

## World Curling Champion Right Here on Campus

Christine More, who won the 1984 championship in Scotland, is a part-time physical education instructor in the University's Collegiate Division.

In the past four years, More has also competed in and won the Provincial Championship. More's team placed third in this year's Provincial Champion-

ship which was played last weekend. After the Provincial Championships, the winning teams compete in the Scott Tournament of Hearts before they are considered to play in the World Championship.

"We really worked hard at the game that won us the World Ladies' Championship. To win you have to play great and sometimes get a few good breaks. I really like the game. I love the strategy, the intricacies. When the game is played at a higher level, you can execute difficult plays. The game is often described as 'a

chess game on ice,' "explains More, who plays the skip position.

This year the World Ladies' Curling Championship is being held at the Winnipeg Arena, March 23 - 31. "It will probably be more of an extravaganza this year," said More.

Although More is unable to participate in this year's University bonspiel, her achievements in curling and enthusiasm for the game will be an inspiration to the rest of us.

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## Physical Plant Worker Honoured for Saving Friend's Life

Physical Plant service worker Jack Lalonde, who saved a friend's life in a boating accident in October, 1989, received an "Honorary Testimonial" Certificate from the Royal Canadian Humane Association.

This certificate was presented to him by Lieutenant-Governor George Johnson, on Tues., Jan. 29.

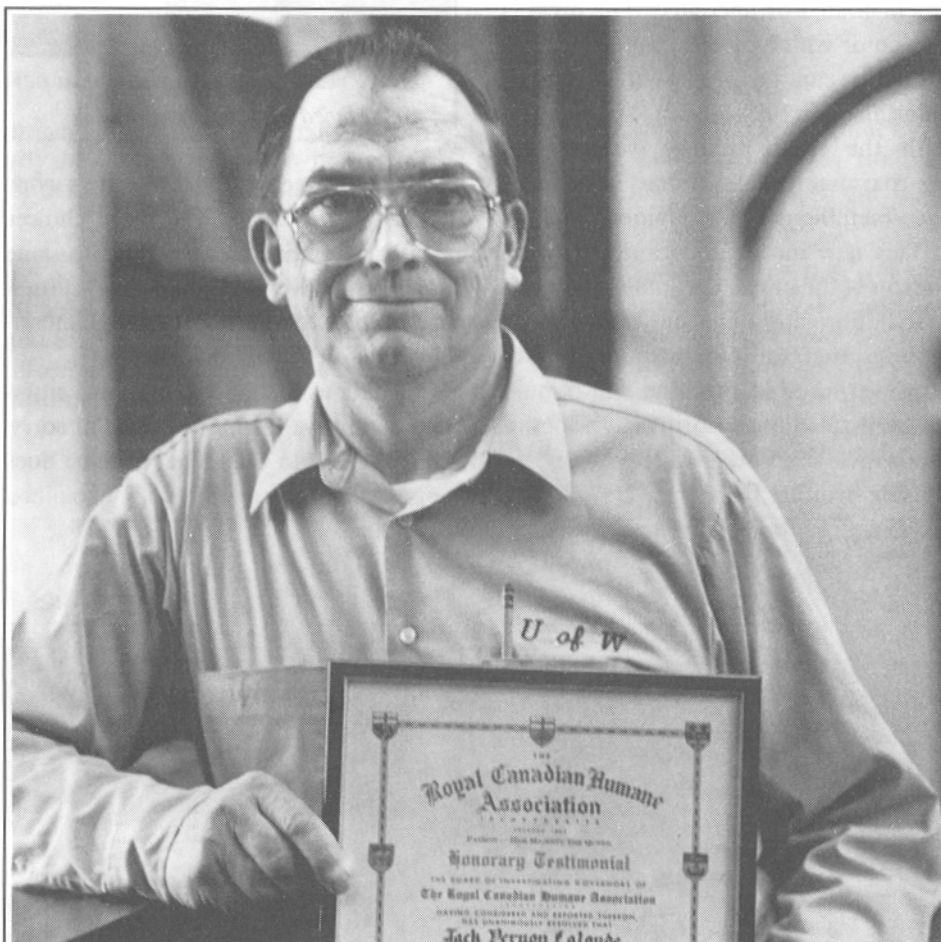
"I was kind of surprised. I didn't really expect anything like this at all. It's great, but I only did what I had to do," Lalonde said.

Lalonde and his good friend Steve Vance were on their way to a cabin on English Lake for a weekend of moose-hunting when their boat overturned. Lalonde, who can't swim, grabbed an empty antifreeze container and began paddling to shore. He also towed back Vance, who was unconscious from hypothermia.

Minutes later, Lalonde lost the feeling in his legs, but he continued towards the bank.

"Once we reached the shore, I knew we had to keep moving. I managed to pack us into Steve's truck and we made it to the main highway. From there I was able to flag down a car. We were really lucky. They had a two-way radio and we were able to call for help."

"Without those people, Steve would never have made it," explained Lalonde.

## Patience Pays Off as Printing Services Receives New Machine

It may have arrived 15 days early, but the Itek 3985 is one Christmas gift that Printing Services appreciates, especially since the old printing press broke down in mid-November.

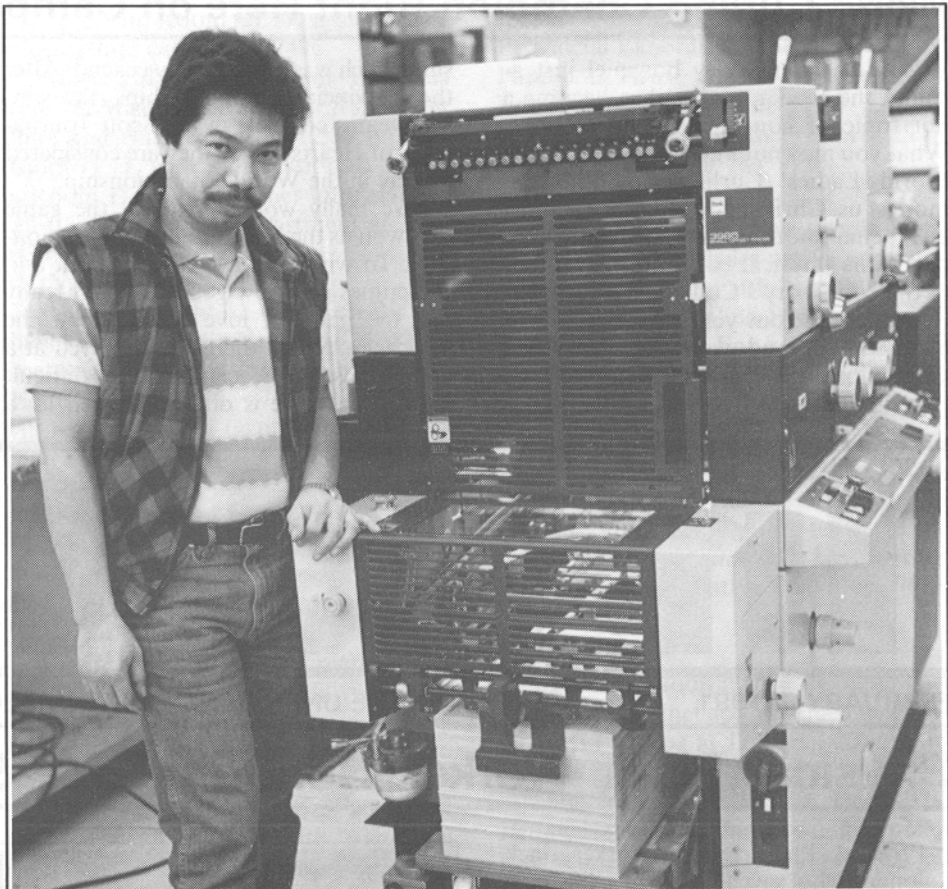
According to Dan Presto of Printing Services, "The breakdown caused delays in completing our customers' work, so we were almost forced to go out and buy a new machine. The old one is about 10 years old, which is five years too old for any printer."

This new printing machine is the latest addition to the Printing Services Department and even though they haven't used it for any special jobs yet, Presto is impressed with its capabilities.

"This machine can print on any kind of paper, whether it's heavy or light stock, coated or uncoated. The press is two color which means that color photographs can be processed. The machine also has full color capabilities and with the right mixing, we can get approximately 600 different ink colors, even metallic gold," explained Presto.

This new model is considered to be the top of the line of the small presses. It is self-lubricating and has many safety features that the old machine lacked. However, the old machine will remain in the Print Shop to print envelopes, a job which used to be handled by an outside printing firm.

"The limitations of the old printer, have been solved by the new machine," said Presto.

The Itek machine makes Presto's work easier, but it also makes more choices available to the customer, who at one time may have been told that certain paper, colors or paper sizes were impossible to do on the old machine.

"It puts us out of the awkward situation of always having to say, 'I'm sorry, but we can't do that. The machine does not have those capabilities,'" explained Presto.

The Print Shop works mostly on University material, but does occasional

outside jobs as well. Projects such as brochures, application forms, invitations, and letterheads are handled by Printing Services.

Van Dilz, Manager of Printing Services, is pleased with the new machine. "There will be an improvement on the quality of work and we are now in a position that we won't have to refuse many jobs. This machine can do almost anything."

Lalonde stayed in the hospital overnight, but Vance had to stay for four days. The incident is still vivid in his mind, but he denies being any kind of hero.

"I was shocked when I first received the letter from the Royal Canadian Humane Association," Lalonde said.

"I ran over and showed Steve the letter right away. He was sort of excited, but then a day or so later, he received an invitation and then he was twice as excited."
