Excitement is in the air at The University of Winnipeg's Duckworth Centre as the Wesmen women's basketball and volleyball teams move into what promises to be a week to remember.

Basketball

The 1994 Great Plains Athletic Conference (GPAC) championship has the whole country watching - watching and waiting to see The University of Winnipeg Wesmen women's basketballteam win the first game and tie the North American record (held by the University of Calgary) of 69 straight wins. The first game is March 3 at 7:30 p.m. at the University of Manitoba.

The action then moves to Duckworth Centre for the second Wesmen vs. Bisons game on Sat., March 5 at 7:30 p.m.

If all goes well in the first game, it should be standingroom-only as media from across the country, local sports fans and family and friends join the University

Wesmen team go for the North American record of 70 straight wins.

"A lot of people focus on the pressure of our winning streak," says Tom Kendall, women's basketball coach. "But for the team, it's been very positive. We've been beating teams by as much as 40 or 50 points, so it would be easy to start taking things for granted. Instead, the winning streak has given us a goal; we want to break that 69-game record."


Duckworth Shield is Home Again

This year's third annual Duckworth Challenge saw The University of Winnipeg Wesmen defeat the University of Manitoba Bisons in three out of four matches to win the Duckworth Shield.

The Challenge was instituted by former University President Henry E. Duckworth to highlight the rivalry between the two universities. It consists of four matches, with each Wesmen team playing their counterpart at the University of Manitoba.

The Duckworth Shield is then awarded to the university with the most victories after the end of the competition.

In the first year of the Challenge the Bisons won all four matches, followed last year with a clean sweep by the Wesmen teams. This year, the Wesmen women's basketball and volleyball teams and the men's basketball team defeated the Bisons to keep the shield at The University of Winnipeg.





Artist Reveals Prairie Legends on Film and in Artwork

A talented Vancouver artist and award-winning film-maker will be this year's Bonnycastle Distinguished Lecturer at The University of Winnipeg.

Linda Ohama, president of Harvest Productions, will show her first independent film, *The Last Harvest*, and discuss it with the audience on March 7.

Since the one-hour documentary film made its Vancouver premiere in May, 1993, it has been part of many festivals and was awarded the Antoinette Kryski Canadian Heritage Award at last year's Yorkton Film Festival in Saskatchewan.

The film traces the history of Japanese Canadians and Western Canadians through

Ohama's family and their small prairie community. The story begins with Ohama's grandmother coming to Canada as a picture bride at the beginning of this century, and continues through her grandmother's experience as a widow with nine children during the 1942 Japanese Canadian evacuation, to the present day events of the bank foreclosing on the Ohama farm.

Since the early 1970s, Ohama has worked as a visual artist showing her work in many art gallery exhibitions including *Jack Darcus and Linda Ohama* at the Surrey Art Gallery in 1988 and the Earth Spirit Festival exhibition, *Visions of Power* in Toronto in 1991.

Her latest visual artwork, based on her film subject, was part of the exhibition *Memories and Desires: The Voices of Eleven Women of Culture* at the Vancouver Art Gallery in 1992 and is now travelling to other galleries.

The University of Winnipeg Bonnycastle Distinguished Lecture was established in memory of Richard H.G. Bonnycastle, former chancellor of The University of Winnipeg.



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University Rejects Transit's Spence Street Proposal

The University of Winnipeg's Board of Regents approved the recommendation from the Property and Physical Planning Committee to affirm the Board's long-range plans for the closure of Spence Street.

Winnipeg Transit had proposed to turn Spence Street, between Portage and Ellice Avenues, into a major bus corridor, eventually increasing the bus traffic up to 200 buses a day. It hoped to go ahead with construction of the project by next summer.

Transit submitted its proposal for the development of Spence Street to an open meeting of the Property and Physical Planning Committee in May, 1993. Last September, an outline of the proposal appeared in *in edition*, and in November the University held an open meeting to receive feedback comments from the University community.

According to Steve Coppinger, acting vice-president (finance and administration), the Property and Physical Planning Committee took into account feedback from members of the University community when they reexamined their long-range plan.

"Our long-range plan, which was approved in 1986, is to close Spence Street to vehicular traffic and to develop a pedestrian mall in order to create a unified urban campus," explains Coppinger. "Transit's proposal is inconsistent with what we want to do."

In the meantime, the University would like to make Spence Street a one-way, south-bound street. "It would reduce traffic, increase safety, and be a step towards creating a total campus," says Coppinger.



University Rewards Cost- Conscious Departments

Under a new University policy, departments will now be rewarded for cost-conscious budgeting and careful long-term planning.

The new policy, approved by the Board of Regents last month, will allow departments that come in under budget to carry over a portion of their savings for a specific project.

In the past, thrifty departments feared that they would lose unspent funds and would suffer a cut-back in the subsequent fiscal year. This prospect often triggered departments to go on frantic spending sprees just before the March 31 cut-off.

"There was no incentive for departments to save money," explained Steve Coppinger, acting vice president (finance and administration).

"A good manager could be penalized for coming in under budget, while overspending may be rewarded with an increase in next year's allocation."

The new policy states that any money saved by a department will be divided equally between the department and its sector (president, vice president or dean). The department manager will be able to spend his/her share on a specific approved purpose in the next fiscal year. The sector head may spend or allocate his/her portion.

According to Coppinger, the carry-over will help to spark innovation and thoughtful planning. "It's like a year-end bonus that can be directed to a new piece of equipment or a one-time project that you have always wanted to do. Managers can plan this year's expenditures with a goal like this in mind for next year."

He added that the sector head's accumulated savings act as a buffer for his/her whole area against uncontrollable external forces. For example, the sector head may use his/her savings to help one department cope with an unexpected cost increase by a supplier. Alternatively, the sector head may choose to supplement a particularly worthy project that has been proposed by a cost-conscious department.

"The new policy gives all departments a reason to become more efficient and save money," said Coppinger, "but it also strives to be even-handed, recognizing that the University operates in an often unpredictable world."

The entire policy for operating budgets and carryover of operating funds is printed in the University's Policy Manual. A manual is available in each department/area of the University.

The University has affirmed its long-range plan to close Spence Street to vehicular traffic.

What Does It Look Like to You?

Gallery 1C03 is pleased to present its final exhibition of the 1993/94 year, *Atlas with tentative title*, by Louise Jonasson. The exhibition opens March 3.

Jonasson uses titles in her works as temporal markers. For example, a painting might be titled *April 88 to April 92*. This bestows the complex task of naming on the viewer, she say. In this exhibition, however, Jonasson has used titles to describe types and shapes. *Legend Survey I - XII*, is a series of 12 works that look like the corners of maps, where legends are inset. This "collection of maps" plays with the exhibition's title, as does *Legend Survey VIII*, where a faint image of a Titan, Atlas, is seen holding up the universe.

Jonasson majored in painting and photography in the bachelor of fine arts (honours) program at the University of Manitoba. Since 1986 she has been associate editor (visual arts) for *Prairie Fire*. She has illustrated two books, as well as numerous stories in *Prairie Fire* and *Border Crossings*. Her most recent solo exhibition, *Artists With Their Work:* G.N. Louise Jonasson, is part of the Winnipeg Art Gallery's extension services' provincial outreach program.

The University of Winnipeg is hosting the Canadian Interuniversity Athletic Union (CIAU) national women's volleyball championships on March 3, 4 and 5 at Duckworth Centre. There are day and evening games throughout the tournament, with the gold-medal match on Sat., March 5 at 3:30 p.m.

The University of Winnipeg Wesmen women's volleyball team is not only the defending national champions, but they're ranked No. 1 in the country going into the tournament. In fact, the team has won seven of the last 11 CIAU women's volleyball championships.

Chemistry Professor Travels to Japan

Congratulations to Alaa Abd-el-Aziz, associate professor of chemistry, who has been chosen to travel to Kyoto, Japan this summer for the 30th international conference on coordination chemistry.

His participation in the July 24 - 29 conference is made possible by a travel award from the Canadian National Committee for the International Union of Pure and Applied Chemistry (CNC/IUPAC).

CNC/IUPAC established a program of travel awards in 1982. The pur-

pose of the program is to assist young Canadian scientists and engineers (normally within 10 years of gaining their PhD) to present a paper at a IUPAC-sponsored conference outside North America, by contributing to their travel expenses.

The awards also provide an opportunity to publicize Canadian science and engineering. Abd-el-Aziz was chosen for his potential to contribute to the Canadian chemical scene both nationally and internationally.

Tips From the Mailroom

Before you drop that letter in the mailbox and cross your fingers that it reaches its destination on time, here's a few helpful facts about mail service at The University of Winnipeg.

The University of Winnipeg, through its association with Western Canadian Universities, has contracts with two courier services, Priority Courier and DHL Worldwide Express, that provide fast, efficient service. For example:

- You can use the next-day service to major cities, and two-day service to smaller centres.
- You can courier a letter anywhere in Canada for \$6.15 compared to an average price of around \$10, and if the destination is in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or northern Ontario the charge is only \$3.75.

"Courier services also offer a track and trace service that is excellent," says Orval Voakes, mail services supervisor. "We feel more confident using this than using registered mail." The only thing to remember, he adds, is that 2:30 p.m. is the deadline in the mailroom for courier service.

If speed is not a priority, then Express Post, for letters, or Expedited Parcel Service, for packages, both services of Canada Post, are used. Express Post provides two-day service to major centres, and overnight service locally, at half the cost of

other courier services.

For U.S. and international bound mail, we use a courier service called Interpost. "The item leaves Winnipeg and goes to the U.S. by courier, then it is mailed for us in the U.S.," explains Voakes. "There's no added courier cost for the service and it saves time and money."

Besides reminding us to take advantage of these excellent courier services, Voakes has a few suggestions to pass along to faculty and staff:

- Leave the flaps up on envelopes destined for the mailroom.
- The exception to the above is large envelopes; they should be sealed.
- Direct personal mail to your home address; staff already have their "hands full" with University mail.
- Call ahead to the mailroom if you have a large pick-up; they'll bring a cart instead of a basket.
- Remember: the mailbox across from the bookstore is for external, stamped mail only.
