Celebrate Charter Day!

Sept. 15 marks the silver anniversary of Charter Day. Twenty-five years ago the Province of Manitoba granted United College full university status and a new name - The University of Winnipeg.

"We've tried to provide something for everyone," says men's basketball coach Bill Wedlake. Wedlake co-chairs the 25th anniversary committee, along with Professor Emeritus Walter Swayze and Director of Records Linda Simpson.

Charter Day's kick-off event is the annual Great Rock Climb. President Emeritus Harry Duckworth will be on hand to present this year's winners with a trophy and prize money. Duckworth became president of the University the same year the Rock was put in place. "He's our patron saint of the Rock Climb," says Wedlake of the many years Duckworth


has taken part in the event.

The course of the race is 50.33 metres (91.44 feet), measured from the front door of Wesley Hall to the base of the rock. The clock stops when all three team members make it to the top of the rock. The record for the fastest time, an amazing 9.8 seconds, is held by the 1979 Collegiate alumni team (considerably faster than the 2 min. 9 sec. time clocked by a faculty team back in 1972).

Besides being fleet-footed, winning teams seem to have a penchant for innovative names: High Hikers, Rock Stars, Luigi's No Nonsense Rock Climbers, and Mark's Mutant Mountain Men, to name just a few.

The Rock was put in place in 1971 to commemorate the 100th anniversary of Manitoba College, one of the founding institutions

History Professor Wins International Prize

A \$75,000 award has been given to History Professor Wesley Stevens of The University of Winnipeg. Stevens has won the Humboldt Research Award, a prestigious international prize that recognizes outstanding career achievement in teaching and research.

"It's so nice, it's hard to believe," said Stevens of his prize, which covers all travel and living expenses related to research projects of his choosing for one year.

Each year only 200 scholars are selected from all over the world to receive the award. Natural sciences, engineering, medicine and psychology predominate, but a small number are also given for literature and history.

The awards are presented by the Alexander von Humboldt Foundation of Germany. Candidates must first be

The club also purchased a rotary toaster oven to bake pizzas and garlic bread. Young points out the added expenses make it especially important for "faculty and staff to rally and give us their support."

"We've received generous praise from faculty and staff for the changes we've made so far," says Cass. Wesmen Coach Honoured

Jeffrey Kerr is the 1991-92 winner of the Institute of Urban Studies' Student Paper Award for his paper "Gentrification: Assessing the Causes and Effects."

The award is granted annually for the best term paper written by a student in the Urban Studies Program at The University of Winnipeg. Papers are selected by faculty teaching in that program and submitted to the Institute of Urban Studies for judging by qualified referees.

The award consists of a cash grant of \$250, plus publication in the IUS Student Paper series.

Library Goes Online

The University of Winnipeg Library launches a new online public access catalogue (OPAC) this month.

The computer system will allow students, faculty and staff to locate library materials simply by entering a title, an author, a subject or a key word. All items in the collection that were acquired, published or re-catalogued between 1975 and the present are included on the system.

Known as the BRIDGE computer network, the system also allows access to the holdings of the University of Manitoba libraries and St. Boniface Hospital Library.

Seven terminals will be set up in the library with a possibility of more as need dictates. Faculty and some authorized students will also be able to access the catalogue through their office computers.

And on those cold winter nights, those who own home computers will be able to look at the catalogue via a University of Manitoba telephone number.

Besides its usefulness to students and faculty, library staff will also be able to use the system in their purchasing decisions, said Bill Pond, head of public services for the library.

"Before we purchase a book, we can easily check if the University of Manitoba already has it. On the system, everybody knows what everybody has. With sharply declining budgets, this kind of resource-sharing is necessary," said Pond.

The library has also received money to begin a project to convert its pre-1975 resources into machine readable form. Pond predicts the project will be completed in three to four years.

Developed as the PALS system at Mankato State University in Minnesota, the BRIDGE system has the potential to perform interlibrary loan functions, put immediate holds on books, and is accessible to INTERNET, a network linking nearly all university and major public libraries across North America.

Pond hopes that The University of Winnipeg Library will be able to access all of these functions as funds become available in the future.



Canada Savings Bonds Available Soon

New President for Menno Simons College

George Richert has been appointed the second president of Menno Simons College.

Richert was dean of the Faculty of Education and a former dean, Faculty of Social Work, at the University of Regina. He remains director of the university's China Program.

In addition to his presidency of the college, Richert will also be coordinator of the Social and Economic Development Studies (SEDS) Program and a professor of Social and Economic Development.

Richert is not entirely new to The University of Winnipeg. For six months in 1990 he was distinguished visiting professor in Social and Economic Development Studies at Menno Simons College.

His extensive experience in international development programs in Africa, Asia and the Caribbean will benefit the college's SEDS program. But there is a difference, Richert points out, between teaching and doing.

"For that reason, one of the changes I would like to see, in both SEDS and in the Conflict Resolution Studies (CRS), is the addition of a practicum to our programs. Students would be assigned to an agency that is involved in conflict resolution, or they could have the opportunity to gain practical experience in international development," he says.

"A surprising number of the students I taught here in 1990 had been to Third World countries, but as travellers. I would like to see them have a focus when they go, and be able to get an academic credit out of the experience. It would be an excellent way to see how practice melds with theory, to see which ideas work and which ones don't."

Richert anticipates a good working relationship between the various Mennonite colleges in Manitoba. "It is important to me that we complement each other's programs, rather than duplicate them," he says.

He'd also like to see the college eventually have its own building on campus. "Another priority is to offer more diversity in the programs we offer, with the appropriate increases in faculty," says Richert. "The programs we have at Menno Simons College are very relevant in today's world."



Feminist Scholarship: Revising the Canon

Is feminist research relevant beyond the confines of Women's Studies programs and equality rights? What are the insights provided by recent women-focused research projects? Is there sharing of information across the disciplines?

These issues and many others will be addressed in the course of an interdisciplinary conference on women-focused research to be held at The University of Winnipeg, Sept. 25-27.

Conference presentations and plenary discussions revolving around the theme of "Feminist Scholarship: Revising the Canon" will highlight current Canadian and American feminist academic work which is challenging traditional perceptions of knowledge and scholarship across the disciplines.

Guest speakers, including well-known scholars from Manitoba and across North America, will address a broad spectrum of current topics in sociology, psychology, business, history, medicine, literature, geography, education, medicine, law and political science.

The plenary sessions will feature Jill Vickers, academic vice-president and sociologist, Carleton University, Krishna Ahooja-Patel, past chair of women's studies, Mount Saint Vincent University, Marilou McPhedran, lawyer and LEAF member, Toronto, Karen Offen, historian, Stanford University, Himani Bannerji, sociologist and writer, York University, and Jerilynn C. Prior, Medicine, University of British Columbia.

Two Canada Council-sponsored poetry readings are also scheduled, with guests Miriam Waddington and Maria Campbell.

The conference is sponsored by The University of Winnipeg and an Aid to Small Universities Grant from the Social Sciences and Humanities Research Council of Canada (SSHRC).

nominated by German colleagues and then winners are selected by a council of German professors.

"It's really wonderful to know that other people in my field recognize and appreciate my work," said Stevens. "The support of my colleagues and the administrators at The University of Winnipeg has been tremendous, too. I especially want to thank Ross McCormack, Don Kerr and Linwood DeLong."

Stevens studies and teaches in the fields of early medieval history, and especially mathematics and astronomy in schools of the Carolingian empire of the 9th and 10th centuries. He is also a specialist in the use of computers for cataloguing Greek and Latin manuscripts and for access to primary research sources.

During his career Stevens has written three books, edited four books and produced 16 articles. He has given 39 public lectures in Europe and North America.

In the next year, Stevens will travel to Munich, Constance and Gottingen, Germany. He will continue his work on the Latin manuscripts of Euclid, a Greek scholar who created systematic geometry. Stevens was the first to discover that a Latin translation existed in the 9th and 10th centuries - much earlier than was originally thought. As well, he will prepare to publish the personal notebook of Walahfrid Strabo, a 9th century imperial tutor who had a keen interest in natural science and mathematics.

of The University of Winnipeg. The 25-ton granite boulder inspired a poem that was published in the *Uniter* that year. Officially known as the Rock of Remembrance, it's also called Centennial Rock and in 1981 was dubbed "Mount Harry" by team winners of that year's Rock Climb. They marked the occasion with a flag-raising on top of the Rock.

The entire University community is welcome to attend the Special Convocation being held in Riddell Hall at 3 p.m. Lieutenant-Governor George Johnson, who steps down later this year, will be awarded an honorary degree. Johnson, who was Minister of Education in 1967, signed the Order-in-Council providing for the establishment of United College as The University of Winnipeg. Len Cariou, Georges Erasmus and Marilou McPhedran will also be honorary degree recipients.

The volleyball tournament begins at 5 p.m. and everyone is invited to participate. "All the social events will be great fun," says Wedlake. "Those who aren't playing can come out and cheer from the sidelines." The tournament will be followed by a '60s-style sock-hop in the evening.

Two displays will be in place for the entire week. Gallery 1C03 is the site of an anniversary photo exhibition, curated by University Photographer Peter Tittenberger. It's a random selection of photos of people and events that have taken place at the University over the last 25 years. Come and take a look; you might be there!

Academic departments in the University are contributing to a special research display set up in the new study space in Centennial Hall. Publications and extracts, posters and exhibits, will enable visitors to see the various kinds of research faculty members undertake.

"The work we've done has been easy compared to the tremendous efforts of all the volunteers," says Wedlake. "I think this kind of enthusiasm shows the good feelings everyone involved has towards The University of Winnipeg."
