BOARD APPROVES INCREASES IN TUITION AND FEES

The Board of Regents has approved an 8 percent rise in tuition along with increases in course fees and athletic and incidental fees for University of Winnipeg students in 1988-89. Basic tuition for all courses will climb to \$215.60/course from \$195/course. Arts and Education course fees will jump to \$25.20/course from \$20.50/course and Science course fees will increase to \$64.20/course from \$54.50/course. In addition, incidental and athletic fees will go up by 8 per cent.

The University of Winnipeg's new fee schedule will match the University

of Manitoba's rates with an Arts or Education student taking five full-courses paying \$1,179 and a Science student enrolled in a full program \$1,374 in both institutions. Brandon University has not yet established its rates for the coming year.

The University's new tuition and fees will apply to this year's Spring and Summer session courses as the

FIRST-COME, FIRST-SERVED SYSTEM IN PLACE FOR NEW STUDENTS APR 1 4 1988

A new first-come, first-served registration system will enable new students to have their course choices confirmed on the spot instead of waiting until August.

Starting May 16 and continuing until the end of July, first-year students will be able to consult with academic advisors, fill out the appropriate forms and be officially registered in their courses all in the same day. The University will continue to reserve the right to transfer students within a given course from one section to another.

In the past, before students could receive confirmation of registration, they waited until the University had received all registration forms and had priorized students in courses that were too full. Priorization involves the consideration of a student's program and major, requirements to graduate and his/her grades.

Registration of continuing students will still be handled this way. However, students enrolling in first-year courses will be able to take advantage of the first-come, first-served procedure.

According to John Hofley, Associate Dean (Curriculum), the switch was made because the University was finding that very few of the first-year courses had to be priorized and this was causing an unnecessary waiting period for students.

Another major reason, Hofley said, was to encourage the first-year stu-

dents to reassteneauly ped he earlier we can get students to register, the better it is for them and for us," he said. "We can respond to them and their needs."

The institution of this system also makes us more equitable and comparable to the University of Manitoba, he added.

Board decided for the first time to establish the same fees for all three sessions.

Board member Bob Purves said the hike in fees was reasonable because the rate adopted is roughly equal to the rate of increase in university costs. And according to President Robin Farquhar, the new fee schedule "still leaves us with among the lowest rates in the country."

But some board members voiced their concerns with the Universities Grants Commission's low 3.3 per cent increase in operating grants to Manitoba's universities this year and the historical differences in funding that have existed between the Universities of Manitoba and Winnipeg.

"We're all concerned about the UGC

decision," said Vice-Chairman Gordon McKinnon. "We want some equity between universities and we may have to take some intiative to get it."

Lee Holleron, president of the University of Winnipeg Students' Association, said fees paid by the students are now covering up to 25 per cent of the operating costs of the University, while the level of excellence and quality of teaching and other services is declining.

"I've heard the same arguments and concerns from the board tonight as I did in previous years," he said. "But there still has been little action against the UGC or looking internally."

"The increases will be affecting 8,000 lives next year - pushing more and more people over the barrier."

UNIVERSITY JOINS MIDDLE EAST COUNTRIES IN DESERT RESEARCH

The University of Winnipeg and two universities in the Middle East will be cooperating in desert research and development.

The University of Winnipeg has already entered into a joint research project with University of Alexandria in Egypt to develop the western desert area in that country. Funded by a \$900,000 start-up grant from CIDA, researchers from the two universities will work towards developing plant growth in Egypt's western desert in order to improve the quality of life of those who live there.

In Israel, scholars and officials at Ben-Gurion University have expressed interest in developing programs in conjunction with Canadian universities such as The University of Winnipeg to help them share their expertise with, and learn from, colleagues in developing countries such as Egypt. They are currently engaged in research on the Negev desert.

These are just two of the projects that will be featured in the upcoming series of articles on international initiatives in *In Edition*.

Presentation

Dr. Richard Dearing, a professor of Practical Theology, gave board members an overview of the programs offered and work undertaken by the Interfaith Pastoral Institute. The Institute provides training for pastoral counsellors and marriage/family therapists, professional education programs and consultations for counsellors and clergy, and counselling and education for individuals and families.

Chairman's Remarks

Dr. Candlish announced that she will be travelling to Ottawa in April to attend the second annual meeting of the Chairmen of Canadian University Boards of Governors. Dr. Candlish suggested several agenda topics including "Centres of Excellence," "Visa Students" and "Transferring Credits."

President's Report

Dr. Farquhar reported on his participation in the Association of Commonwealth Universities semi-quinquennial Conference of Executive Heads and the Quinquennial Congress in Perth, Australia in February.

He also reported on the meeting of senior administrators from this university with Dr. Benjy Levin, Executive Director of the Universities Grants Commission. The President noted that with the government's fall prior to approval of the provincial budget for 1988-89, there is some question as to whether or not the grants announced for the universities will actually be allocated in the form indicated. He said that Dr. Levin advised the University to proceed as originally planned for the time being.

BOARD OF REGENTS RATIFIES FACULTY SALARY PROPOSAL

The Board of Regents has ratified a salary proposal giving faculty a 2.2 per cent increase in base salaries for 1987-88 and 1988-89 and a 3 per cent increase for 1989-90.

The University of Winnipeg Faculty Association (UWFA) had already voted overwhelmingly in favour of the proposal in a recent membership meeting.

According to Terry Voss, Executive Director of Employee Relations, the proposal covered two collective agreements.

In the first agreement, which covers Apr. 1, 1986 to Mar. 1, 1988, salary and benefits in the second year were reopened for negotiations. The two parties agreed to a 2.2 per cent base salary increase along with an average 3 per cent in increments.

The second collective agreement, in effect from Apr. 1, 1988 to Mar. 31, 1990, includes a 2.2 per cent increase in base salaries the first year and a 3 per cent increase the following year. Again, increments will average to about 3 per cent each year.

Voss said that other benefits negotiated include an increase in the annual travel fund to \$400/member from \$365/member effective Apr. 1, 1988.
