### University is Participating in *Maclean's* Survey

The University of Winnipeg will participate in *Maclean's* survey of universities this year, after opting out last year. According to University President Marsha Hanen, the decision follows *Maclean's* agreement to address many of the University's concerns regarding the survey.

Maclean's has been ranking universities since 1991. Last year, the University decided not to participate because of the survey's flawed methodological approach and the refusal of Maclean's to give weight to certain university attributes.

This year, Maclean's has agreed, most notably, to publish the survey's raw data, providing students with information that will allow them to develop their own rankings based on their own priorities.

But she acknowledges that several concerns remain: "We still believe that the rankings are not useful, as they exaggerate small differences and are based on very subjective weightings of the criteria. However, given that *Maclean's* will rank universities and despite our continuing disagreement over the validity of the rankings, we believe that there have been sufficient improvements to make it appropriate that we re-enter."

Reputational rankings, based on the subjective opinion of university officials, continue to be problematic and Hanen notes that the University, seeing no reasonable basis for these, has never agreed to provide input. However, she adds, "They have, this year, taken the trouble to contact us about our concerns and the ways in which they are being met. They have also had discussions with members of our university on a variety of topics for stories that are part of the magazine's universities issue."

In addition to that issue, Maclean's will publish a softcover guide to universities that will contain a full page on each university, rather than the brief "thumb-nail sketches" of previous years. George Tomlinson, acting vice-president (academic), notes that this guide will allow the University to "make its own pitch."

The Maclean's universities issue, as well as the universities guide, will appear in a few weeks.

## University Moves to Three-Term System

The University of Winnipeg has moved to a three-term system for 1995-96. The third term replaces the Spring and Summer Sessions, and like the Fall and Winter terms, will be 12 weeks in duration.

The implementation of a full term in spring and summer will resolve the problems associated with the condensation of course material and the limited hours of opportunity for faculty-student contact.

It is believed that increasing the duration of courses will enhance comprehension and retention of course materials.

The new system allows students more flexibility in determining which months to attend classes, which in turn may provide a student with increased options for employment. Similarly, faculty benefit from increased flexibility in organizing their teaching and research commitments.

Course selection in the third term is expected to be more diverse than in the previous Spring and Summer Sessions. Science courses with a lab component, for example, will now be available in the spring.

Informational materials will be available to faculty, staff and students by the beginning of November. Information sessions hosted by the UWSA are also planned.
