That's Entertainment

Sad because you missed the slow boat to China? Depressed because the Japanese lanterns adorning your patio have lost their exotic appeal? On Friday, November 29 your quest for culture will be met — and you won't have to travel far from your own back yard. "A Cultural Extravaganza" — an evening of entertainment including ethnic music, song and dance will be presented from 8:00-10:30 p.m. at The University of Winnipeg Athletic Centre.

The Extravaganza is a celebration, and an expression of appreciation by inner-city groups who have used the Athletic Centre facilities during its first year of operation. "Thanks to Maureen Hemphill and to funding provided by the province, inner-city residents have been able to access the facility free of charge", said Community Liaison Officer, Monica Willms.

Hours of vigorous practice by the nine performing groups have re-

sulted in national and international recognition. The Magdaragat Philippine Folk Dancers, who incorporate the martial art of Sikaran with dance movements, were selected to perform before the Queen at the 1985 Canada Day Celebrations. One of the Rythmic Gymnasts recently returned from a competition in Austria with a silver medal. Minneapolis was the scene of a spectacular performance by the Portuguese Folk Dancers.

"The Cultural Extravaganza will help to identify the Athletic Centre as a multi-functional facility", Willms said. "Since January, 1985, twentyfive thousand people from our community have accessed the facilities for a variety of recreational, athletic, and cultural activities."

According to Willms, it is uncommon in North America for community groups to have access to a university's recreational facilities free of charge. "Large student bodies and limited funding have prohibited universities from opening their doors to the community", she explained. "But with provincial funding and the support and encouragement of the University, this has become a reality."

The Extravaganza will feature a number of familiar faces: Barry Edginton of the Sociology department is a member of the dexterous Japanese Kendo Sword Fighters; Collegiate faculty member Rick Skene is involved with the enchanting Mime Works troupe; and numerous other performers are students and alumni of the University.

Willms is optimistic that the Cultural Extravaganza will become an annual event. "But don't wait until next year to witness the calibre of talent that will be on display on the 29th, she advised. Tickets are going fast — they're available at ATO, BTO, and The University of Winnipeg Athletic Centre until November 26. See you there!

Bari Scott



Upon entering the Personnel Office at The University of Winnipeg, the first thing one notices is the relaxed and friendly atmosphere. Bari Scott, Director of Personnel, has created this environment. As Director, Bari's responsibilities include staffing, compensation and staff benefits, with a large part of the day spent interviewing and screening applicants for various positions within the University.

A native of New York, Bari attended Cornell University for three and one half years before moving to Winnipeg. She describes Winnipeg as a much more peaceful and civilized place than the "Big Apple". "I love Winnipeg. There's air and space, blue sky and breathing, things singularly lacking in New York. I also learned manners in Winnipeg."

Bari particularly enjoys the interviewing of her job. "People's stories just blow me away. I could interview all day." Because most applicants are tense before their interviews, Bari does her best to put them at ease. She has an interesting assortment of magazines on a table for applicants to peruse, and when interviewing, she listens with interest and consideration. Although she is a polished interviewer, Bari exper-

iences the occasisonal challenge. "One day a woman looked me in the eye and said, 'I would really appreciate it if you wouldn't smoke.' She scared me to death, so I put out my cigarette. Another time I interviewed a very belligerent young man. Eventually he relaxed, and lit up a cigarette. Only when the smoke filled the room did I realize it was marijuana he was smoking. 'Now you're too relaxed', I said."

Bari is currently working on her Master's Degree in Education specializing in Educational Psychology. She has also undertaken three years of training as a marriage and family therapist. The theories, she discovered, often apply in a work environment. This makes her job more interesting. Following the progress of the people she hires is another aspect she appreciates. "I can pass people in the hall and ask how they're doing", she points out. "In larger personnel offices, once you've interviewed the person, you rarely see him/her again."

Once out of the office, Bari's favourite pastime is riding her bicycle. "For me, cycling is meditation, not exercise, and Winnipeg is the perfect city for it."

Research Canada '86

"Transportation and Communications" is the theme of Expo'86, to be held May 2 to October 13 in Vancouver, B.C. To highlight the tremendous advances made by Canadians in the areas of science and technology, the federal government has established a framework which will allow all Canadians to take part in this important international event.

The "Federal Lectures and Colloquia Series, Research Canada 86" has been developed to explore the technical dimensions of transportation and communications, and the implications of research and development

of these technologies.

During the series of eight major events in eight Canadian cities, a variety of themes will be discussed, including: SOCIETY, HEALTH, ENVIRONMENT, COMMUNICATIONS, ECONOMY, NATURAL RESOURCES, AGRICULTURE and SURVIVAL. Speakers in the series have been selected for their significant contributions in the fields of science, economics, law, education, and philosophy.

"Research Into Environmental Issues" is the title of the event to be held in Winnipeg (November 25 and 26 at The University of Manitoba). Distinguished speakers will include Dr. David V. Bates, Professor of Medicine and Physiology at the University of British Columbia; and Dr. Donald A. Chant, Chairman and President of the Ontario Waste Management Corpor-

Dr. Paul Ehrlich, Bing Professor of Population Studies in the Department of Biological Science at Stanford University will give a lecture "Population Growth and Human Freedoms". It has been argued that human freedom can only be maintained by limiting population growth. Could our concern for the welfare of the species justify placing restrictions on the rights of individuals to reproduce? Do ethical considerations permit us to deny procreation to some and offer prolonged life to others?
