Fessenden-Trott Scholarship Awarded

The University of Winnipeg is pleased to announce that Shyamala Dakshinamurti, a second-year student, has been awarded a prestigious Fessenden-Trott Scholarship. The Fessenden-Trott Scholarship program was established in 1979 in memory of the late Professor Reginald Aubrey Fessenden and the late Helen May Fessenden (nee Trott) of Bermuda.

In Canada, the Fessenden-Trott Scholarships program is administered by the Association of Universities and Colleges of Canada. The award is valued at \$6,000 per year and is tenable for a maximum of three years or until a first degree is obtained. The following attributes are considered in the candidate selection process: attainment of high

academic standing and promise; potential leadership qualities; noteworthy participation in extra-curricular activities and interests; and good moral character and personality.

Shyamala aims to complete a degree in Medicine, eventually becoming a clinical immunologist/oncologist. Her interests lie particularly in research into cell surface structure and cancer immunotherapy.

Shyamala has participated in several Science fairs; in 1983, her project was selected as best in fair at the Manitoba Schools Science Symposium and from there she represented Manitoba at the London International Youth Science Fortnight. In 1985, she won the award for best project in immunology, and also re-

ceived the Medical Research Council summer employment scholarship which she is currently utilizing in the Department of Immunology, University of Manitoba. The abstract of her 1985 project was published in the Canadian Society of Immunologists' **Bulletin**.

Through her science fair involvement, Shyamala joined the National Students' Science Council and served in the executive position of vice-chairman at both local and national levels. The position as national vice-chairman included the writing and production of a science promotion video, which is being distributed to most Canadian school divisions.

Shyamala enjoys drawing, singing, reading and writing. In 1984, she won the Canadian Authors Association Young Writers' competition and both poetry and prose divisions of the Manitoba Language Arts Festival. She is currently a staff writer and cartoonist for the *Uniter*.

Shyamala's interest in ethnic dance and theatre led to her participation in the Manitoba Multicultural Theatre Festival and the Provincial Dance Festival, where she was the "1985 best ethnic soloist." In addition to these numerous and diverse pursuits, she is the driving force behind the attempt to organize a competitive debaters' club at the University of Winnipeg for next year.

Registrar's Office Undergoes Changes

Administrative Changes

Enrolment

Enrolment as of September 20, 1986 for the 1986-87 regular winter session, which began on September 8, 1986 stands at 3403 full-time students and 3907 part-time students for a total of 7310. This is an increase of 2.3%. This successful registration is attributed to the April distribution of registration materials and to the student's understanding of the prioritization registration system. By August 5, 1986, 86% had advanced registered.

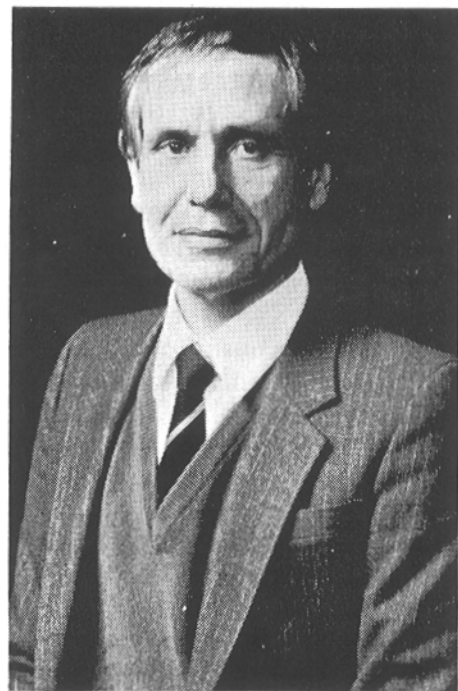
