

Playwrights to Lecture

Banuta Rubess, one of Canada's leading exponents of collective writing in the theatre, will lecture at The University of Winnipeg on Friday, January 30 in 2B23. Rubess's work includes *This is For You*; *Anna* (written as part of the

collective *Anna* project); *Smoke Damage*, and *Pope Joan*, nominated for a Chalmers Award. Rubess is also a director and a performer.

David Fennario will give a lecture Wednesday, February 4 in 2B23. David Fennario was born in 1947 in the Verdun — Pointe Saint-Charles working class district of Montreal. He still lives and works in

the area. He is the author of *Balconville*, *On the Job*, and *Nothing to Lose*, as well as one novel, *Without A Parachute*. He has just completed his latest play, a trilogy about the history of Montreal from a working class view, entitled *Joe Beef*. In recent years, he has worked with a Black Rock Theatre, a theatre group in Point Saint-Charles.

Man In Motion World Tour

Rick Hansen, a world-class wheelchair athlete, is wheeling 24,901 miles, (40,073 km), the circumference of the world in an historic journey that has taken him to four continents and 34 countries. During his courageous marathon, Rick is making the world aware of the potential of disabled people, and raising funds for spinal cord research, rehabilitation and wheelchair sport. The MAN IN MOTION theme is a salute to Expo 86, Canada's International Transportation and Communications Exposition.

Rick Hansen was Canada's outstanding athlete of the year in 1983; winner of prestigious marathons in Canada, the US, Japan and Australia, winner of scores of athletics medals in the Pan Am Games, International Games and the Olympic Games for the Physically Disabled.

The Man in Motion Tour rolled out of Vancouver, Canada on March 21, 1985. After wheeling through the United States, Europe and the Middle East, New Zealand, Australia, Japan, China and Korea, Rick returned to North America in the

summer of 1986, wheeling from Miami to Maine. He is now crossing Canada from Newfoundland to Vancouver.

Rick Hansen is a man on a mission to fulfil his dream; a dream of wheeling around the world to make everyone aware of the potential of the disabled... a dream of raising funds

so that others who suffer a severe spinal cord injury might one day be able to get up out of their wheelchairs; or better yet, never have to get in one.

- Establishing good rapport with students and encouraging their participation.

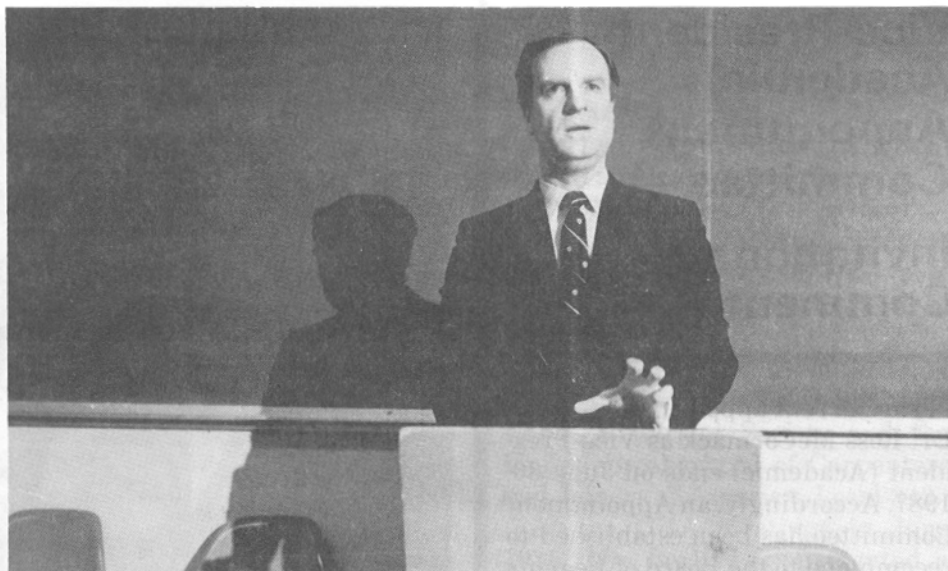

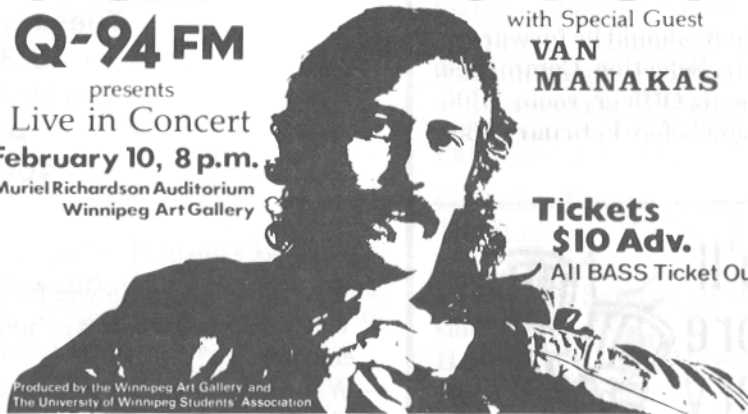

I.U.S. Active

Alan F.J. Artibise, Director, Institute of Urban Studies presented a lecture on "The Canadian Prairies" to faculty and students at SUNY at Plattsburg, December 9, 1986.

In his capacity as President of the Social Science Federation of Canada, Dr. Artibise presented lectures on the "*New Politics of R and D in Canada*" to the faculty at the Universities of Victoria, British Columbia, Simon Fraser and Royal Roads, December 15-18, 1986.

Dr. Artibise chaired the First Annual Lecture sponsored by the Association for Canadian Studies and Americas Society, entitled "*The Challenge of the North American City*," presented in New York City, December 8, 1986.

Tom Carter, Assistant Director, I.U.S., a member of the Canada Mortgage and Housing External Research Review Committee, attended

the annual meeting of the Committee in Ottawa in December. The meeting was held to evaluate projects submitted to CMHC for funding under the program.

Robert Robson, Research Fellow, I.U.S., presented a paper entitled "*Prairie Resource Towns*" to the Manitoba Association of the Canadian Institute of Planners in December. The paper traced the evolution of prairie resource towns in three broad chronological periods.

Dr. Robson will present a paper entitled "*Planning for Winter Livability in the Resource Sector*," at the forthcoming conference "LIVABLE WINTER CITIES: A MANITOBA PERSPECTIVE," to be held in St. Boniface, February 14, 1987.

Wendelin A. Fraser, Publications and Development Officer, was elected to the Board at the Annual Meeting of the Manitoba Periodical

Publishers Association.

Gerry Berkowski, Researcher, conducted and historic tour focusing on the "1919 Winnipeg General Strike" in November for Continuing Education, The University of Winnipeg, with **Nolan Reilly**, Department of History.

Mr. Berkowski is currently doing contract research for the Woodsworth Historical Society and the United Brotherhood of Carpenters and Joiners of America, Local 343.

At the CHA meetings in June 1986, Mr. Berkowski presented a paper entitled "*'Clean and Honourable History': Industrial Capital and the Building Trades Strike of 1906*." The paper described the history of industrial relations in the Winnipeg Building Trades from 1880-1906.

Bulman Re-appointed as Chancellor



Dr. W. John A. Bulman has been re-appointed as Chancellor of The University of Winnipeg for a three-year term commencing July 1, 1987. Broadly defined, it is the Chancellor's function to see to the general interests of the University, including its relations with the public and government, to officiate at the conferring of degrees, and to act as honorary head of the institution.

John Bulman has been active as a leader and friend of the University since his first appointment to the University's Board of Regents in 1967. He served as Chairman from 1977-79 and has been active on numerous committees and advisory bodies. The University has benefitted greatly from Dr. Bulman's leadership and support, particularly in the acquisition of much needed recreation and athletic facilities for the University and residents of the surrounding community. In 1983, Dr. Bulman was awarded the Honorary Doctor of Laws degree for his work on the University's behalf.

Dr. Bulman was born in Winnipeg in 1929. He graduated from Kelvin High School in 1947, and attended the University of Manitoba prior to joining his father's business, The Bulman Group Ltd., of which he is now the President. Dr. Bulman is Past Chairman of the Canadian Manufacturers' Association, and Past Chairman and Director of National Printers and Lithographers. In 1977 he was the recipient of the Soderstrom Award in recognition of outstanding contribution to the industry.

Dr. Bulman is active in several community organizations, professional associations, and church activities. He is a Past President of the United Way of Winnipeg, a Past President of the Board of Governors of the Winnipeg Art Gallery, and Past Chairman of the Community Colleges Council. He is currently Chairman of the Board of Directors of the Health Sciences Centre.

At the recent meeting in Baltimore, Maryland, November 19-22, 1986, **Donald A. Bailey** (History) was elected Canadian Membership Secretary for the Western Society for French History.

Katrin Reimann, Library Acquisitions Department, was the Manitoba Peace Council's delegate to the historic Copenhagen conference of the United Nations World Congress, held in October, 1986.

Professor Harry Loewen, Chair in Mennonite Studies, has been appointed as an adjunct professor in the Faculty of Graduate Studies, University of Manitoba. The two Winnipeg universities cooperate in their graduate studies programmes. The appointment is for an initial period of three years (1987-1989).

Students who major in a given discipline—be it German, History, Religion, Sociology etc.—often choose to write their graduate theses on some Mennonite theme. These students are drawn to Mennonite subjects because Mennonite Studies is interdisciplinary in nature and because there are still many areas left that need to be investigated and studied.

During the second semester at the University of Winnipeg, beginning on January 1, 1987, Professor Loewen will be on a half-year study leave. During this period he will work in archival centres in Europe, Canada and the USA. Among other things, he will be working on Casar von Arx's drama *Brothers in Christ*, a play about the Anabaptists and the Swiss Reformer, Ulrich Zwingli. The popular Swiss dramatist died in 1949.
