represent the Board on the Council).

Use of Alumni Lists

The Board established a committee to prepare guidelines for the use of the list of university alumni. The committee members are: Gail Hall (Chair), Harvey Sector, Iain McDougall.

Principles and Procedures for Academic Review

The Board approved principles and procedures for academic review.

Instructional Development Workshop

The University of Winnipeg is planning a two-day workshop on Instructional Development to be held on campus November 13 and 14, 1985. The workshop will be conducted by Dr. Kathleen Dalgaard, Staff Development Specialist with the University of Minnesota.

Kathleen Dalgaard was awarded a Ph.D. in Educational Psychology from the University of Illinois. The emphasis of her thesis was the learning characteristics of students and how these characteristics can be used to design and plan instruction. Between 1976 and 1983, she was Director of Faculty Activities at the University of Illinois and at Lehigh University. In her current position

an Staff Development Specialist in the Agricultural Extension Service at the University of Minnesota, she conducts seminars on teaching and arranges inservice Staff Development programs for over 700 staff members.

Dr. Dalgaard has conducted workshops at The University of Winnipeg over the past two years. She has presented seminars in several areas including Learning Through Discussion, Effective Testing, Working with Media in the Classroom, and Designing Courses.
