

Posters Mean Business



The University of Winnipeg faculty, staff and students are experiencing a renewed sense of pride these days as they "jump on a bus". It's because many Winnipeg bus shelters are now adorned with an impressive photo of The University of Winnipeg, and an accompanying slogan — "Winnipeg is my University too".

The advertisements are the result of a co-operative effort between The University of Winnipeg Office of Development, the Office of Community Relations, and Media Services. Tom Robson, Director of Development, said Mediacom offered to give The University of Winnipeg

a significant reduction in bus shelter advertisement costs. "We're saving several thousands of dollars. Mediacom is placing the posters in unsold ad spots—in the next months we'll have the opportunity to remind the general citizenry about The University of Winnipeg."

Jim Carr, Director of Community Relations, cites "visibility" as an important component of the bus shelter advertisement scheme. The slogan, "Winnipeg is my University too", he says, conveys the sense that The University of Winnipeg is an integral part of the community. "Citizens will feel that it is their university too."

Program Re-instated

The University of Winnipeg Vice-President (Academic), A. Ross Mc-Cormack, is pleased to announce the re-instatement of a program of degree credit courses at Stony Mountain Institution beginning Monday, January 20, 1986.

On July 31, 1985, Stony Mountain Institution informed the Division of Continuing Education at The University of Winnipeg that there were insufficient funds in the next year's budget to allow for contract renewal of the program.

The re-establishment of the program has been made possible through the co-operation of the Department of Education, Government of Manitoba, and The University of Winnipeg. The Department of Education has agreed to provide one-time only funding in the amount of \$18,000 towards the cost of the program while The University of Winnipeg will absorb the administrative costs, provide the instructors and supply the overall co-ordination of the program.

Dr. McCormack indicated that the successful re-instatement of the program is due to the financial commitment of the provincial government, the University's belief in the importance of advancing educational opportunities for inmates, and the sustained efforts of concerned citizens and the inmates themselves.

Going for Baroque

Each year, The University of Winnipeg presents a variety of public events such as lectures, concerts and art shows which are open to all at no charge. Many of these events are scheduled for the noon-hour and provide an opportunity for those who work or shop downtown to sample some of the cultural and educational experiences which are part of campus life. In this community spirit, The University of Winnipeg has proposed a cooperative venture with major corporations to bring portions of our noonhour classical music series directly to convenient locations in the heart of downtown Winnipeg.

At a meeting held January 17, representatives of The University of Winnipeg met with representatives of several corporations to discuss the concept. The result was an agreement in principle that the corporations will participate in the establishment of the series this spring. The University of Winnipeg will develop the series by booking local musicians and the occasional touring artist, and will provide publicity services.

Harry Strub, Chair of The University of Winnipeg Music and Art Committee says "these concerts should contribute to a downtownneighbourhood-community spirit, at the same time as major construction begins to transform the north side of Portage Avenue into a more attractive gathering place for shoppers. workers, and strollers."

Faculty & Staff Activity

Al Reimer's new historical novel, My Harp is Turned to Mourning, was published by Hyperion Press, Winnipeg, just before Christmas. The novel is set in the Mennonite colonies of the Central Ukraine in the period 1905-1924. Set mainly in the large Molochnaya settlement, this epic story follows the fortunes of three generations of the Fast family, which has been farming in the village of Blumenau since coming to Russia from West Prussia in 1804. The main action takes place during the violent upheaval of the Russian Revolution, during which the prosperous and peaceable Mennonite settlers become the hapless victims of lawless bands of partisan fighters and assorted revolutionaries.

This panoramic novel dramatizes the cataclysmic events of the Russian Revolution as they affected the Mennonites of Russia and explores the nature of violence in the context of a group of people who find that their traditional belief in nonviolence is put to a severe test by these events.

This study provides a comprehensive survey of heritage preservation efforts among the ethnocultural communities of Manitoba. Beginning with a brief examination of the origins of Canada's Multiculturalism policy, the study traces some of the ideological, psychological, and institutional consequences of the policy for ethnocultural communities in Canada generally. It is within this broader context that the heritage preservation efforts of the 49 ethnocultural communities surveyed for this study are to be understood. Some attention is also paid to the variations in heritage preservation efforts among the communities, wherein some have large comprehensive programs while others have but a rudimentary program of heritage preservation.
