CPAM

One of the most successful programs offered by the Division of Continuing Education is the Certificate Program in Administrative Management (CPAM). Over 200 students are currently enrolled in this part-time studies program, which combines both credit and non-credit course requirements in areas such as communication, management, information systems and organizational psychology and sociology.

The main attraction of CPAM is that it enables participants to obtain the desirable combination of education and practical work experience which is essential for success in today's competitive workplace. CPAM students acquire the knowledge, skills and attitudes necessary for effective and efficient performance of first level supervisors, administrators and managers.

According to Continuing Education Program Officer, Barb Spence, "There has been a remarkable increase in interest in CPAM in the last year, which indicates that there may well be a need for certificate programs in other fields as well". One of the major objectives of the Division of Continuing Education is to identify the needs in the community and to provide educational alternatives to meet those needs.

The success and popularity of the Certificate Program in Administrative Management is a good indication that Continuing Education is fulfilling its mandate.


Parent/Student Forums

On the evenings of February 24, 25 and 26, the Admissions Office hosted the annual Parent/Student Forums. Approximately 450 Winnipeg-area Grade 12 students accepted invitations to attend the event. Many were accompanied by parents and friends.

Each evening began with a short, formal session. Dr. Farquhar welcomed those in attendance and outlined the value of a liberal arts education and the goals of the University of Winnipeg. Faculty members representing the Humanities, Social Sciences, Natural Sciences and Education then gave short presentations on the natures of their respective discipline areas.

Following the formal session, the students and parents had the opportunity to speak informally with representatives of each University department and major. They were also able to receive information regarding admission, entrance scholarships, financial assistance and registration. This year, for the first time, the counselling sessions were held in the open area of the Athletic Centre.

The Parent/Student Forum is one of the University's most significant high school liaison events. It has encouraged many students to consider seriously the possibility of attending the University of Winnipeg. It has proved to be especially influential with entrance scholarship winners.



Glen Bergeron's job is a pain in the neck. Well, not exactly. As Director of The University of Winnipeg Athletic Therapy Clinic, Glen treats neck pains, leg pains, and an assortment of muscular maladjustments.

Glen grew up in St. Boniface, participating in many of the community's athletic programs. While attending St. Boniface Diocesan High School, he coached varsity girls' volleyball and basketball, and played on the varsity boys' volleyball team. Glen's interest in sports continued throughout university he earned a Phys Ed. degree from the University of Manitoba in 1973. "I became involved in sports medicine and liked it" Glen said. He went on to earn his Master's degree in Sports Medicine at the University of Alberta in 1976.

Glen worked as a therapist at the Summer Olympics in Montreal before returning to Winnipeg to take the position as Director of Winnipeg's first Fit Stop. When the position of Athletic Therapist became available at The University of Winnipeg, Glen accepted it with enthusiasm. "It's a great place to work", he said. "There aren't many universities that offer an opportunity to meet so many people on campus".

Last year, Glen went on a sabbatical to study toward a Ph.D. in anatomy at the University of Manitoba. In reference to his main area of research, knee related pain, he said, "It is a common problem, and is frustrating to treat. Surgery is often required". More recently, Glen has been busy at the Therapy Clinic, where 35-40 persons are treated per day. "We have a beautiful facility within the Athletic Centre", Glen said. "It's probably the best in the country in terms of the physical plant".

Glen says the Therapy Clinic has taken on a heavy community involvement commitment. "We've generated \$77,000 for community programming to be run through the Therapy Clinic", he said. The Manitoba Sports Federation granted \$31,000 for the purchase and conversion of a van to operate as a first-aid station at community sports events. "The community will know that The University of Winnipeg is at the forefront of our program", he said. "We have a high profile".

Faculty/Staff Activity

John Vander Stoel is a busy man these days, spending half his time in his office in the Collegiate and the other half in his office in Continuing Education. The staff of Continuing Education is looking forward to May 1st when, after 13 years as Dean of the Collegiate, Dr. Vander-Stoel officially takes his place as the new Director of the Division of Continuing Education.

Donald A. Bailey (History) recently had an article published in Canadian Ethnic Studies, XVII, 3(1985), pp.100-19. 2) Appointment Committee for Dean of Arts and Science — Since next year is the final year in Dr. McIntyre's current five-year term as Dean of Arts and Science and it is also the final year in the current five-year terms of the Associate Deans of Arts and Science, decisions about the appointments of Associate Deans of Arts and Science for the following period should be made this fall and a decision about the Dean of Arts and Science for the follow-
