# RIDDELL CAFETERIA TO CLOSE FOR RENOVATIONS

The culinary delights of the Riddell Hall Cafeteria won't be available from June 6 to Sept. 6 as the cafeteria will close to allow for the removal of asbestos in the ceilings and the renovation of the food serving area.

Steve Coppinger, Executive Director of Support Services, also noted that during

the asbestos removal stage in June, access to Riddell Hall including the Spence Street entrance and Riddell gymnasium will be restricted.

As an alternative to Riddell cafeteria, Centennial Hall Buffeteria will be open to serve students and staff June 6 to Aug. 19. The buffeteria serving area is being expanded during May in order to handle the increased number of diners expected due to the closing of Riddell.

Other options for hungry students and staff are Tony's Canteen in Wesley Hall which will be open Mon. - Fri., 8 a.m. to 4 p.m. and The Faculty and Staff Club which will be open during the lunch break.

According to Coppinger, the Riddell Hall Cafeteria will re-open in September with an interest date in new concepts and faster than the concepts are concepts.

#### UNIVERSITY LAUNCHES INTENSIVE WRITING PROGRAM

The University of Winnipeg will launch one of Canada's most intensive writing programs this fall with required and optional Rhetoric courses for first-year students, a new Writing Skills Centre and computerized word-processing lab.

In September, 1988, the University will begin the first phase of a two-year plan to fully implement the Writing Program. The program is designed "to teach writing as a means of solving complex problems and to prepare students for the highest orders of success in their academic studies and in their subsequent professional careers."

According to John Hofley, Associate Dean (Curriculum), regular status students entering the University next year with a grade of less than 60 in English 300 or less than 70 in 301 will be required to take Developmental Rhetoric in the first term and either Rhetoric IA or IB in the second term.

Students who are identified as having average writing skills will be encouraged but not required to take Rhetoric IA or IB. Above-average students (80+ in English 300) will be urged to take Rhetoric II.

Hofley said a Writing Skills Centre will be established, probably in Graham Hall, for students who need individualized tu-

toring in grammar, spelling and basic writing skills. Students who are having problems with the Developmental Rhetoric course will be referred to the Centre on a mandatory basis.

The University will also set up a word processing lab to help students learn to use the helpful editing features of computers. The Rhetoric IB courses will be taught in the lab and Roland Huff, Director of the Writing Program, said that the lab will also be open to the University community at large for at least part of each day.

Huff said the new Rhetoric classes will be small and will be geared to three different levels of writing.

Developmental Rhetoric will focus on teaching students basic writing skills such as how to establish a thesis, organize information, develop ideas and support arguments with evidence or concrete examples.

In Rhetoric IA and IB, students will learn pre-drafting, drafting and revision strategies. They will learn how to write

### JOB TRAINING FOR NATIVE SECURITY **GUARDS DEEMED A SUCCESS**

The new on-the-job training program for Native security guards has worked out "very favorably," said Tom Marshall, Director of Security Services.

"The two guards have helped us deal with some of the problems we have encountered as a downtown university and they have been very well-received by students, faculty and staff," he said.

Marshall said that because the two trainees, Edward Patrick and Joe Caribou, speak Cree and Saulteaux, they were able to overcome the language barrier and deal with some situations more effectively than in the past.

Both Patrick and Caribou have now finished the job-training program which

began in September, 1987, with funding from the federal Department of Indian Affairs through the Manitoba Indian Education Centre.

Patrick will remain at the University as he is now a permanent full-time employee of Metropol Basefort, the company which holds the University contract for providing security guards. Caribou will continue as a full-time security guard on another site.

Marshall said the program will be renewed with at least two more trainees taking the place of Caribou and Patrick. Harvey DesJarlais has already been accepted into the program.

for different audiences and how to become critical readers of their own writing and the work of their peers.

Rhetoric II deals with the writing process, research procedures and the nature of post-modern discourse.

According to Huff, the University will hire six new staff members for the Writing Program including an associate director, directors for the writing centre and text processing lab and teachers for the Rhetoric courses. Huff said existing English department personnel will also be teaching some of the Rhetoric courses and advanced undergraduate students in Education will be able to obtain credit as tutors in the writing centre.

In the second phase of the Writing Program (1989-90), Rhetoric IA/IB will become mandatory for all first-year students with average writing skills. Rhetoric II will remain optional for aboveaverage students. Eventually, all students will be required to complete some writing intensive courses before graduating. The University will designate several existing courses from different departments as writing intensive.



#### BOARD APPROVES EARLY RETIREMENT PLAN

The Board of Regents has approved an Early Retirement Plan for employees of The University of Winnipeg.

The University of Winnipeg recognizes that retirement is a very individual matter. While some employees may wish to continue to work beyond their normal retirement date, others would like to consider early retirement. The greatest barrier and deciding factor for many staff members is the pension plan reduction.

The purpose of the Early Retirement Plan is to respect the individual nature of the retirement question while at the same time providing the option to all staff by removing some of the barriers.

The Early Retirement Plan will be available as an option from May 1, 1988 to Dec. 31, 1989 and will be applicable to retire-

ments up to and including Dec. 31, 1990. The plan will then be evaluated.

Applications should be made as soon as possible but at least six months in advance of early retirement. In cases where it is of mutual advantage to the employee and the University to waive the minimum notice requirement, the University may do so.

At the commencement of early retirement, the staff member must be employed in a 12-month full-time continuing position or on a reduced appointment; be at least 55 years of age; and have at least 20 years of continuous University service.

- Beverley Fehr of the Psychology Dept. recently received the Iowa Network Dissertation Prize for her dissertation "Prototype Analysis of the Concepts of Love and Commitment" which she completed in 1986 while at the University of British Columbia.

The Iowa Network Dissertation Prize is awarded annually to the best dissertation on a topic in social or personal relationships. Consideration is given to work received from any academic discipline.

The prize consists of a monetary award, free registration for the next Iowa Conference on Personal Relationships and a "star-billing" presentation there of a paper based on the dissertation. The paper will also be considered for publication in a "star" category in the Journal of Social and Personal Relationships.

- Harry Loewen, Chair in Mennonite Studies, presented an invited paper at a conference on "Literatures of Lesser Diffusion," held at the University of Alberta in Edmonton, Apr. 14 - 16. The title of the paper was "Leaving Home: An Important Theme in Canadian-Mennonite Literature in the 1980s." The paper dealt with the writings of Rudy Wiebe, Patrick Friesen, Al Reimer, Sandra Birdsell, Di Brandt and Audrey Poetker.

Loewen is also the editor of the recently published book Why I am a Mennonite: Essays on Mennonite Identity (Scottdale, Pennsylvania and Kitchener, Ontario: Herald Press, 1988). In this book of 350 pages, 30 men and women from Canada, the United States and Europe write about what it means to be a Mennonite in today's world.

In addition, Loewen is the author of two articles: "Urbanisierung der kanadischen Mennoniten" in Trierer Geographische Studien, Sonderheft 4/5 (1982/1986), pp. 579-89; "Der wahre Glaube": Zum Glaubensverstaendnis bei Menno Simons" in Bibliotheca Dissidentium Scripta et studia No. 3 (Baden-Baden & Bouxwiller: Editions Valentin Koerner, 1987), pp. 191-99.


