

Paintings Explore the Power of Computer Technology



Artist Tim Schouten's fascination with digital technology led him to paint "More RAM!"

The traditional medium of oil paint on canvas is used to explore the power of digital technology in an upcoming exhibition in Gallery 1C03.

"More RAM! Oil Paintings by Tim Schouten" opens on Thurs., Feb. 29 from 4-6 p.m. in Gallery 1C03.

Schouten says his fascination with computer technology developed rapidly after he received an old Apple II computer as a gift in 1993. "I fell in love. I was enraptured with the technology and amazed at the power of these machines to process and exchange information."

Dissatisfied while working on a figurative painting, he took an old friend's advice to "paint what you like" and sketched his computer into

the background. That sketch served as the catalyst for the paintings in this exhibition. The figure in Schouten's art became the body of the computer, which he says conveys through its appearance a power and elegance he finds appealing.

According to Schouten, the exhibition's title, "More RAM!" refers to the common quest among computer-users for more memory. However, it also reflects an investigation of the process of memory which is an important element in his art.

Schouten was born in Winnipeg but left at a young age. During his youth, he lived in New York, London, England and Montreal before settling in Toronto. He has studied art at several institutions including Toronto's Arts Sake Inc. from 1978-1980 and the Toronto School of Art, and has participated in numerous group exhibitions. In 1995, Schouten had his first solo exhibition at Del Bello Gallery in Toronto.

Since returning to Winnipeg last year, Schouten has become very involved within the Winnipeg art community. Two of his recent works have been accepted to the Art Rental Program at the Winnipeg Art Gallery. "More RAM!" is his first solo exhibition in Winnipeg. The exhibit received support from the Manitoba Arts Council.

Lectures Focus on Sex Roles and Spirituality

"Sex Roles and Spirituality in the New Age" is the theme of 1996's Religion and Life Week, scheduled to run from Fri., March 1 through Tues., March 5 at the University.

Susan Palmer, a teacher of religion at Dawson College in Montreal for over two decades, will be the guest lecturer. Her areas of specialization include women in religion and new religious movements.

Since 1990, Palmer has also lectured at Concordia University, where she received her PhD in Religious Studies in 1992

Palmer is the author of the recently released Moon Sisters, Krishna Mothers, Rajneesh Lovers, in which she investigates women's roles and experiences in seven new religions. These include the Society for Krishna Consciousness, the Rajneesh Movement and the Unification Church. This book is the first in a new series, Women and Gender in North American Religions published by Syracuse University Press, which aims to explore the importance and diversity of women in North American religious history.

Among her other publications, she has written the forthcoming AIDS and the Apocalyptic Vision: The New Religions Respond to a Plague (University of Toronto Press). As well, she is currently editing a book on children in new religious movements.

"We hope this series will have wide appeal to all members of the University community," says Reference Librarian Linwood DeLong, Co-chair of the Religion and Life Week Committee. He notes that this year's focus will be particularly compelling for those involved in Women's Studies, Sociology and Religious Studies.
